Fish Poachers Monitored By Satellite:

US authorities will monitor a South Korean company's fishing fleet by satellite for five years under a settlement in the case of the United States vs. the longline fishing vessel Haeng Bok #309. The case filed in US District Court for the Territory of Guam alleged the vessel entered US waters in the western Pacific to poach fish on 22 separate occasions during the past year. The settlement resulted in a \$1 million fine for the vessel owner, Dongah Flour Mills Company Ltd. of South Korea, and the requirement that all 17 of the company's fishing vessels submit to satellite monitoring for a period of five years to prevent any further unlawful fishing, the first such condition required in a settlement on illegal fishing. Bluefin Tuna Enhancement Program

The Fisheries Agency of Japan is continuing with its research in the bluefin tuna stock enhancement program. The objective of this program is to artificially incubate tuna fry and raise them to the juvenile stage before releasing them into the ocean. The private sector is also involved in similar research. Maruha Corporation researchers successfully incubated and hatched bluefin tuna eggs in 1992 and 1993, but have been unable to raise tuna beyond this stage. In the FAJ program wild-caught bluefin tuna are kept in pens and are expected to spawn on reaching 5 years of age in 1995. Meanwhile, the Japanese Overseas Fisheries Corporation Foundation is reported to have successfully incubated and hatched bluefin tuna fry at its joint stock enhancement project in Morocco, the first of its kind to take place outside of Japan. The blue marlin that Tracy Melton took near Madeira, off the northwest coast of Africa, last September 13th was a first, according to the International Game Fish Association. Melton's big blue weighed in at 1,083 pounds—a big fish, but 1,000-pound blue marlin are not all that uncommon. What made Melton's feat remarkable was the fact that he fought the fish for 4 1/2 hours, standing up.

Melton, a custom-tackle dealer from Los Alamitos, California, chose to stand up and fight so he could test some of the 80-pound equipment he sells. After the fish was solidly hooked on a Marlin Magic abalone shell lure, the fight took place over an estimated 10 miles of the open Atlantic.

The Magnuson Flap HR4404

We received this letter from Russ Izor recently. HR4404 is the federal legislation, which is supposed to control our offshore fisheries.

Russ is a respected member of the conservation fraternity, indeed he was given a major award at last years' UASC annual dinner. He is a retired charter boat Captain, tackle businessman and serves on the LARRC Foundation.

Your editor thought a response to this letter would stimulate club members' thinking. We also thought a response from some on with equally gold plated conservation credentials should present the other "side."

Recently, in desperation to fill up space (for which we pay you handsomely to edit, layout, whimper in editorial comments and occasionally censor thoughtful articles like this) I have noticed your constant plea to support HR4404.

HR4404 lost to last years Congress spoke to the issue of amending the Magnuson Act. This act allegedly provided teeth at the Federal level to "chew" on the over exploitation of the nations' marine fisheries.

Over sixty "groups" of concerned sportfishermen have banded together to form "yet another" council to "work" with the congressional representatives whose job it is to see this legislation enacted.

What's wrong with this "noble" experiment?

The damn Magnuson Act is twenty years old and the fishery resources of the nation are in the toilet! In spite of all this time and the cost of twenty years of maintaining seven council offices with all their costs... plus the personal involvement of literally thousands of people who are volunteers, paid only their per diem (for participation etc.) machinations, (for all of you except Dr. Goodman... "an artful or evil scheme") and finally when something of substance was about to occur the Secretary of Commerce could simply veto it and they did and that was that!!!

Magnuson should be allowed to die. It was bad legislation manipulated to allow for no meaningful management and certainly should have been reviewed long long ago. Worse, as is indicated above, the Secretary of Commerce is a hell of a place to put ultimate control of the fisheries because the job of the Dept. of Commerce is to be exploitive, development prone and absolutely the last place you would want any conservation effort to evolve!

That this is not obvious to anyone interested in what is being discussed here leaves me asking where the thinking is in all of these obsessed "groups?" I'll cynically tell you that these groups are funded by people like you and me in functions such as LARR to allow for travel to the nations capitol and spin their respective wheels thinking that they are standing at the ramparts defending the conservation walls...Tain't so. —**Russ Izor**

Dear Sir:

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to respond to Russ Izor's letter concerning the Magnuson Act reauthorization (HR4404).

I am not going to try to defend the record of either Congress or the Commerce Committee with respect to fisheries management. I agree with Russ that they have done a lousy job, but I don't think that means that we must throw in the towel.

The facts of life are these. We have increasingly poorer fishing as a result of overexploitation of fishery resources and habitat degradation. The Magnuson Act is the only statutory authority for dealing with overfishing, and we are trying to broaden it to deal with habitat problems. Congress has chosen the Commerce Department to implement the Act through the National Marine Fisheries Service and the eight regional councils. This is the system as it is, and whether we like it or not, that's not going to change.

In fact, the Magnuson Act is a pretty good law on paper. The problem lies in the failure of successive administrations to use it constructively. Most of the amendments in HR4404 are intended to make it harder for the Secretary of Commerce and the Councils to dodge their responsibilities under the Act by making them more accountable for their actions.

I believe that with the help of strong grass roots support we will be able to sharpen the language dealing with overfishing and get new rules on bycatch, a particularly nettlesome problem in a growing number of fisheries.

Finally, no matter how successful we are with respect to getting HR4404 or any future amendments adopted by Congress, they will never work if, like Russ, you fail to voice your interest in conservation. It takes constant pressure on the government to get anything done. The sixty groups that Russ refers to are the strongest evidence ever that there is a large body of people who give a damn. Thanks to their support, 90 representatives cosponsored 4407 in 1994; and 77 of them were reelected in November. With the help of anglers who are willing to go to bat for more fish, cleaner waters and protected coastal wetlands, we expect to build that number back to 100 or more and to get most of the key provisions in HR4404 into the Act. Unlike Russ, I firmly believe that together we can make a difference.

Finally, if Russ wants to pick up any of my expenses on account of travel to the National Capital or if he'd like to go there on my behalf, I'd be mighty grateful.

Wind, Wind, Wind for Wahoo!

If there's going to be any chance to beat Julian Wolf's Wahoo (115 lb.) you long range guys better listen up. Although this turned out to be a fish caught on 80 lb. test, most of us will be throwing jigs to capture our share of the toothy critters. The best advice is to keep your line as tight as possible and don't stop to set the hook. Try to use a high speed. Most of the time the wahoo will grab the lure sideways (i.e. like a dog grabs a bone) and will start shaking his head. Sharp hooks will give you another advantage and forget about pumping since this gives the fish some slack line. When the "connection" seems solid and the fish wants to run let him run against the bent rod. Constant pressure is the key to successful Wahoo fishing. This from a long range fishing FAX put out by Chuck Garrison.

P.S. Those of you venturing down there the first time. Be extremely cautious grinding back your jigs at high speeds. Wahoo have been known to follow these at high speed and come over the rail. After a Wahoo has been gaffed stand back and let the crew subdue it. Their teeth have been known to lay open a leg or finger in an unguarded moment.



A Few Good Fishermen are Needed

A White SEABASS weekend is being organized by Hubbs Seaworld's new hatchery at Carlsbad, Sportfishing Association of California, AFTCO Mfg. and United Anglers. The object is to catch for breeding purposes a number of white seabass. To acquire the estimated 120 needed fish an expedition is planned March 24-26th. The legal size fish will be transferred to a receiver at Cat Harbor. Private boats and certain passenger sportsfishers will be on hand to help. Mexico Again Allows Revillagigedo Fishing

Saturday, Jan. 21st...The Mexican government today advised US Ambassador James Jones that member vessels of the Sportfishing Association of California (SAC) will receive permit authority to fish the islands of Mexico's Revillagigedo Archipelago, effective immediately. Last June the Revillagigedos were declared a "biosphere reserve," a laudable measure to protect this pristine area and its unique natural resources, and the offshore waters have been off limits to all fishing ever since. Now, with the help of SAC and its' consultant Barnard Thompson, the Mexican Government has determined that hook and line sportfishing will not be detrimental to the reserve and has agreed to issue provisional permits.

Florida Bans Gillnets — Will Others Follow?

It is estimated that the majority of Floridas gillnetters will relocate to Mississippi and Louisiana waters. Mississippi is likely to follow the lead of Texas and Florida and initiate its own restrictions. In Louisiana the group called the Gulf Coast Conservation Assn. is leading a net ban effort.

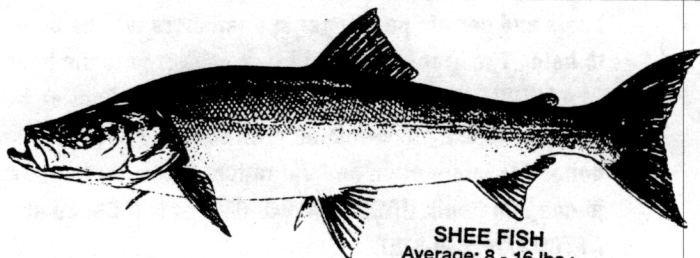

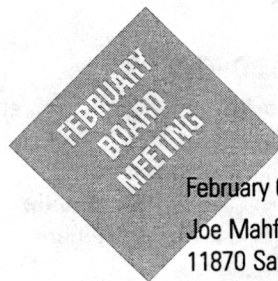

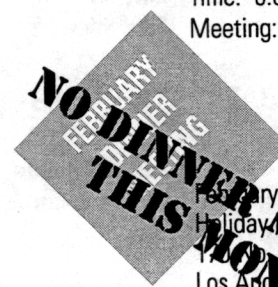

LARRC WEDNESDAY CHARTERS ON THE SEA HAWK LXV

SEA LANDING — SANTA BARBARA

2/1, 2/15, 3/1, 3/29-30*, 4/12, 4/26, 5/10, 5/24, 6/7, 6/21, 7/12, 7/26, 8/9, 8/23, 9/13, 9/27, 10/25, 11/8-9*, 11/22, 12/6 *2-Day trip to San Miguel

- Departure Time will be at 5:00 am, from Sea Landing, Santa Barbara. However, some trips may depart earlier. These earlier departures will be at the sole discretion of the CHARTER MASTER after consultation with the Skipper.
- The trips will be planned for local surface calico bass; however, opportunities to fish for exotics, such as white sea bass and yellowtail, will take precedent. Also, several trips will be for light tackle rock fish and/or halibut at Santa Rosa or San Miguel Island. Other trips may be to Point Conception.
- Return time will usually be 4:30 - 5:00pm, but could be earlier or later depending on fishing conditions and weather, and will be determined by the Skipper.
- Bunks will be on a first come basis and cannot be reserved. However, the CHARTER MASTER may reserve two, large forward bunks for those participants who because of age or physical limitations require special consideration. If you think you qualify please let the CHARTER MASTER know.
- Loads will be limited to 16 adults or 17 people if juniors are participating. The CHARTER MASTER reserves the right to overbook by one.
- Cost: \$75.00 5:00am departure 2-day Trip — \$245 2am departure
 \$95.00 2:00am departure
 Junior members pay 50% (up to 2 per trip). With the uncertainty of fuel costs there may be a fare adjustment.
- Charter price includes trip, bait, soft drinks, beer, icing fish, BREAKFAST AND LUNCH. Not included are tips and fish cleaning. (Please be generous with the tips for the crew).
