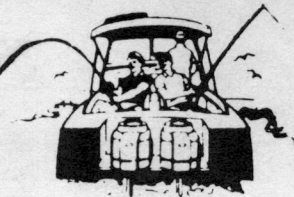

## THE HEIMLICH MANEUVER

Each year over 3,000 Americans choke to death. It is the sixth leading cause of accidental death in the overall population and the leading cause of accidental death among children.

The Heimlich Maneuver was developed by Henry Heimlich, M. D., Professor of Clinical Advanced Sciences, Xavier University, Cincinnati, Ohio. It is a very effective and safe procedure that can be performed by anyone during an emergency situation when there is no time to call for trained medical assistance.

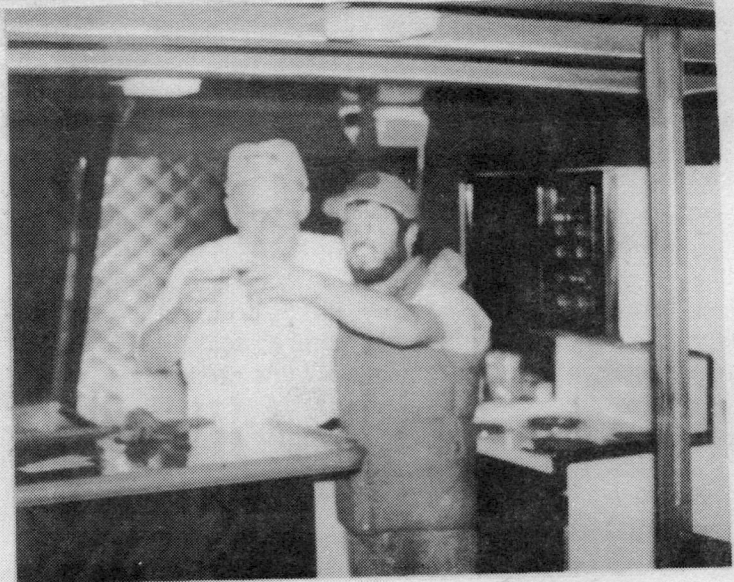
In one instance a mother was able to save her 9-month infant after reading a short description of the Heimlich Maneuver in a women's magazine. In another case, a blind man who learned the Maneuver from a "talking book", was able to save his wife after being alerted to the crisis.

The Heimlich Maneuver will be explained and demonstrated to our members by Dr. Herman Epstein during our dinner-meeting on Monday, June 25. You can teach it to your family and friends after you have attended this meeting and have learned the simple technique.

## THE LARRC FOUNDATION

When the LARRC Foundation was founded in 1951, the trustees, Myron Glauber, Max Fenmore and Bob Thompson transferred \$223.73 into the trust account to pay for the first fishing trip for underprivileged boys. Many more boys and many more dollars have been spent on the 27 trips that have been conducted since. The trip this year for about 250 kids will cost over \$4,000, including some athletic equipment sent to the homes.

In addition, many thousands of dollars have been contributed for kelp restoration and other marine improvement activities. At present, we are involved in another kelp improvement and research project being conducted by USC. We have co-sponsored this project with the L.A. County Fish & Game Commission at a cost of \$4,000. A full report will be forthcoming when it is completed.

# The Best Knots

## The Palomar Knot

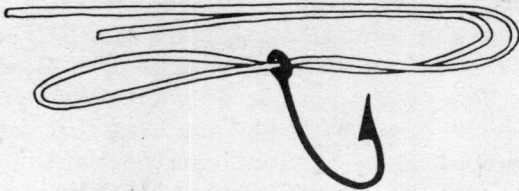


FIG. 1: Loop 3 or 4 inches of line end and pass loop through hook eye—short end must not pass through eye.

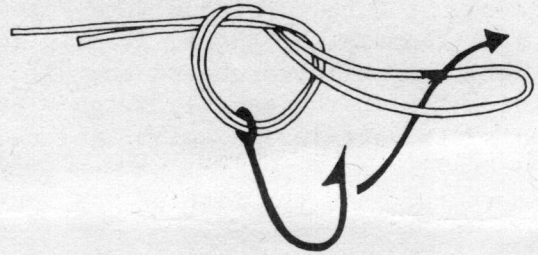


FIG. 2: Holding line and hook eye between thumb and finger, grasp loop with free hand and thread an overhand knot.



FIG. 3: Pass hook through loop and draw line while guiding loop over top of hook eye.

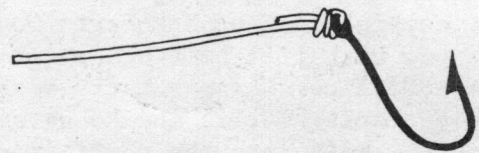


FIG. 4: Pull short end of line to tighten knot snugly and trim short end to about  $\frac{1}{8}$ " to  $\frac{1}{4}$ ".

## Double Improved Clinch Knot



FIG. 1: Double 6 or 8 inches of your line and pass looped end half way through eye.



FIG. 2: Twist looped end 4 to 6 turns around main line (the easiest method is to hold both ends of line between thumb and index finger of one hand and roll hook shaft between thumb and finger of the other hand).



FIG. 3: Pass looped end of line through loop which hook is strung . . . then back up through big loop spanning knot.



FIG. 4: Pull up knot slowly until tight. Then trim both looped end near hook and single end at top of knot near main line.
