ANNUAL KIDS TRIP ABOARD THE "ANNIE B" By Henry Levy

Eppy-Lippey-Balzac Team Scores Again

With a full complement of deck hands to assist, the Annual Kids Trip was beautifully orchestrated aboard the new barge "Annie B" off Belmont Pier. Representing a number of homes and boys and girl clubs (listed elsewhere) about 300 youngsters and their counsellors were given the opportunity to learn the skill and pleasure of ocean fishing on a modern commodious barge with lovely facilities and a very cooperative crew. There was an abundance of fruit, candy, soda, milk, ice cream, hamburgers and hot dogs. Each of the kids received radios, caps, ball-point pens and other goodies.

About 300 of the Lippey caps were distributed to the children. The pens were contributed by Norm Epstein and the special prizes (watches and trophies) were contributed by Sol Shalevitz. Commodore Epstein handled the logistics with aplomb, learned by years of experience. Dave Lippey was responsible for the donation of the rods and reels by Diawa. Russ Izor came early and gave his valuable assistance in manning tackle assembly.

Jimmy Port and Leo Pearlston performed admirably in the galley. Because of the great number of no shows last year, Eppy prevailed upon more deckhands to appear this year but they were really not needed. Some of them devoted most of their time to the children and grandchildren that were with them. Some of the others just ate and ate and ate.

Foundation Chairman Bill Pearlman rushed around the barge to break up the "minyons" while Marv Scheinbaum was cheer leader. Marv Epstein was again the official photographer, competing with the pro from the Long Beach Telegram (see the Telegram story inside). Brody and Susman surprised all by their steady performance with the kids. Others who deserve special mention are Pete Maureaux, Marilyn Landsem and Coach Ace Goldhloom. Susan Levitt helped with the gifts and so did her dad, Dr. Harry. Ben Varon and Al Cadis did their stint and so did many others too numerous to mention.

It was a long day for Sey Rimland and Bill Vogel who arrived at Canter's 5:00 AM to transport the food to the barge and then helped with the kids the entire day. Shelly Balzac did likewise, trucking the tackle, gifts and prizes that was stored in his garage.

The morning group had great luck with kingfish, needlefish, halibut and bonito. Some short halibut and barracuda were returned unhurt. The afternoon group were less lucky when the wind came up and the fishing went down. It was admitted by most that the barge is the only way to go.

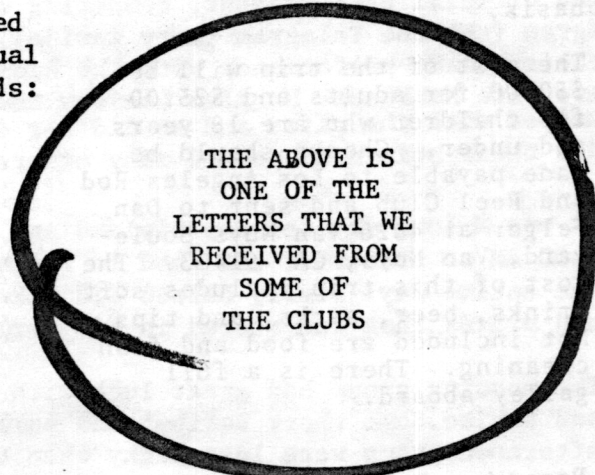

FAMILY FISHING TRIP

The annual Los Angeles Rod and Reel Club's Family Fishing Trip will be on September 8th aboard the Condor from Sea Landing in Santa Barbara.

Fishing format will be somewhat similar to last year; i.e., we will fish either Santa Rosa Flats or San Miguel for bass and various shallow water rock fish.

For those of you who participated last year, I am sure you will remember the great fun we had at San Miguel Island when Johnny Bass, Chuckle Heads and Rock Fish were swarming around the boat like Calico Bass, and every person aboard, including 3½ year old Will Zuckerman, caught the 15 fish limit.

Our departure time will be approximately 3:00 a.m. and we expect to return sometime between 3:00 and 5:00 p.m.

Since the Condor has sleeping accommodations for 46, that will be our limit. Reservations are on a first-come, first-serve basis.

The cost of the trip will be \$50.00 for adults and \$25.00 for children who are 18 years and under. Hook, line and sinker fun

An army of fisherkids reel the line

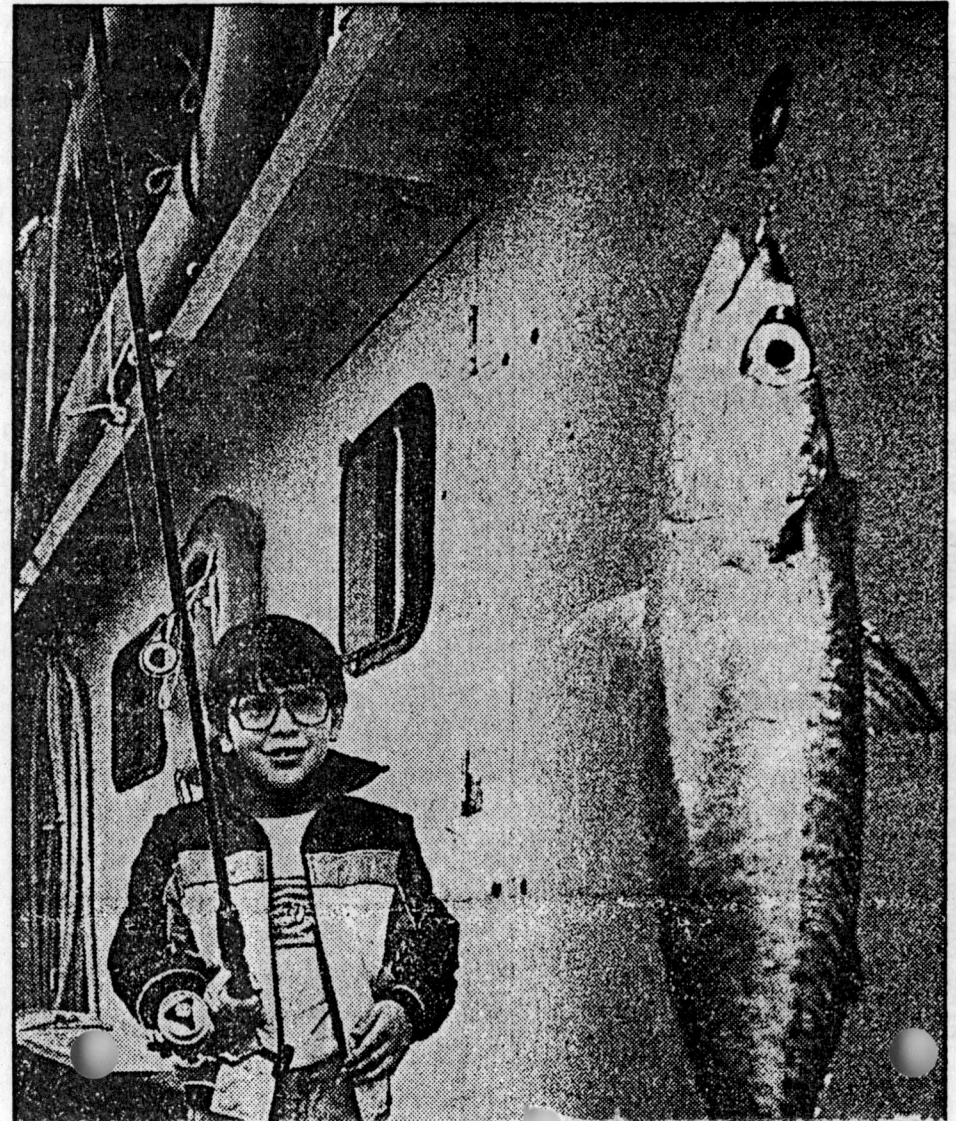
It looked like a host of child labor laws were being broken Monday morning at Belmont Pier in Long Beach.

A procession of children and adolescents loaded boxes of oranges, bananas, doughnuts, soft drinks, hamburgers and hot dogs onto a boat bound for Annie's Barge, enough food to feed 150-plus fishermen who would be spending the morning out by the breakwater.

But the youths actually were all from orphanages or groups that serve underprivileged children, and they were about to set out on an adventure courtesy of a local fishing group.

The fishermen they were feeding were themselves. For the rest of the morning, Annie's Barge would be theirs, courtesy of the Los Angeles Rod and Reel Club.

For 34 years, the club has been taking children on fishing expeditions in various spots along the Southern California coast, and in that time "we've never had a bad kid," said Bill Pearlman, board chairman of the club's Boys' Foundation. "We never had a



problem with any of them.

The club took 155 people out to the barge Monday morning. They came from Vista del Mar Child Care Center, McKinley Home for Boys in Woodland Hills, the Eastside and San Fernando Boys' Clubs and the Mexican Sports Confederation.

They would return to shore that afternoon, when a similar number of children from five other youth groups would get their chance to fish.

"Nobody will leave here without a handful of something," Pearlman said as he stood on a boat laden with children and supplies. "You see enough food on here to feed seven armies."

Also on deck were 20 watches, four cameras and 25 fresh water fishing rods to be given away at the end of the day, plus enough transistor radios for every child on board.

But the youths who clambered onto the barge shortly after 7 a.m. were less interested in food or prizes than in getting some fishing tips.

As soon as the members of the Rod and Reel Club had opened up the boxes of professional-looking spinning rods and fitted them with reels, they found themselves pestered for advice, such as where to put a sinker.

"Put 'em about 15 to 18 inches up the line," suggested one club member.

"Should we use the whole fish or half (as bait)?"

"Use the whole fish."

Within minutes, fish were being caught in a steady stream.

Collette Klein, 13, was told that the green-backed fish she had hauled in was a mackerel.

"Can you eat them?" she asked. She

was assured that she could.

At the other end of the barge, 6-year-old Jason Rogers was catching his very first fish. It was "hard to pull in," he said, but now that it lay at his feet, he was standing on tiptoes, peering over the railing in search of his second catch.

John Campanella — "everybody calls me J.C., it's easier" — a 31-year-old houseparent at the Vista del Mar center, joked that the youths really enjoy the fishing excursions "if they can get over the motion sickness."

"These guys at the Rod and Reel Club know how to fish. They really do," he said. Their assistance on past excursions helped Campanella's young charges catch several sea bass weighing nearly 10 pounds, plus a barracuda nearly a yard long.

When they return to the center with their fish, the employees "filet them right when we get there and usually fry them that night," he said.

This story appeared in the Long Beach PRESS TELEGRAM on June 26.

The reporter told us that he was very much surprised to see the great amount of effort that our members devoted to make these kids happy....Ed

LATE ALBACORE REPORT

Maurice Levy, Jr phoned a late report about a 4-day albacore trip on the "Brothers Four" that landed with 150 fish that could not be removed from the boat because the cannery refused to take them. It appears like they are unable to process the great amount of longfins that are being landed each day. And the fish that are being caught on the one-day boats without refrigeration are also being refused. Maurice states that many of these fish are abandoned on the dock.

Trolling on the return trip at fairly high speed, they hooked into a big-eye tuna which they fought for 2 1/2 hours. Three of the men took turns three times to bring the monster to the boat when the line parted. They estimated the fish to weigh at lease 300 lbs.

Besides Maurice, the other players were Phil Greenfield, Max Fenmore, Joe Burg, Bart Fenmore and his son Eric. Maurice reports that the "Brothers Four" has excellent facilities and a fine crew . He recommends it highly.

LAST CLUB CHARTER AT SANTA BARBARA

Anglers who fished the Felger club charters aboard the Pacifica finished their season aboard the Sea Hawk in Santa Barbara. Thirty-six lunger bass were caught by 14 players with some of them blanked completely. Ditlove was the winner with 6 lunkers that gave him 40 lbs of fish. He managed to do it with a light 8# outfit fishing the side of the boat. He caught the first, the largest and the most and had time to take a nap in between.

Felger busted his britches with iron, scampi and hooked bait to get some fish. Brody stuck with bait fishing to put some in his sack. The brown bait bait, caught by the anglers the previous night, were primarily responsible for the fish that were landed. Lippey got several keepers and lost a lunger near the boat, thanks to the "help" from the deck-hand. Dr. Epstein continues with his thing on the bow and landed a half-limit. Al Cadis caught fish despite the absence of Ben Varon to coach him. The LARRC President did not distinguish himself with any great catch but did work very hard at it. Jackman sneaked a couple on board but Alan Fields seemed to have more fun than anyone else on board.

On disembarking, The Past President slated to run the Sea Hawk charters henceforth, Marv Resnick, stepped off the boat with tackle box in hand and a glaze in his eyes as he dreamed about the lovely youngster he was going home to. He did not see the last step and fell forward in a horrible second that left his buddies watching futiley. Someone fished the box out of the sea (they are not watertight) and Marv was helped up with a painful knee injury. He was treated successfully and was walking the next day without a limp. From the time he was 18 until he was married he spent the years in cabarets and road shows. For a spouse he selected a lovely, bright and beautiful young Jewish lass from a very religious family. It was no wonder that her parents looked askance at her selection of a Jewish boy who followed music as a profession.

Our hero would not be dissuaded from acquiring the most beautiful part of his life so he gave up his musical career and became a shoe salesman. He also learned window display and became so proficient that he transferred his musical artistry to the art of display. This great change was primarily due to his great love for his endearing wife and his children. After the birth of their first child, the Jackmans moved to Bakersfield where his brothers-in-law had a store and Rena's parents were located.

Syd promptly landed a job as window trimmer but his musical talents were soon reactivated and he started leading orchestras and performing on the piano for various affairs. This sideline provided a welcome increase in his income. He continued in the shoe business but was offered positions by the musicians union as his reputation became more widely known. With this background he formed his own very successful business to incorporate his artistic ability and his wizardry at display advertising.

Sam Harris, one of his closest friends, joined him in his new-found hobby of big game fishing in Mexico. Syd also became involved in philanthropy as a member of the "Medallions" group, a prestigious organization working for Mt. Sinai Hospital. He was elected chairman of this group and worked assiduously for the hospital, particularly for the intensive care unit. Those years of activity had to be stopped when his dear wife suffered a stroke. He was then elected to life membership for his devoted efforts. For more than seven years until her departure, Syd devoted his entire time and energies to support and care for his beloved wife, having turned his most successful business to his children.

Syd has been a member of LARRC for many years and assisted his buddy Sam Stone when he was president in 1964. Syd also acted as charter master for week long trips on the "Malibu". This 90-ft yacht was the final luxury in Baja fishing. The yacht was elegantly appointed and the treatment was first cabin. The fishing was done from skiffs. A book could be written about these trips with his close buddies Sam Stone, Eppy Epstein etc. An additional book can be written about the practical jokes by all of them.

Syd concluded the interview with "I hope the good Lord will give me a few more years to be with all of my old friends and the guys in the club."
