The Submarine Rod by Jim Marshall

A few months ago, I sent an article to the *Chum Line* and Penn Tackle Manufacturing Company regarding a rod and reel that my wife, Michi, "caught" last summer. Well, she really didn't catch the gear; she caught a jackpot yellowtail at Catalina that was tangled up with the rod and reel. This letter is a follow up to that letter.

I rebuilt the reel that Michi caught. It was an old Penn 500S. When I took it apart, the spool crumbled in my hands. The only thing holding it together was the line wrapped around it. The corroded spool had expanded and popped the inside end plate rings. I replaced the rings and spool, cleaned up the inside of the reel and replaced the drag washers. Michi now has a "new" reel.

The rod was in more serious need of care than I was capable of giving it. We took the rod into Yo's Custom Rods in Gardena for a little tender loving care. Actually, what it really needed was major surgery! Everyone in the shop stopped and stared when we brought the derelict in. It had barnacles and coral growing on the rod blank. The cork fore grip had long since rotted away. The guides were, of course, rusted through at the welds.

We asked Martin Yoshida to look at the blank to see if it could be salvaged. Every month or so we followed up with Martin. He stripped the rod and discovered that the Sabre blank was still good!

Bobby Platt (Fellowship Award). Like Art Weingart, Bobby was a warm and kind person. He served many years on the Board and was very involved with the Club.

Ted Hammock (Friendship Award). Ted was president of the Club in 1974. He was a regular participant in the Wednesday charters and Club affairs.

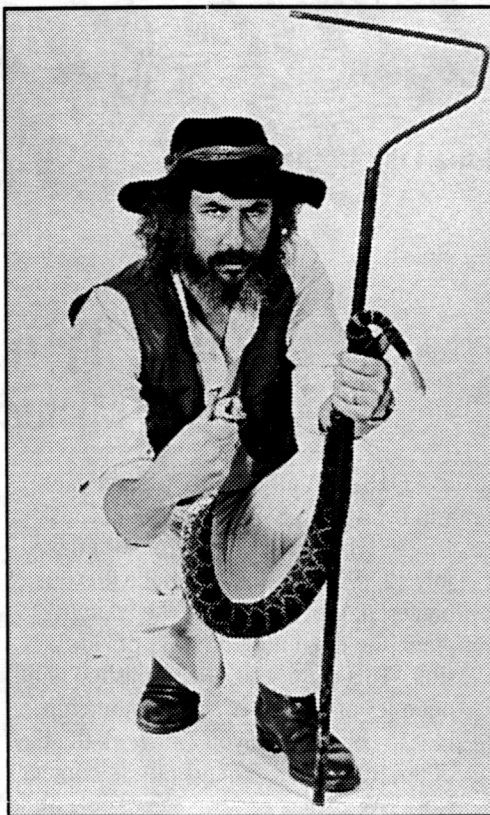

It could be said that Richard Lapidus has an addictive personality. Besides being thoroughly obsessed with saltwater fishing, he will freely admit to being both a snake-aholic and an Earpomaniac.

Over the years Richard's love of snakes and "all creepy things" got him in trouble with his family. "It's true. I never met a snake I didn't like. I'd go on collecting trips and bring home the best specimens. Then I started trading for rare and exotic species. Soon I had 60 snakes in the house and I was breeding them. It got expensive to purchase rodents to feed all of these critters, so I began breeding rats and mice in the garage."

The trouble came from not only having so many reptiles and rodents, but that every once in awhile one would

Eventually, the live snakes gave way to a room full of old west collectibles, including rare photographs and documents from Tombstone.

When Richard is not involved in the real-life business world of running 5 ladies' shoe stores with his brother, Michael, and when he is not fishing, chances are pretty good that he is either writing or doing research for a project on the Earps or Tombstone. His writings and photographs have been published in several books, magazines and old west journals. Most recently his article, "Reptiles in Tombstone" appeared in the August, 1998 issue of True West. For the past 3 years he has been collaborating on a book about the assassination of Wyatt Earp's youngest brother, Warren. That book is scheduled to be published by Talei Publishers, Inc. around July, 1999.

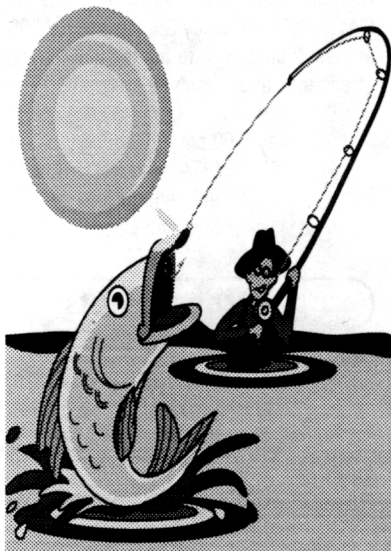
Congratulations to **Matt Alpert**. Matt and bride to be, Melissa, are engaged to be married.

Jewish Santa brings joy to children for 15 years

Surrounded by dozens of excited children tugging at his white beard and cuffs, Arnie Cohen delivered Christmas joy and bits of wisdom Tuesday at the Sylvan Park Children's Center.

Dressed in his own bright red suit, it was Cohen's latest appearance as one of Santa's helpers during a 15-year stint with the Los Angeles Fire Department's Toys for Needy Children Campaign.

Cohen is a practicing Jew who just finished celebrating Hanukkah. But playing Santa is no conflict for the Northridge resident, who first took on the role in 1952 during his military tour of duty in South Korea.

"To me, Santa is not a religious figure," Cohen, 66, said. "He's a person that the kids see as someone special, and to look into their eyes and see how happy they are brings me emotions I can't describe".

And happiness is precisely what was on the menu Tuesday.

"The kids' faces, they just lit up," and Susan Han, psychological coordinator for the Center, which caters to underprivileged children. "Some of the kids were afraid, but they all know the holidays are coming when they get a visit from Santa".

Cohen's military buddies cast him as St. Nick when he was stationed in Guam. They wanted Santa to deliver food and gifts to native children of the region.

"They looked around and I was the only Jewish guy, and they said: Hey, Arnie, you're not doing anything for Christmas, so you're the man," Cohen said. "And that was that."

After leaving the military he continued playing Santa at the market he owned in Echo Park, where the order of the holidays was handing out candy and small gifts to neighborhood children.

Then the Fire Department role came along.

"I wanted to fly a delivery in on a helicopter, and the Fire Department had it, so I started working with them 15 years ago," he said. "It's been

so much fun."

Steve Hofbauer, a Fire Department paramedic who organized Tuesday's visit, said Cohen has been a valuable asset to the Toys for Needy Children campaign, which has been running for more than 20 years.

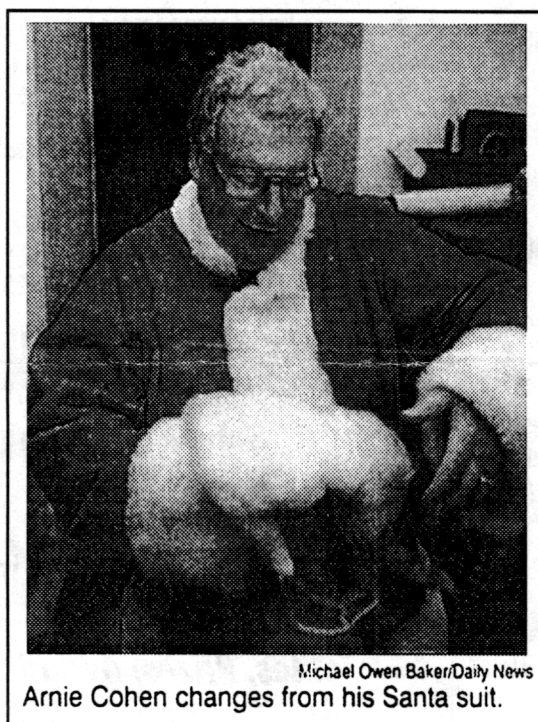
"Sometimes he gets sent out three or four times a day", Hofbauer said. "But he helps us interact with the children at an impressionable age - we tell them not to play with matches and to stop, drop and roll - and give some of them the only Christmas they will really have."

Almost nothing these days will stop Cohen from putting on that suit. He played Santa one year with a broken foot. Last year he had undergone surgery for prostate cancer and had to be helped into a truck. Some time ago he did it right after a hernia operation.

"I should probably be in the Guinness Book of World Records for the amount of times I've been Santa", Cohen said after spending the morning at the Children's Center.

"I know that some kids can't even get to a mall to see Santa, and I might be the only Santa they've seen. That keeps me going," he said.

"I'll keep doing it as long as I'm able."

A Call for Action by Michael Grossman

The Fish and Game Commission is considering closure to all fishing for certain areas of the Channel Islands. Recently, there was a misleading article in the Los Angeles Times which implied this action was imminent. While not imminent, the plan is actively being studied and could happen.

What is so alarming about this proposal is there has been no scientific research done to indicate the need for total closures in order to protect or manage the fishery. What is further alarming about it is that it is couched in terms of a 20% closure on a temporary basis. The 20% of the Channel Island's coast line would of course be the areas that are fished. That would be about 75% to 85% of the fishable areas depending on what figures you use.

Once closures are instituted they will in all likelihood be permanent and grow in size. That is simply the sad history of most government action. (Does anyone recall that the 10% federal excise tax—on such items as fishing tackle—was a 'temporary' tax enacted in the early 1940's to raise revenue for World War II. That 'temporary' tax is still with us.) If they close 20% of the Channel Islands today, it will be 30% in a couple of years, and then it will be the rest of the islands, and then it will be the coast line of the mainland, and on and on until there is nowhere to fish.

We are already paying among the highest sportfishing license fees of any state in the union, and we are one of but a few states that charge a license fee for sportfishing in the ocean. One has to ask why we are being asked to pay more and more for less and less.

The environmentalists and animal rights whackos have seen to it that most public land in California is now closed to hunting. We apparently felt that would not happen to us as fishermen—it is starting now. Those same interest will make a full assault on sportfishing and closures will be the prime method.

Please do not go to sleep on this issue. Please write to the authorities and let it be known that you oppose any closures to sportfishing. Please send letters to your state Senator and Assemblyman and to the following:

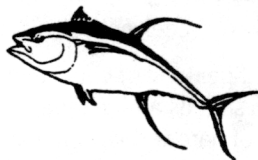

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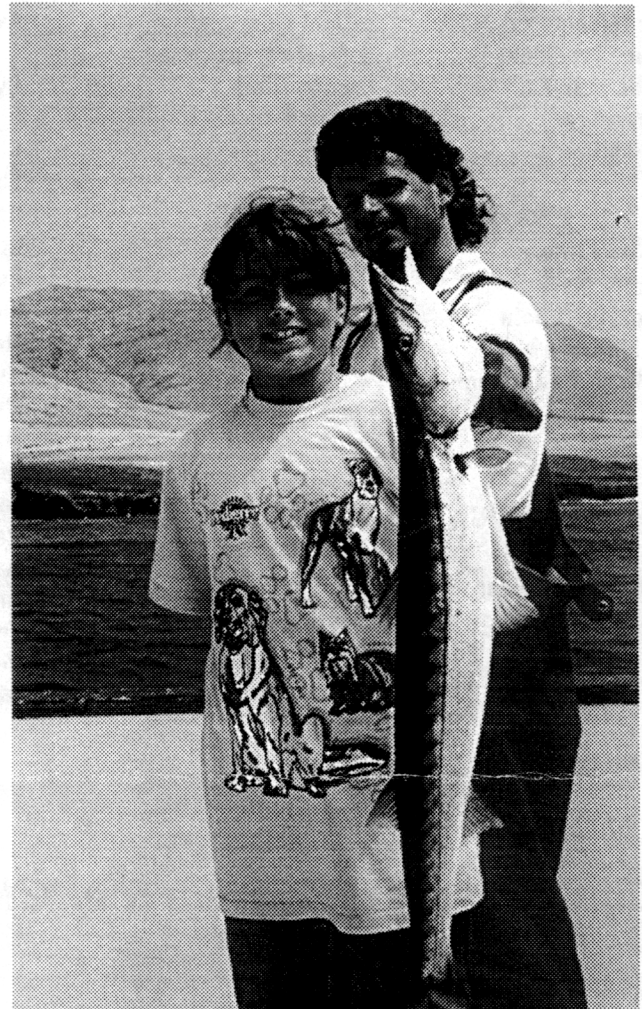
Tackle Tips of the Month

🐟 Scent your plastics! Use various scents to match the color of your tails. Use shrimp flavor for your red crab-like colors and use anchovy or sardine for your fish looking colors. Store them in a plastic zip lock bag.

🐟 Before mounting a reel on a cork tape rod, determine where the reel will be placed and cover that area plus about an inch on each side with plastic electrician's tape. Make at least two layers with the tape, rolling it diagonally. This will help seat the reel and will prevent damage to the cork when the reel clamp is tightened down.
