A Fish Report

May 29th was the departure date for Miro and Eric's trip to Sitka, Alaska. We traveled with a group of eight from W.El Ley RR Club—who turned out to be pleasant company, especially since some of them brought wives.

We stayed at Kingfisher Lodge which is not really a lodge but several unconnected house-like units. The accommodations were fine especially after Miro got his own room because the fire department came by one night to check on the foundations rattling. (Miro snores!! and he's one up on Dan Felger)

We were picked up at the airport in vans and since Kingfishers were overbooked, stayed at a motel in town. Next morning the vans took us to breakfast at the lodge and then off to go fishing. The first day was fantastic with limits of kings and halibut—two per day—and good size salmon in the range of 20-35 lbs. We fished the salmon on 20-lb. test with Loomis GL2 rods. The halibut were fished on 80-lb. spectra and Shimano TLD 25s. The gear was very nice and our captain/guide excellent. It was explained that his boat, and tackle, were his own and that most of the skippers were working under a seasonal lease arrangement.

The first day was very nice and sunny and many fish were released due to the consistent bites. The next three days saw a very cold north wind blow out of the Alaskan Peninsula with a dress code of at least four layers of clothes, plus a slicker to act as wind breaker, being required in order to keep from freezing. The boat had an enclosed cabin with heater. One day we actually terminated early because it got too rough and mostly thereafter could not get into the open

Judge Irving Hill (1915-1998) A Short Biography

Judge Irving Hill was born on February 6, 1915 in Lincoln, Nebraska. His parents had immigrated to the U.S. from Russia in 1907. Judge Hill's father, Nathan Hill, was a boilermaker by trade and worked as a laborer for the Burlington Railroad. He and an older brother soon started a scrap metal business with a horse and buggy. That business later became Northwestern Metal Co., a sizeable smelter of non-ferrous metals.

At Lincoln High School, from which he graduated in 1932, Judge Hill was valedictorian of his class, the holder of a number of important student offices and a member of the state championship

ocean to fish the large halibut. Miro got one that weighed 98 lbs. and I got one that weighed 18.3 lbs. on 8-lb. string.

Upon arrival at the dock we would be met by the van to take us back to the lodge. Feeding was family-style and food was the meat and potatoes type variety. Sitka is a city of about 8,000 with not much night life. Alaska Airlines had great service with no baggage or boxes of filets lost. Kingfishers filets up to two boxes (about 55 lbs) in vacuum seals for free and the boxes are insulated to keep the frozen fish that way for 24 hours. My past experiences in Alaska have been to more isolated lodges where you'd fly in by float plane.

debating team. That team finished second in the national debate competition. While in high school, Hill was employed as a radio announcer after school hours and during vacation months, on radio station KFOR, Lincoln.

In his late teens, Hill won an international oratorical contest of the A.Z.A., the junior order of B'nai B'rith. His winning oration on the subject of "What It Means to be a Jew" was broadcast on a national radio network. Judge Hill was thereafter elected as the International President of the A.Z.A. and, in behalf of the organization, toured U.S. and Canadian cities, speaking at various synagogues, community meetings and conventions.

Judge Hill was a student at the University of Nebraska from 1932 to 1936. He became the outstanding student leader on the campus, heading several important campus organizations culminating in his election as President of Student Government, equivalent to President of the Student Body. He was elected to membership in Phi Beta Kappa in 1936. In 1936 and 1937, he was named the State's sole nominee for a Rhodes Scholarship. Later in life Judge Hill received the University of Nebraska's Alumni Achievement Award for distinguished public service. He was also named by Nebraska's Governor as an "Admiral of the Nebraska Navy."

At the University of Nebraska, Judge Hill commenced an acting career which he pursued for many years, as an amateur and later as a professional.

Judge Hill entered Harvard Law

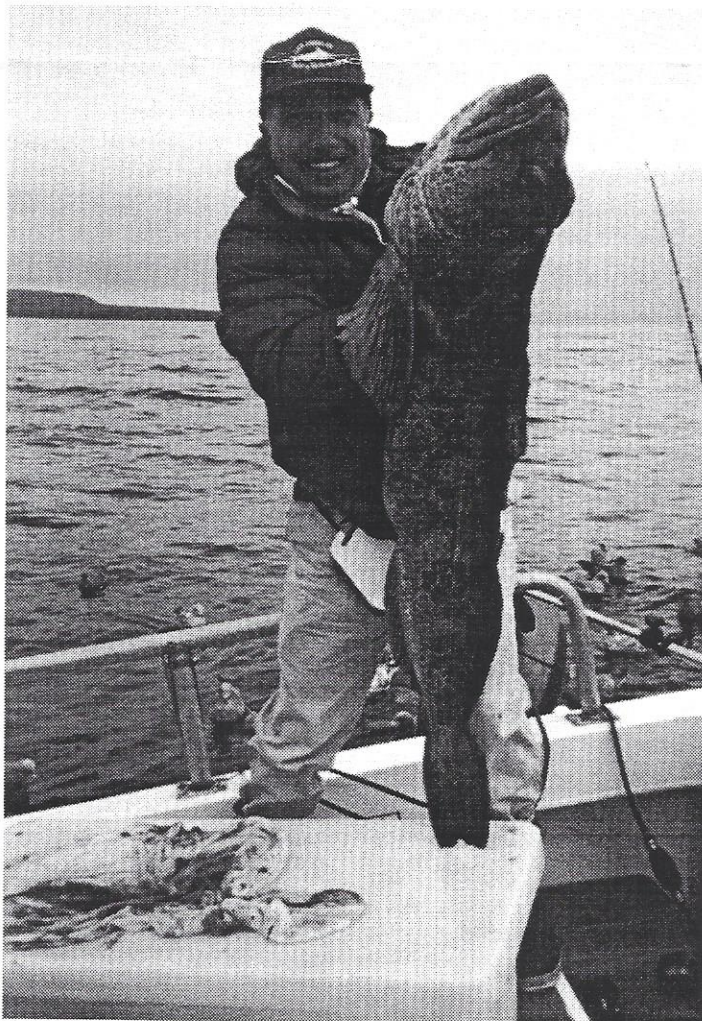

1998 Tuna Fishing Trips

I have tentatively chartered the 65-ft. Patriot for two separate "fish-filled" sport-fishing trips this summer. I will proceed to firm up these charters if I have a favorable response to my letter.

July Trip:

Board: Thursday evening—July 2nd

Friday—July 3rd (weekend)

Return: Monday evening—July 6th

(4-day trip)

August Trip:

Board: Wednesday evening—August 19th

We are scheduled to board at approximately 10 pm for departures and return at approximately 7 pm (depending on proximity of fish and boat schedule).

The charge for a four-day trip for six persons is \$6,800 or \$1135 per person. A deposit of \$600 is required per scheduled trip. No reservation will be held without a deposit.

All charters are inclusive of yacht, crew, fuel, insurance, Mexican fishing permits, all fishing tackle, bait, fish filleting, meals, snacks, soft drinks, taxes, port and landing fees.

The yacht will depart from and return to H&M Landing, 2801 Emerson Street, San Diego, California. Parking will be available next to the Landing Office. Be sure to have your parking stub validated in the office. It will reduce your parking fee from \$8.00 to \$2.00 per 24-hour period.

We are limited to six passengers so an immediate response is essential.

I will drop any proposed charters that I am unable to fill within the next couple of weeks.

JUDGE HILL

School in 1936 and graduated cum laude in 1939. He was named an Editor of the Harvard Law Review and was elected Marshall (president) of his graduating class. The day after graduation, Judge Hill married his college sweetheart, Maydee Taylor.

Desiring to be a part of President Roosevelt's New Deal, Hill joined the U.S. Department of Justice in Washington D.C., following his law school graduation. He served in several capacities in the Antitrust and Criminal Divisions of the Justice Department, and was named Special Assistant to Attorney's General Tom C. Clarke and Francis Biddle.

Between stints in the Justice Department in Washington, the Hills moved to Portland, Oregon where Judge Hill became Assistant General Counsel of the Bonneville Power Administration. That agency was newly created at the time for the purpose of bringing industry and agricultural development to the Pacific Northwest by utilizing the power and water resources of the Columbia River and its tributaries so as to achieve a

regional development similar to that of TVA. The family returned to Washington in 1942.

In 1944, though protected from the draft by his employment, Hill volunteered for combat service as an Ensign in the U.S. Navy. He was assigned to sea duty in the Armed Guard branch of the Navy which placed Navy personnel aboard merchant ships to operate their guns and communications equipment. In April 1944, shortly before VE Day, Hill's ship was torpedoed in the English Channel with some loss of life among the Navy personnel. The ship, though disabled, did not sink but two other ships in the same convoy were torpedoed and sank with total loss of life. Upon his discharge and before moving to Los Angeles, Hill served the Navy as Assistant Director of the Navy's demobilization apparatus.

In 1946, following this Naval service ashore, Hill returned to the Justice Department in the Office of the Assistant Solicitor General. He received two distinctions there before resigning to commence private practice. He was named the Legal Advisor to the American Delegate to the U.N. Economic and Social Council at the Second Session of the U.N. in Lake Success, New York.

Judge Hill retired from the Justice Department in the Fall of 1946 to enter private practice as an associate of a Beverly Hills firm. About two years thereafter he commenced a firm of his own, originally named Hill, Jones and Attias, the firm became Hill, Greenberg and Glusker. Today the Century City firm of Greenberg Glusker Machtinger Fields & Claman has approximately 100 attorneys. Founding a firm of such stature was always a source of great pride to Judge Hill.

Hill was appointed to Superior Court in 1961 by Governor Pat Brown. Soon thereafter, Chief Justice Roger Traynor appointed Hill to the Appellate Department of the Superior Court. Before his appointment to the bench, Hill had become active in the charitable and philanthropic aspects of community life in the Los Angeles area. He served for three years as President of Jewish Federation of Greater Los Angeles, an

umbrella organization encompassing and representing 500 different Jewish organizations. He was the Federation's President and spoke for it when President John F. Kennedy was assassinated. Hill was also elected as Secretary of the County-wide Board of United Way and served on the Boards of many Jewish and non-Jewish charitable and philanthropic bodies. Nationally he served as Vice President of both the council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds and the Jewish Community Relations Advisory Committee. Politically, prior to his appointment as a judge, Hill served as campaign manager in West Los Angeles in Pat Brown's campaigns for both Attorney General and the governorship. He served as chairman of the L.A. County Lawyers for Adali Stevenson in Stevenson's first presidential bid, with Warren Christopher as his top assistant.

Early on, Judge Hill developed as his main lifetime ambition, the hope of becoming a federal judge. It was the result of his observing the respect and admiration afforded to federal judges by both the lawyers and the general public in Nebraska.

Hill realized his ambition in 1965, when President Lyndon Johnson appointed him to be a U.S. District Judge for the Central District of California. He sat on that bench for over 30 years working every day, on past his 80th birthday. He served as Chief Judge of the court, the second largest court in the federal system, during the years 1979-81. In a survey of the Central District judges in the 1970's, Los Angeles Magazine designated Judge Hill as "the Best of the Best".

In addition to his local judicial duties, Judge Hill was active in the federal judiciary on a national level. He sat as a designated appellate judge in a number of the federal circuit courts around the country. He played a pivotal role in the creation of the Federal Judges Association. That body is the first organization created and financed by the Federal Judges themselves to be their spokesman in Washington to both Congress and the Executive Branch. Judge Hill, as head of a committee of

Ninth Circuit, first formulated the need for such a body and defined its proposed powers and limitations. He went around the country to convince other federal judges of the desirability of themselves forming such a group to advance their interests as to compensation, benefits and judicial independence.

Previously, the Chief Justice was, and insisted on being, the sole spokesman for the federal judges to the Bar and the other branches of the Government. Chief Justice Burger resisted the formation of the new group and Judge Hill and others played a decisive part in convincing him finally to accept it. Judge Hill's committee also pressed the Chief Justice to appoint a new committee of the Judicial Conference of the United States specifically to deal with matters of salary, benefits and independence. Such a committee was created and Judge Hill served for seven years as one of its initial members.

Throughout his judicial career, Judge Hill was active in efforts to educate law students and lawyers, as well as sitting judges, in improving their performance. He served as Jurist in Residence at two major law schools. He presided at or spoke at numerous Continuing Education seminars of the California Bar and at numerous gatherings and conventions of federal judges.

Judge Hill became a senior judge in 1980, after fifteen years of active duty on the Court. With full salary payable for life, he could have returned to the practice of law or followed other interests. He chose to remain on the court, hearing cases. In 1995, on the 15th anniversary of his becoming a senior judge, the Office of the Clerk tallied up that Judge Hill had, during those 15 years, accepted and terminated 3,915 civil cases, more than one termination per calendar day for the entire 15-year senior judge period.

Irving and Maydee Hill were the parents of three sons and grandparents of 7 grandchildren. Their eldest son is Lawrence N. Hill, M.D., who practiced as an oncologist for many years in Eureka, California and is now with the U.S. Department of State stationed in Washington, D.C. Their second son, Steven C. Hill, M.D., lives and practices as a Family Practitioner in rural North Carolina. Their third son, Richard F. Hill, is a sole practitioner of law in Berkeley, California. Among Judge Hill's hobbies have been deep sea fishing, numismatics and contract bridge. He was a fervent partisan of UCLA basketball and football (the family home being half a block from the campus) and of Nebraska University football.

After nearly 33 years on the Bench,

Judge Hill passed away in his chambers at age 81 on March 18, 1998 at approximately 12:00 noon. He was devoted to his work. His long-time friend, L.A. Times Editor Bob Gibson quoted Judge Hill as saying he loved his job, "They'll have to carry me out of here." He is greatly missed by family, friends and colleagues.

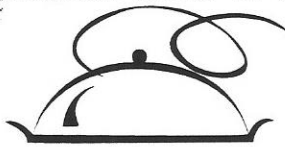

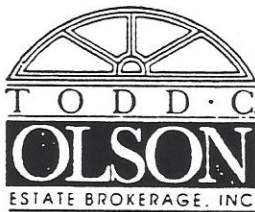

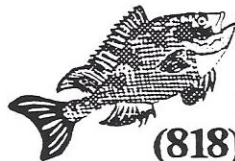
