PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

FISH COUNTS - How Reliable? - The LOS ANGELES TIMES, as well as some other newspapers, publishes the daily catch reports from the various Southern California landings. However, if your decision of whether to go fishing is based on these reports, you had better understand how to interpret them.

Newspapers have deadlines and, therefore, the landings must call in their catch reports no later than 4:00 - 5:00 PM. This means that the landings must get reports from the various boats between 3:00 - 4:00 PM. However, at that hour, not all the fish have been counted (or guessed at) and some of the boats may still be fishing. With this in mind, we can construct a typical reporting situation, as follows:

"Boat Freedom calling 22nd Street Landing. Do you read?"

"22nd Street Landing back to Freedom. Go ahead."

"Freedom back. Our catch is 25 to 30 Yellowtail, 20 to 30 Barracuda, 3 Halibut and about 200 bass. Over."

"22nd Street Landing back to Freedom. We read: 35 Yellowtail; 30 Barracuda; 3 Halibut and about 250 bass. Over."

"Freedom. Roger and out."

Now, multiply the above scenario by the number of boats that the various landings have out and you have the fish count ready to be called in. Right? WRONG!! Sometimes, if the fish count does not look quite right to the landing operators, the thumb goes on the scale and, depending on the landing, you can figure another 10 to 30% markup.

San Diego does it a different way. They will UNDERSTATE the number of anglers so that the catch per angler looks better. Also, during peak Albacore runs, they will understate their best days. Why do they do this? Simple! On hot days, the dock total may be 3,000 - 5,000 fish. If they report these totals, they find that they lose a significant amount of business when the total catch drops down to, say 2,000 fish (although, 2,000 fish per day is nothing to sneeze at!). Therefore, they may report a 5,000-fish day as only a 2,500-2,700-fish day. Further, fish caught on multi-day trips are either not included on the daily reports, or sometimes the catch for the entire multi-day trip is counted in the fish count on the date the boat returns.

A good way to better understand the trend during Albacore season is to call the recorded fish count messages that the various landings put out. (For your information, Fisherman's Landing's number is 213/930-1015.) If you call on a regular basis, you can generally see the pattern and figure out how good fishing really is. The long-range boats usually fish different areas than the 1-to-2-day boats. Therefore, for the most accurate information on the multi-day trips, you will need to contact their personal representatives directly.

You must also be careful of predicating a decision to either go or not to go fishing upon the fact that the landing is not catching a particular species

in large quantities, such as Calico bass. The reason may be that the landing does not have boats that are fishing that particular species on any given day. A good example is Santa Barbara. Although Calico bass is a mainstay for LAR&RC anglers, the majority of the Santa Barbara-based passengers prefer Rock cod. And, if their boats are not fishing Calico bass, Calico bass will not show on the dock totals.

In order to really understand what is going on, the dedicated fisherman must use several sources of information: i.e., daily fish counts that are published in the paper; current sportfishing publications, such as WESTERN OUTDOOR NEWS; recorded daily catch messages; and - don't be bashful - if in doubt, call the landing.

THE CALCUTTA...WITH SOBERING AFTERTHOUGHTS

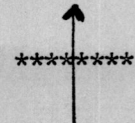
I dunno.

We usually devote about forty-five minutes to the evening's speaker(s) with a period for questions and answers. I think I can promise that you should be out of there by 10:30 P.M..


The average attendance is between fifty and sixty-five members though we would probably have more considering that the program should have more than the usual interest.

The reels need new line & an oiling, I would be willing to do my share but we need more volunteers to do the job properly.

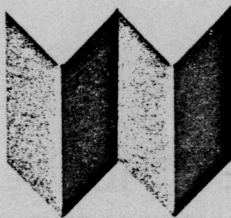
Much credit should go to Eppy and his crew for doing a tremendous job AGAIN.
