### 1998 Tuna Fishing Trips

I have tentatively chartered the 65-ft. Patriot for two separate "fish-filled" sport-fishing trips this summer. I will proceed to firm up these charters if I have a favorable response to my letter.

#### July Trip:

**Board:** Thursday evening—July 2nd  
(covers July 4th weekend)

**Return:** Monday evening—July 6th  
(4-day trip)

#### August Trip:

**Board:** Wednesday evening—August 19th

**Return:** Sunday evening—August 23rd  
(4-day trip)

We are scheduled to board at approximately 10 pm for departures and return at approximately 7 pm (depending on proximity of fish and boat schedule).

The charge for a four-day trip for six persons is \$6,800 or \$1,135 per person. A deposit of \$600 is required per scheduled trip. No reservation will be held without a deposit.

All charters are inclusive of yacht, crew, fuel, insurance, Mexican fishing permits, all fishing tackle, bait, fish filleting, meals, snacks, soft drinks, taxes, port and landing fees.

The yacht will depart from and return to H&M Landing, 2801 Emerson Street, San Diego, California. Parking will be available next to the Landing Office. Be sure to have your parking stub validated in the office. It will reduce your parking fee from \$8.00 to \$2.00 per 24-hour period.

We are limited to six passengers so an immediate response is essential.

I will drop any proposed charters that I am unable to fill within the next couple of weeks.

## New Albacore Strategy

The albacore industry is a case in point. Taiwan has introduced a new generation of distant-water albacore freezer longliners that are designed to overcome cost obstacles that have soured many investors on albacore fishing. Able to stay out 12 to 18 months, with ships that service, supply, and offload them at sea, the new class of Taiwanese vessels can financially endure downturns in catch and price that would drive older boats deep into the red, according to **Chris Lightfoot**, an economist who presented findings from a study of the albacore freezer longline fishery.

One sobering finding from that study: albacore prices, adjusted for inflation, have declined steadily for 20 years at an annual rate of 2.2%. Cannery prices for albacore have dropped as purse seine fleets producing other canning fish — mainly skipjack and yellowfin tuna — have radically increased their productivity, while the hook-and-line fleets have not, Lightfoot observed. At the same time, intense competition for market share has unleashed price wars among the big canned tuna brands and private labels, shaving the price paid for raw fish. To widen their economic options, the new Taiwanese longliners “are designed so that they can easily switch between fishing for albacore and frozen sashimi,” Lightfoot reported. “Currently, the frozen sashimi price is fairly low, and it is more profitable to fish for albacore. But the margin is small, and they may switch their effort to frozen sashimi with even quite small changes in the relative price.”

## Asian Woes Felt Here

For producers of other products, finding alternative markets isn't a choice. Asians are the chief consumers, or in rare cases the only buyers, of products such as certain internal animal organs or exotic seafood.

Take sea urchin roe, a pricey delicacy harvested off the coast of North America and sold exclusively to Japanese sushi bars and seafood markets.

When the Japanese were flush with cash in the 1980s, Tokyo's famed Tsukiji Market, a giant seafood auction market, sold 25,000 trays of sea urchin

roe a day. Now, the daily sales of urchin roe at Tsukiji have dropped by more than half.

California diver **Bruce Steele** faces the same risks he always has in braving the capricious currents of the sea urchin bed off the Channel Islands. But the price his sea urchins fetch has dropped by at least a third, thanks to the financial troubles of the Japanese.

This plunge in income has forced many of California's 492 urchin divers to look for work elsewhere, particularly since there is little hope that Japan's ailing economy will turn around soon.

“In tough times, you lose people, friends disappear,” said Steele. “And you just hope you make the cut every year.”

California ranks among the nation's top four seafood producers and exports more than \$80 million worth of fish and shellfish a year, primarily to Asia. **Diane Pleschner**, manager of the California Seafood Council, predicts some of the state's smaller seafood exporters will not make it

through the coming year.

Other fisheries whose prices have been heavily impacted by Asia's woes are sablefish and lobster. That squeeze gets passed on down the line to seafood processors, fishermen and divers, boat and fishing equipment manufacturers.

## El Niño: The good news

News articles have done a good job explaining the El Niño phenomenon and describing its potentially harmful impacts on coastal marine resources.

However, surprising as it may seem, the increased ocean temperatures and higher than normal rainfall predicted to accompany this year's El Niño can benefit the ecosystem, increase scientific knowledge and lead to better management of natural resources.

Occasional environmental events such as El Niño can enhance biodiversity by limiting the population growth of a single species that would be able to compete, and displace, all others under constant conditions.

For example, our rocky coastlines might be covered with mussels and little

else if ocean storms and starfish predators did not open up space for barnacles and other organisms.

High rainfall during El Niño years produces high river outflow to the general benefit of San Francisco Bay aquatic species.

Many Bay species such as shrimp, smelt and flounder increase in abundance during years when rainfall and rivers are high and they suffer populations declines during low-flow years.

Salmon catches are often high three years after El Niño because the extra rain improves the river habitats of the eggs and young stages and high river flows assist salmon migrations through the Delta. Better survival in the rivers and Delta leads to higher populations (and catches) of adults in the ocean.

El Niño may add to scientific knowledge because extreme events provide tests of our understanding of cause-and-effect relationships.

It is, for instance, difficult to determine the effect of water temperature on nesting success of birds at the Farallon Islands if the temperature is fairly constant. If high water temperatures are to blame for poor survival of birds, there is little we can do.

However, if better understanding of El Niño's effects rules out temperature as a cause, then we can look elsewhere perhaps pollution or disease or something else that we can try to remedy.

In order to reliably manage our natural resource, we must have scientific models verified by data covering a wide range of conditions. Difficult choices can be made, with the fact in hand.

El Niño will have positive as well as negative impacts. We can make the best of this opportunity if instead of just talking about the weather, we study it scientifically.

## Eating Fish Protects Heart, Study Finds

Eating fish at least once a week cuts in half the risk of sudden cardiac death in men, according to researchers. In a study in today's Journal of the American Medical Assn., a team of scientists led by **Dr. Christine Albert** of Harvard University's Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston found that substances specific to fish, known as n-3 or omega-3 fatty acids, impart a protective effect on the heart. A diet rich in fish, the study suggests, helps keep the heart's rhythm in sync by preventing clotting and clumping, allowing blood to flow freely. The study of 20,551 male physicians, age 40 to 84, show that eating fish at least once a week was associated with a 52% lower risk of sudden cardiac death.

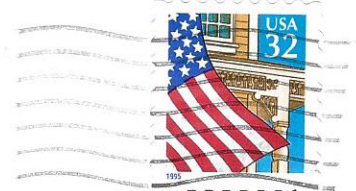
