MINING GEMS FROM THE CHUMLINE ARCHIVES

Our memory is a more perfect world than the universe of corona virus lockdown: it can give back to life people and events for which we can be grateful. Applying this adage – which I just made up – to the Chumline Archives, I found lots of items that astonish, amuse, and rekindle our admiration for the members, activities, and fishing adventures associated with the LARRC. Here are some items of note from 2002 – 2004.



What every fisherman wants for Christmas - a 314-lb Tuna

A biographical sketch by Jim Carlisle in the December 2002 issue included this picture of the massive yellowfin tuna he caught in late December on a chunk at San Benedicto's lunker hole on one of his many memorable long-range trips!

A joke was included in most of the issues. Some of these were long winded and fell flat but here is one - courtesy of Larry Brown - from the November 2002 issue that is wryly humorous and as relevant in our current world:

A couple goes on vacation to a fishing resort in northern Minnesota. The husband likes to fish at the crack of dawn. The wife likes to read. One morning the husband returns after several hours of fishing and decides to take a nap. Although not familiar with the lake, the wife decides to take the boat out. She motors out a short distance, an-

chor, and continues to read her book. Along comes a game warden in his boat. He pulls up alongside the woman and says, "Good morning, Ma'am, what are you doing?" "Reading a book," she replies, (thinking "isn't it obvious?")

"You're in a restricted fishing area," he informs her. "I'm sorry officer, but I'm not fishing, I'm reading." "Yes, but you have all the equipment. I'll have to take you in and write you up. "If you do that, I'll have to charge you with sexual assault," says the woman. "But I haven't even touched you," says the game warden. "That's true, but you have all the equipment."

Paul Varenchik writes about his most excellent adventure when he took his son Jonny on a 2003 skiff trip on the Qualifier 105. "All in the same day, I saw my first great white shark, used underwater breathing apparatus, and I was the bait! Paul was the lucky winner of the 2019 LARRC Heroes Award raffle at the April board meeting. Paul richly deserves this award; we all know his many contributions to the club. The prize is an all-expenses paid Larry Brown sponsored 7-day trip on the Royal Star. When I emailed him the news he responded, "That's the best news I have heard from a president all year."

In the September 2004 Chumline issue, Steve Simon recounts an incredible fishing tale: "I had the pleasure of being invited to fish the three-week-old yacht owned by Larry Dinovitz, Front Runner, on July 17 - 18th. This was the first tournament entered to fish on this boat. The event was the Channel Islands Mako Tournament.

Met Larry at the boat at 6:00 a.m. and proceeded to the bait dock for ten scoops of bait. Started a chum slick 2.5 miles off Anacapa and Santa Cruz Island at 9:00 a.m. At 4:05 p.m. we get a blind strike on two of our rods. Five minutes later up comes the biggest Mako shark that any of us had ever seen—it took both baits.

Consensus is it was approximately 15 ft. long and weighed about 1500 lbs. We cut one of the lines and started fishing with one rod. A 50SW and 80-lb. test with a 400-lb. steel leader. (I tied the knot—a double San Diego). After two and a half hours of battling this enormous shark we bring it alongside the boat and can't decide whether to gaff it or not. It is now 6:30 p.m. and the weigh-in for the tournament is 8:00 p.m. If we put the fish on board it would still take us 2 hours to get to the weigh-in so we

decided to release it. What a way to christen this fishing machine. The picture I took does not do the fish justice.”

It is the easy and “feel good” way to approach conservation.”

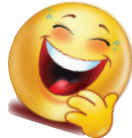

ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

Did you realize that the 2.2 billion corona virus stimulus bill contained 300 million for fisheries? The language includes funds for assistance to charter fishery participants affected by Covid19.

Foremost this month might be the comments received from marine scientist Cynthia Catton dealing with the decline of the bull kelp forestst located near our north coast. She is an associate research scientist with the UC Davis and a former CDFW scientist who believes "big changes" are on the way. The PEW Charitable Trust spoke with her in order to learn more about the dangers to our current ecosystem.

The verbal report noticed sea stars melting in 2013 and 2014 and it was much easier to negotiate the kelp forestst and record the loss of kelp forestst along with red abalone.. Things started to look differently and drove big changes in abalone and urchin feeding behaviour. There appear to be long term changes due to the demise of the bull kelps. Abalone recovery may take a long time and complete recovery is hard to predict.

◆ **MESSAGE TO YOUR SENATORS.** . . Introduced by Senators Udall & Bennett - A resolutiion creating a roadmap to ecosystem reversing the damage already done to our environment. The resolution plans do this by:

- Using our lands and oceans to sequester and store carbon
- Working primarily on areas that are ecologocally meaningful,

to preserve as many important biologically species as possible.

- Recovering and restoring species at risk or extension by pre serving their habitats.
- Stabilizing ecosystems and restoring degraded ecosystems.

◆ **365 DAY FISHING LICENSE MOVING FORWARD.** . . California could be looking forwarded to a true 365 day license this year. Authored by Assembly Member Jim Wood, this new bill would bring a full license for 365 days after date of purchase. CDFW partnered with various NGO to reinstate this program in order to attract new anglers and hunters. To get more updates on access AB 1387.

◆ **CCA CAL AWARD GIVEN TO JOHN BALLOTTI.** . .

The CCA was honored with their annual Hsie conservation award which was given to John Ballotti, their LA Chapter President. After a long army career John did many years of service for Mattel and others, notably service for CCA And LARRC.

◆ **CA DEPT FISH & GAME.** . . According to a new press release a projection by the Ocean Salmon information meeting (Santa Rosa) is somewhat more optimistic than the 2019 forecast. The Sacramento River forecast is better than last year with a projection of 473,200 adult salmon expected.

Double Blood Knot

For connecting **Solid** braid to **Solid or Hollow** braid

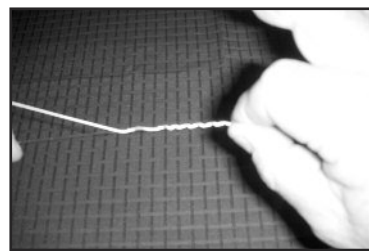
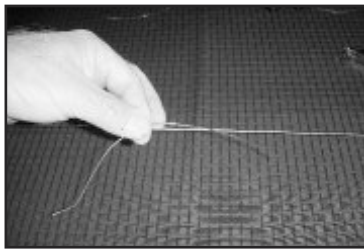

You will occasionally lose some braided line due to a saw off or abrasion from rocks, reef or anchor chain. This knot will allow you to top off your braided line while your reel is on your rod.

There are many knots to accomplish this task: uni-to-uni, surgeons knot, Seaguar knot, bimini and Albright, loop-to-loop and a common single blood knot. But I have found the double blood knot to be the very best balancing strength, stealth and ease and speed of tying.

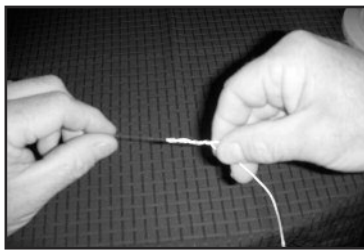
You can also use this knot to connect two hollow spectra lines, but a seamless spliced connection is preferred.

1. Overlay about 20 inches of the two braided lines you are going to connect. These can be the same test and diameter or different test lines. Anchor the main line coming from your reel on your left side so that it is taut. The tautness will aid in wrapping the lines around each other. I anchor the lines under my feet and over my knees, or position the rod and reel in gear so that the line is taut.

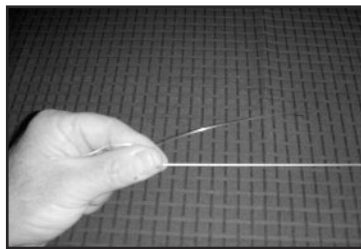


2. With your right fingers, pinch the 2 lines together in the middle, about 10 inches from each end. With your left hand begin wrapping the tag end of braid coming from the new spool of line on your right up and to the left up your main line with 8 - 10 wraps. These wraps should be over and away from your body, and always in the same direction. Do not make these wraps very tight around the anchored (taut) line.

3. Now wrap this same line back down the already wrapped braid, back towards the pinch, 8 - 10 wraps. End this wrap by passing the tag end away from you between the two lines just to the right of the pinch, so that it secures the wraps.

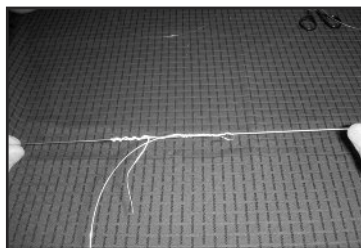
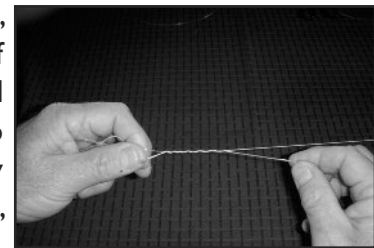


4. Switch hands and now pinch the two lines together with your left hand in the same place. The KEY is to create a loop at the pinch or get a really long pinch, (an inch) to



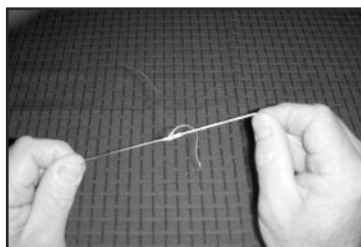
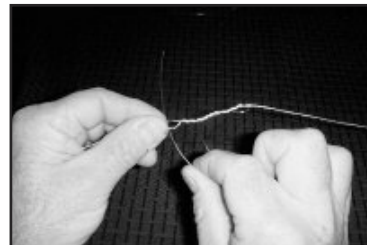
5. With your right hand, wrap the main tag end of braid over the new braided line coming from the spool, up and over to the right, away from your body, 8 - 10 wraps, just like before.

maintain an opening so that you can eventually pass the next tag end back through the loop you will create in the next step. Try to secure the spool of line coming from your right so it is taut.



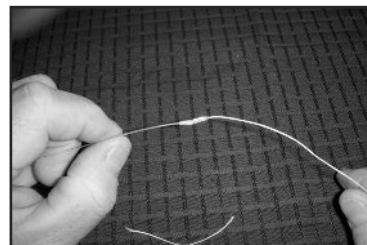
6. Now wrap this same line back down this wrapped section of lines back towards the pinch, 8 - 10 wraps.

7. Pass the tag end through the loop in the opposite direction of the first pass through. You originally passed the first tag end through the loop away from you – so pass this 2nd tag end through the loop towards you.



8. Now lube the lines liberally with your saliva and begin to pull very slowly and the wraps will all come together and slide down into a compact barrel.

9. Pull very, very hard, being careful not to cut your hands or fingers with the sharp braided line. Try using pullers or numb chucks.



10. Trim the lines flush with the knot, as this is a zero slip knot when done correctly.

Note: Use 10 wraps for braids below 100# test and 8 wraps for 100# and higher.

CALLING ALL COOKS

"Canned" Tuna

IF YOU LOVE CANNED TUNA, YOU WILL GO NUTS FOR TUNA OR YELLOWTAIL MADE THIS WAY!

I came across an article suggesting a better way to prepare tuna. I was fresh out of Tuna, so I thought Yellowtail. The method suggested is to poach the fish in olive oil at a LOW temperature. I have made it this way three times. I am sure you will enjoy it.

Here is what you will need and the method.

Equipment: a one-quart sauce pan. Use the smallest pan that will hold the fish. It minimizes the amount of oil needed.

Fish: About a pound either Tuna or Yellowtail cut in chunks about an inch across and less than an inch thick.

Salt and pepper.

Olive oil

Thinly sliced garlic cloves, optional seasoning-to taste.

Place the pot on the stove top and pour in about a half inch of oil, add the garlic. Heat the oil on a low flame for a few

minutes and then reduce the flame to its lowest possible heat. Add a little olive oil, salt and pepper to the fish, toss, and add to the pot. When all the fish is in the pot, add just enough oil to cover. Leave it be for about 15 minutes. Do not let the oil come to a simmer. There should be no bubbles. We want this to poach nice and slow. The fish is done when it flakes. Remove from heat and let it cool.

Decide if you want to keep it in oil or not. Drain? Store in the refrigerator as long as you would keep opened canned tuna. It is tender, moist, delicious and quite simple to prepare. I made a tuna salad with mashed boiled egg, low fat mayo, Dijon mustard and minced sweet onion. It was recommended as the tuna to use in a Salad Niçoises along with chilled boiled potatoes, green beans, etc. Enjoy!

employees, who helped out.

Unlike our annual trip (where we can get along with one volunteer for three or four children), each of these kids required one-on-one attention. In fact, due to their disabilities, many of



have had over the years.

The derby was a huge success. I am certain that our founders would be very proud of the money spent on this wonderful event. It is my hope that this year's derby marks the first of similar events to come.

these children required the assistance of a counselor plus one of our volunteers. Hansen Dam was a perfect location to take these children—we did not have to worry about seasickness and where we were able to keep a closer eye on the special needs of the children.

The lake was closed to the public and was stocked with trout the day before and again shortly prior to the derby.

We could see large schools of trout ranging in size from about 1/2 pound to seven pounds. Quite a sight! But the best sight was seeing each of these children fishing—and catching—and having a terrific day. Most of these children have never had an opportunity to go fishing. I have no doubt that each of them felt the same excitement that our club members

NEW PROGRAM TO HONOR OUR YOUTH FISHING HEROES

Scott Shiffman wins the 7-Day Youth Heroes Fishing trip on the Royal Star

History

Two anglers on one of Larry Brown's recent long range fishing trips were very complimentary about how Larry's raffles supported various youth fishing programs. They were very interested in supporting youth programs and inquired how their corporation may be able to help. They stated the real heroes of these programs were the dedicated and tireless organizers and volunteers who made these trips happen. After a couple more days of epic blue fin tuna and yellowtail fishing they articulated a vision and repeated, "these youth fishing volunteers are the real heroes so let's treat one of them to a long range fishing experience which they may never otherwise have. This will be a reward and become an incentive for others to volunteer their time and energy to noble causes." Larry Brown and these two anglers who wish to remain anonymous agreed to partner this program. They will jointly finance the program and Larry Brown will design and manage it with agreed upon guidelines.

Larry drafted a proposal outlining a program to reward the heroes of youth fishing programs and sent it to our grantors for their approval. After discussing the concept they approved awarding two volunteers from MDRA and LARRC, (one from each organization) to a free trip on the Royal Star 7-day fishing trip sponsored by Larry Brown Youth Fishing Charity Charters. The grantors will pay \$4,000 and Larry Brown's raffles will pay for \$1,200 to fund the program. They specifically want the awards to be available to the hard working rank and file members who volunteer

for these youth fishing programs and hopefully give the award to an individual so he or she may enjoy and experience the joy of long range fishing. They also want to thank all of the volunteers for introducing our youth to healthy outdoor activities and the values of enjoying and stewarding our beautiful outdoors environments.

The free 7-day fishing trip aboard the Royal Star is September 27 – October 4, 2014. The estimated value of each trip exceeds \$2,600 including Mexican permits and fuel surcharges, which are all included in the prize. The lucky winning angler will be responsible for only the gratuity (15-20%) and any on-board beverages or tackle purchases. Winners don't need to be concerned about rods or reels as the Royal Star has excellent loaner gear available.

The Royal Star is famous for its legendary captains, (all owners), the best crew and cuisine in the fleet and the best fish handling and processing in the fleet.

The new program to "Honor Our Youth Fishing Heroes" will recognize the heroes who volunteer their time and effort to take 100's of kids fishing every year. It will also be an incentive to other club members to volunteer their services. Our generous anonymous grantors and Larry will fund the program and Larry Brown will coordinate, manage and provide a full accounting each year of the results.

Congratulations Scott and thanks Larry and your generous friends for your interest in our youth fishing programs and your recognition of our hard working volunteers.

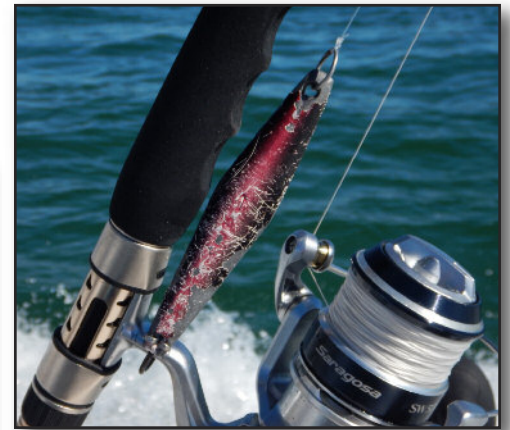
