The LARRC Board has instituted a new rule regarding all club charters. Effective immediately, all players on a club charter will be subject to standards of good conduct and sportsmanship. The Charter Master, along with the boat Captain, have the complete discretion on where to fish and how long to fish and their determination shall not be interfered with by the players. If, in the opinion of the Charter Master, a member gets out of line he will be given a warning. If, after one warning, a player continues to be out of line, he can be prohibited from joining a future charter by the Charter Master.

Charter Data and Policies

1. Departure Time will be 5:00 a.m. from Sea Landing, Santa Barbara. However, some trips may depart as early as 12:00 a.m. These earlier departures will be at the sole discretion of the CHARTER MASTER after consultation with the skipper.
 2. Generally speaking the trips will be planned for local surface calico bass. However, opportunities to fish for exotics, such as white sea bass and yellowtail, will take precedent. Also, several trips will be for light tackle rockfish and/or halibut at Santa Rosa or San Miguel Island. Other trips may be to Point Conception.
 3. Return time will usually be 4:30 - 5:00 p.m., but could be earlier or later depending on fishing conditions and weather, and will be determined by skipper and CHARTER MASTER.
 4. Two days prior to the scheduled charter the six (6) outside bunks and the double bunk will be assigned by the CHARTER MASTER to those seven (7) individuals who committed to the charter the earliest.
 5. The boat will be available for boarding after 9:00 p.m.
 6. Reservations are restricted to club members and their guests up to 30 days prior to trip date. Then they will be open for nonmember participation.
 7. Loads will be limited to 14 adults or 15 people if juniors are participating.
 8. Cost: \$ 75.00 5:00 a.m. departure 2 Day Trips - \$235 2 a.m. departure
 \$ 95.00 2:00 a.m. departure (All meals included)

Return message opens up world of surprise for brother, sister

The world has gotten a little smaller for Shana Ellis, 11, of Northridge and her 13-year-old brother, Ari. The conduit was a long-forgotten message in a bottle sent out to sea in 1990.

Two weeks ago, the youngsters received a manila envelope in the mail containing their original notes and a reply from students at Wan Elementary School on Kikaijima, a tiny island northeast of Okinawa.

"How did it get there from so far away?" Shana said. "It took two years to get there."

The bottle's journey began on a weeklong family cruise to Mexico that began during the Memorial Day weekend. One of the activities for youngsters on the cruise was putting notes in a bottle to throw overboard.

"Me and Shana were the only ones who put in (our) address," Ari said.

Jennifer de la Cruz, spokeswoman for Carnival Cruise Lines,

said that it is not uncommon for the bottles to turn up later.

"You'd be surprised how often this happens," she said.

De la Cruz recalled one boy of Irish descent who sent a bottle overboard on a Caribbean cruise only to have it turn up in Ireland. The boy's family and the family of the person finding the bottle eventually took a cruise together.

Ari figured the bottle with his and his sister's messages didn't have much of a chance of surviving the rigors of the ocean.

"For a few days after we launched it, I was anxious to receive something," Ari said. "I eventually forgot about it."

He still didn't think anything when he got home and found the envelope, although the amount of postage required surprised him.

"It came in the mail with eight postage stamps," he said.

The envelope contained the original notes sent by Ari, his sister and other youngsters on the cruise, letters in Japanese and translated into English from students Tatsuhito Sakura and Chi-

zuka Kubo, a letter in Spanish, two postcards showing a hibiscus flower and coral reef, a travel guide and a map marked to show the location of the island and California.

The bottle was picked up Oct. 29 on Ikagii Beach, the west side of the island, by the vice president of a sugar factory, according to the letters to Ari and his sister. An assistant English teacher translated the cruise ship passengers' notes for the Japanese students.

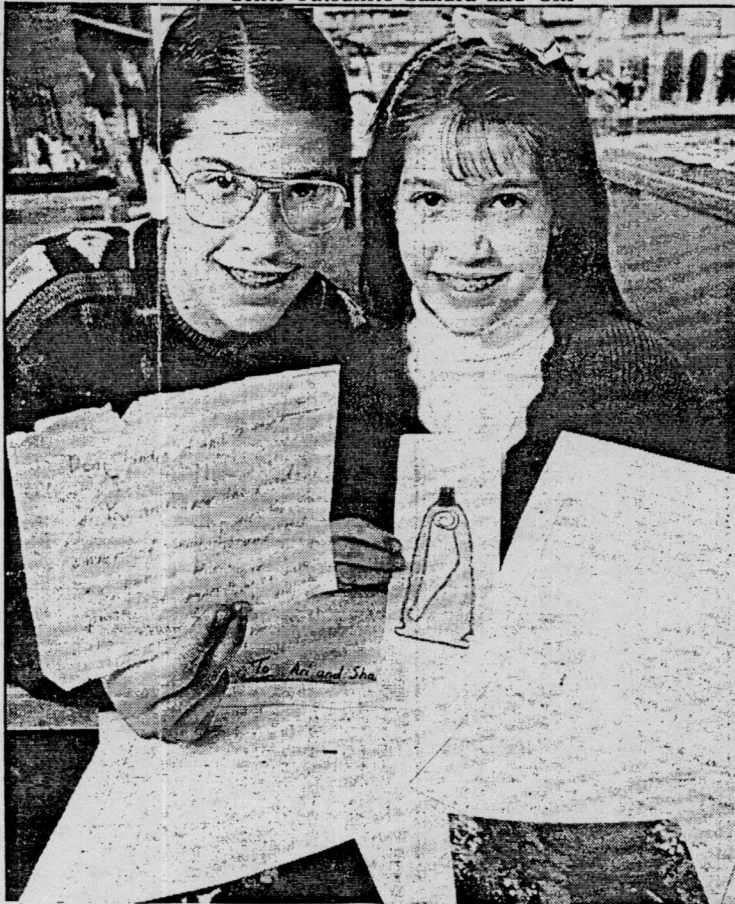
The letters to Ari and his sister provided a description of the tiny island populated by about 9,800 people. The 120-year-old elementary school is the largest on the island, one letter said.

The students talked about their interest and wanted to know what students do for fun in California.

"They call their island a one world peace island," Ari said.

He and his sister since have shared the letters from their new friends with their classmates.

"My social studies teacher said it was amazing," Ari said.

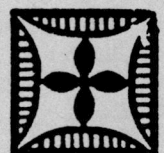
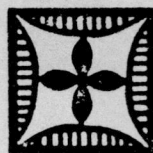
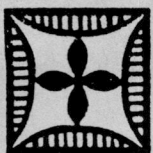
