# **ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS**

- ◆ There's always an ocean conservation campaign that needs strong voices of support. Some people are passionate about sharks or water pollution or ocean access and act accordingly. I'm always drawn to activities that restore our ocean resources and support greater biodiversity and better fishing opportunities for future generations. While the Great Sandy marine Park of Australia is thousands of miles away, their recreational fishermen are facing a crisis at the hands of indiscriminate commercial gillnets that catch all ocean fish as well as marine turtles. Ending destructive commercial netting operations will help restore the the biodiversity of this Marine Park and enhance its cultural values. - ◆ Closer to home, I've been spending my time thinking about little fish, specifically sardine and anchovy. In April, the Pacific Fishery Management Council took steps to again restrict the catch of sardine due to very low levels of estimated biomass. The Council allocated 1,800 mt of sardine to the economically and culturally important live bait fishery, most of which is consumed in Southern California. Importantly, they began to address an inconsistency between science and management. The problem is that we separate sardine into two populations, the northern and southern. However, all the sardine caught off CA, OR and WA are counted as northern stock. The Council tasked its science advisors with reevaluating the current understanding of stock structure for Pacific sardine so that we can take steps to align stock structure with management. Stay tuned for updated info on our favorite little fish.
- ♦ In early May, the Biden Administration released "Conserving and Restoring America the Beautiful," https://www.doi.gov/sites/doi.gov/files/report-conserving-and-restoring-america-the-beautiful-2021.pdf, the long awaited plan for the Thirty-by-Thirty Initiative (30 by 30). This report sets the stage for future efforts to determine what lands will count toward the 30% goal of the Initiative, and

- what opportunities exist to build upon existing conservation programs. Some highlights: 1) the report repeatedly references the role of the hunting and angling community in the United States' history of conservation successes; 2) it specifically calls on stakeholder engagement, including engagement from the hunting and fishing community, to maintain and enhance outdoor recreational access for all Americans, and 3) it emphasizes that its goals are conservation and not "the related but different concept of 'protection' or 'preservation.'" - ♦ Share your fish photos with the Virginia Institute of Marine Sciences (VIMS) Researchers at VIMS are casting a wide net in search of fish photos. Their immediate goal is to use angler snapshots to train software to identify different fish species. Their ultimate goal is to put that artificial intelligence into a RecFish cell phone app, giving anglers a multi-use field guide and scientists a collaborative tool for better management of recreational species. # Rivers give off stealth carbon at night

Emissions made under cover of darkness account for much of the carbon flux from flowing waters.

Rivers and streams might be giving off more carbon dioxide than had previously been thought — because they're doing it at night when nobody had been looking.

Flowing waters are an important source of carbon to the atmosphere, but researchers haven't had a good handle on how much carbon rivers emit. That's in part because a river's carbon emissions vary greatly over a 24-hour period, and scientists typically collect samples of river water only during the day — meaning they miss carbon fluxes at night.

Lluís Gómez-Gener at the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Lausanne, Gerard Rocher-Ros at Umeå University in Sweden and their colleagues analysed round-the-clock data gathered over the past few years by sensors in 66 rivers around the world. The sensors indicated that, on average, rivers emitted 27% more carbon dioxide at night than during the day.

The authors estimate that, globally, carbon emissions from rivers are roughly 35% higher than the previous estimates that were based on only daytime sampling.

# Gray Light on the Gray Light

If there is such a thing as "O Dark 30", it sure seemed like it as our 4 AM departure from CISCO's Landing in Oxnard on board Shawn Steward's 6-packed Gray Light proved it. The boat was taking on bait as we climbed aboard for our quick trip (at 18 knots) to Santa Cruz Island for a day of inshore fishing. On board beside the author was club members Andy MacDonald, Steve Simon, and Joel Steinman. Before we started our day chasing calico bass, Captain Steward wanted to try our luck catching yellowtail that have been hanging around the Blue Banks area of the island. Arriving in the gray light, he immediately metered yellowtail. Using fresh dead

dropper loop, we would stand by the rail and drop whenever he metered fish. No joy and off we were in search of more fish. After about the 3rd or 4th metered spot my Tranx 500 reel and Terez 40-80-pound rod went heavy and after a decent fight a quality 19.5-pound yellowtail came aboard. The pandemic punishment was over for me! With spirits high we continued the search and drop technique looking for more willing biters. Unfortunately, none were to be found. The rest of the day was spent in shallow water looking for spring calico bass. We found sheepshead, johnny bass, and lots of white fish, but calicos would not cooperate. The ride back to the dock was amazingly quick. The boat fishes six, but four is the perfect number. Equipped with a head and inside seating the Gray Light is a comfortable boat that will see many more gray lights.

## Diamonds in the Valley

One of my favorite sayings is "Don't take the trip if you don't enjoy the journey". This philosophy was put to the test as the author, club members Chas Schoemaker and Dave Permut ventured to Hemet's Diamond Valley Lake in pursuit of large mouth bass and whatever else would bite. As luck (bad) would have it, a cold front passed thru turning a sunny 85-degree Tuesday into a stormy 55-degree fishing day on Thursday. We boarded guide Mark Franco's pontoon boat at 7 AM and took off from the marina into a stiff breeze comforted by the five layers of clothing making us look like the Michelin men. The good news was that the wind backed off by mid-morning and the temperature hovered at a comfortable 65

degrees. The bad news was the rapid drop in water temperature put the fish off their bite making for a long day of casting without results. One nice 4-pound 14-ounce bucket mouth inhaled my seinko tied to a 6 pound test fluorocarbon leader, put up a good fight and was brought to the net. Two other bass were landed by Chaz and Dave had a quick release at the boat of a quality fish. That is not much to show for three guys constantly casting for five hours. But hey, it's the journey not the destination that is important, right? Would I return? Absolutely. The lake offers the opportunity to catch largemouth bass, strippers, trout, blue gills, and catfish depending on the season. Pontoon boat fishing is comfortable and able to reach all areas of the lake. I am looking forward to more journeys in the future.




# Veterans' Fishing Trip - "Game Changer" - April 14, 2021
