ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

- ♦ IN CASE YOU MISSED IT... The California Sportfishing League (CSL) reported that Assembly Bill AB 1387 advanced to the "Appropriations Suspense File" in our State Legislature. This is the legislation that would change the length of our fishing licenses to one year from date of purchase. As reported in Pacific Coast Sportfishing CSL has been quite active in persuing this bill since it would greatly affect angler participation. Let's hope we can get final word on this ASAP.
- ♦ CATCH ANY ALBACORE LATELY...What used to be a standard productive seasonal fishery for us has been missing. National Fisherman noted that while the "longfins" migrate from North to South Pacific they also alter this pattern periodically. Tagging studies are under way to verify this movement. It appears meanwhile that nine commercial boats that went south caught 4000 lbs. daily during this season (2019). Landings for West Coast Albacore fell below 2017 results and below the 20 year average during 2018.
- ♦ READ ABOUT IT IN "TIDE" . . . The good news you can read about in "Tide", the magazine put out by CCA, concerns the bipartisan report on the bills designed to eliminate drift gill nets. The report by Bill Shedd, among other things the President of AFTCO Mfg. Co. and Chairman of CCA-CAL, tells us that Senate Bill S906 and House Bill HR1979 are moving through Congress. Drift nets have been proven to be very destructive of the ocean environment and will be replaced by deep-set buoy gear. In elaboration, drift gill-nets have been used mainly in efforts to catch swordfish, a very valuable commodity in the seafood market.

- **♦** THIS IS WHERE POLITICS AND CONSERVATION
- **CLASH!...**Seems like a late report in the LA Times reports on a controversy between biologists and federal officials in the Department of the Interior, National Marine Fisheries Service and the US Fish & Wildlife Service. If this were not of concern to Californians we would not be reporting this. At issue is the plan to divert more fresh Delta water to farmers in Central California. Increasing water deliveries would endanger chinook salmon, delta smelt and other native species to the edge of extinction according to the biologists. If you are sufficiently interested send me a self addressed envelope and I will forward the entire story.
- ◆ FINALLY...I have a report from Environment America. It concerns the increasing presence of plastics in our environment. Sounds familiar? Remember the stories about the Pacific "Gyre"? "Scientists have found high amounts of microplastics raining down everywhere from the pristine areas of the Pyrenees mountains to remote areas of the Arctic" Enough said If you are so inclined bring up action@environmentamerica.org

On July 15th, LARRC sponsored the 69th anniversary of the annual "At Risk Youth" Kids' fishing Trip out of 22nd Street Landing. It was a lot of effort by many of the Club's members and it was a lot of fun. Seeing the look on a kid's face when they catch their first fish on a rod and reel is priceless.

This year the event has been renamed the "The LARRC Earl Warren Memorial Kids Fishing Trip). Earl was long time, valued, and honored member of the Club. Earl served multiple times as Club President, on the Board of Directors and the LARRC Foundation. He worked tirelessly and with purpose right up until the day of his passing, earlier this year, as active and contributing member. Renaming this event in his honor is well deserved.

We had children from 3 different organizations participate in the event: New Directions, High Desert Child-Adolescent and Family Services as well as Midnight Mission/Harbor Interface Services.

LARRC volunteers joined together on the Native Sun and the Monte Carlo for a great day of fishing. The Boat Captains and their crews did an excellent job cutting bait, untangling lines and helping the Club members and kids to catch fish as well as fileting countless numbers of Sculpins (not an easy fish to clean).

LARRC volunteers arrived early to carry tackle and supplies down to the boats and rig up the rods. When the kids arrived and boarded the boats, LARRC members were there to greet them. There was healthy snacks waiting for them and the kids received a hot lunch from the galley.

When the boats reached the sculpin fishing spot, LARRC anglers were diligent to teach the kids how to fish. The results were outstanding. After a short time, most of them were baiting hooks, dropping down their lines, and catching fish. Limits of Sculpin were caught by many young anglers, who in most instances were fishing for the first time.

Thank you to all the Club members who showed up to be volunteer deck hands. A SPECIAL THANKS goes out to the LARRC members, Steve Simon, Scott Schiffman, John Goss, Donald Goldsobel, Mark Manculich, Marc Monforte, Sophia Huynh, Larry Brown, Phil Bell, Andrew Ratzky, Richard Stone, who took managerial roles and spent many hours in organizing, prepping, securing/transporting all the necessary supplies and gear. Foundation members Joel Steinman & Chas Schoemaker, brought funds to pay for the





OUTRIDER JULY 8-9, 2019 CALICO BOB CHARTER

The reverse I-I/2 day trip on the Outrider left 22nd Landing at II:00 am, with nine passengers looking forward to the adventure promised by chartermaster Calico Bob Selvin. Tackle was being rigged in accordance with the instructions by the captain for fishing at San Clemente Island. While at the bait receiver, Captain Oby received breaking information and called an audible, switching the trip instead to Santa Barbara Island. New instructions were to rig up for fly-lining with 20 to 25 fluorocarbon top shots and I/O hooks for the lively sardines that filled the bait tanks.

After making the approximately five hour run in calm waters to the island, we were ready for action. Although they were signs of game fish, none were willing to cooperate. A move to deeper waters allowed the passengers to capture quality reds and other rockfish as the sun went down. A tri-tip and mashed potatoes dinner, with key lime or chocolate mousse pie, capped off a relaxing day on the water, sending all to bed with visions of yellowtail in the morning.

The early predawn hours arrived with eager anglers fishing squid on dropper loop rigs, hoping for yellowtail or white sea bass. With no takers by an hour after sunrise, it was time to enjoy breakfast as the boat looked around for better sign. The next stop resulted in several hookups. Several fish were lost to line breakage on the light line or predation by the marauding sea lions. Persistence paid off for Dave Permut and Chas Schoemaker, with two quality yellowtail evading the protected pinnipeds to hit the deck for the happy anglers.

Norm Weinstock had his morning exercise, being worked by a mystery fish for over 30 minutes. Norm patiently went back and forth along the stern, keeping good form with the rod bent, taking a crank when he could and following his fish. Eventually a giant black sea bass emerged from the depths. Estimated by the crew to weigh between 150 to 175 pounds, it was successfully revived and released.

A move to another rockfish area kept everyone busy with reds, bocaccio, whitefish, sheepshead and other assorted rockfish. Fabio (Bob's trainer and former Mr. LA runner up) had a prize lingcod. With sacks filled, it was time to look around once again.

The Aloha Spirit, Thunderbird and Outrider converged to form a triangle which was circled by a large yellowtail school. The fish were reasonably cooperative with steady action on the fly-lined sardines, although it seemed casualties outnumbered fish on the deck by a good ratio.

Father and son Scott and Mason Cohen had steady action, with 14year-old Mason showing everyone how it was done with his four yellowtail. The final boat


Orchid Martinez-Guevara, of Baja Fishing Convoys has put together a trip for us. She asked me to be the Charter Master and I accepted. Lets make this trip happen!

Dates: October 27- November 1, 2019 (6-Day trip with 4 days of fishing)

Cost \$2095 per person. Includes 4 days of fishing 7AM - 3PM. Lodging in new, well appointed, beachfront cabins. Daily continental breakfast, boat lunch. Dinners are at the restaurant. They will prepare your catch! Ceviche, tacos, a la parilla...any way you want it. Your choice of a great menu...not included in the cost, but the cost is very reasonable. Plenty of beer, etc. Last time I was there they made the most fabulous ceviche, fish tacos, lobster, shrimp dinner.. They run a tab for each person.

Fish processing is additional. \$2 per pound finished product vacuum sealed and frozen.

Transportation: We will fly out of Tijuana Airport. Park on the U.S. side, walk over the pedestrian (CBX) bridge and check-in. Orchid can assist us in purchasing those CBX passes ahead of time so we don't wait in line. We fly to Guerrero Negro and are driven to La Bocana. For those of you who went to Cedros last year, the trip is on the same plane as the one we took to Cedros. Seats 13 passengers. Our group will be a group of 12. Orchid will accompany us. The drive to La Bocana is about 2.5 hours. This has improved from last year's drive time of 7 hours each way. And not to forget, this new flight out of Tijuana will require NO driving across the border on the way back!



Baggage: Allowance of 3 rods at no additional fee. Weight limit going is 50 pounds free. Returning same basic limit with an allowance of up to a total 70 pounds. Anything over 50 is an additional charge. Pack light.

La Bocana is a co-operative fishing community on the Pacific side of the Baja Peninsula. It is an area frequently fished by the San Diego long range boats. They have in-shore and off-shore fishing. Estuary fishing is also available for those that enjoy fly-fishing or fishing for smaller species. There are Gulf and Broom Tail Grouper. Great fish. Other fish to catch are wahoo, tuna, dorado, yellowtail, sierra, bonito, sheeps head, white sea bass, black sea bass, silver curvina, spotties, triggerfish, even bottom fish! Calico fishing here is among the best there is in the Baja Peninsula! Some guys have been known to catch over 18 different species at La Bocana.




