Newfoundland cod moratorium in second year: The Canadian Fisheries Ministry's two-year moratorium on all cod fishing from the northern tip of Labrador to the southern tip of Newfoundland is headed into its second year. The ban has idled 10,000 commercial fishermen and a like number of plant workers. Overfishing and extremely cold weather during the winter of 1991 were cited as the reasons for the fishery's rapid decline, which reduced ground-fish stocks 90 percent below the long-term average.

I came across this article on Dolphin (the fish) and thought I would share some of this with you. One of the most beautiful fish in the ocean is also one of the most amazing.

Found in the tropic and subtropic oceans they have an incredible fecundity and rate of growth. Weight studies show a one pound fish growing 36 lbs. in eight months! Can you believe 5 lbs. of growth per month? A two year old fish averages 27 1/2 lbs. Records of monsters, as kept by the IGFA, 70 to 80 lbs. are four year old males. Translated into human terms a six year old fish would be 125 years.

Although their flesh is one of the tastiest it's recommended that they be killed immediately and bled by removing their tails and that they not be flipped into the fishbox and allowed to die a slow death. The difference in taste is noticeable.

Positive Example

INNOVATIVE ENFORCEMENT CONCEPT BRINGS SPORTSMEN INTO THE ACTION

The Ventura County Fish and Game Commission last week took the first step in a move that may restore prosecution of fish and game violations by that county when it voted to support a unique funding project.

No fish and game prosecutions have occurred in Ventura County since August 1991, due to cutbacks in the district attorney's staff brought about by a county budgetary crisis.

The result has been virtually an open season on fish and wildlife without fear of recrimination.

"For the past 1 1/2 years we haven't had any basic enforcement," protested Capt. Roger Reese, patrol supervisor in Ventura and Santa Barbara counties. "We have had wardens out there to enforce what they could. But there has been no prosecutions."

Several months ago, wardens in that area approached Jim Paulk, director of the Southern California chapter of United Anglers, to ask the state's largest recreational fishing organization for assistance in settling the funding conflict.

The result of a series of meetings with United Anglers and the involved county agencies resulted in a unique project that would earmark funds from the Ventura County Fish and Game Commission to staff an additional deputy district attorney's position to handle fish and game prosecutions.

Ventura County deputy district attorney Don Coleman told *WON* the pilot project would allocate \$25,000 a year, subject to approval by the DFG and the Ventura County Board of Supervisors. The money would come from the county's Fish and Game Commission and from private sources, if necessary.

State statute requires the DFG to approve such an expenditure, Coleman said.

"Once that is completed, then it will go

to the board of supervisors for approval," Coleman stated, "We hope by the end of May it will be ready for implementation."

Mike Duffy, United Anglers' legal advisor who helped negotiate the project, was ecstatic over the commission's positive response to the proposal.

"We feel like we have got a chance to make a major impact on the problem," Duffey said. United Anglers would be involved in the evaluation process subject to approval of the project by the board of supervisors.

Paulk also spoke favorably of the commission's action in voting preliminary approval of the project. He said United Anglers had agreed to help underwrite part if the necessary funding.

"If this project works, it should be a positive example to other counties in that it will not cost them money but will make the money," Paulk commented about the project.

He explained that by law, both the Ventura court system and its fish and game commission would split any revenue derived from fines effected from fish and game prosecutions with the DFG.

The project would be subject to review after the first year.

The proposed solution of the Ventura County funding conflict could be adopted to settle a similar problem in San Joaquin County, which also is undergoing severe budgetary problems.

Bruce Sanford, DFG Region 2 patrol chief, told *WON* he received a copy of a letter from that county's district attorney last week notifying its board of supervisors that all but a few misdemeanors, drunk driving among those exceptions, will not be prosecuted because of budgetary problems.

A FISH REPORT

Two-Day San Miguel Trip Huge Success

The semi annual two-day fishing and gourmet dining excursion aboard the *Seahawk* on May 11th and 12th was a wonderful experience. With Second Skipper Susie at the wheel and the bait tank full of horse sardines, the *Seahawk* cleared Santa Barbara Harbor at about 3 a.m. on the morning of May 11th. The 4 1/2 hour drive to San Miguel Island was through dead flat seas. After a hearty breakfast of lox, cream cheese, bagels, red onions, and gorgeous hot house grown tomatoes flown in from Denmark, the 12 anglers began fishing. Fishing in approximately 90 to 120 feet of water was very productive with ling cod, red rock cod, chuckle head, and a variety of other shallow water critters being taken. Although most of the guys and Rita Zide started out with the weirdest looking fishing contraptions and lures imaginable, consistently the best rig proved to be a 6 to 8 ounce sinker on a dropper loop and 2.0 to 4.0

single live bait hook with a live sardine pinned on.

Lunch was served which consisted of chicken and pasta. It was Merit's game plan to fish the shallow water rock fish until about 2:30 p.m. at which time he planned to fish halibut. No sooner did the boat position itself for the first halibut drift, when the weather made an abrupt change. From the dead calm no wind conditions, within a matter of minutes the wind was roaring at 20-25 knots and the seas were 6 to 8 feet. So much for drifting for halibut. The rest of the day was spent on more shallow water rock fish. Towards evening we anchored in what little lee was available and were treated to a wonderful dinner consisting of homemade potato salad (secret recipe of Pat, the chef, who even under the threat of death declined to share with our two deli proprietors) and steak.

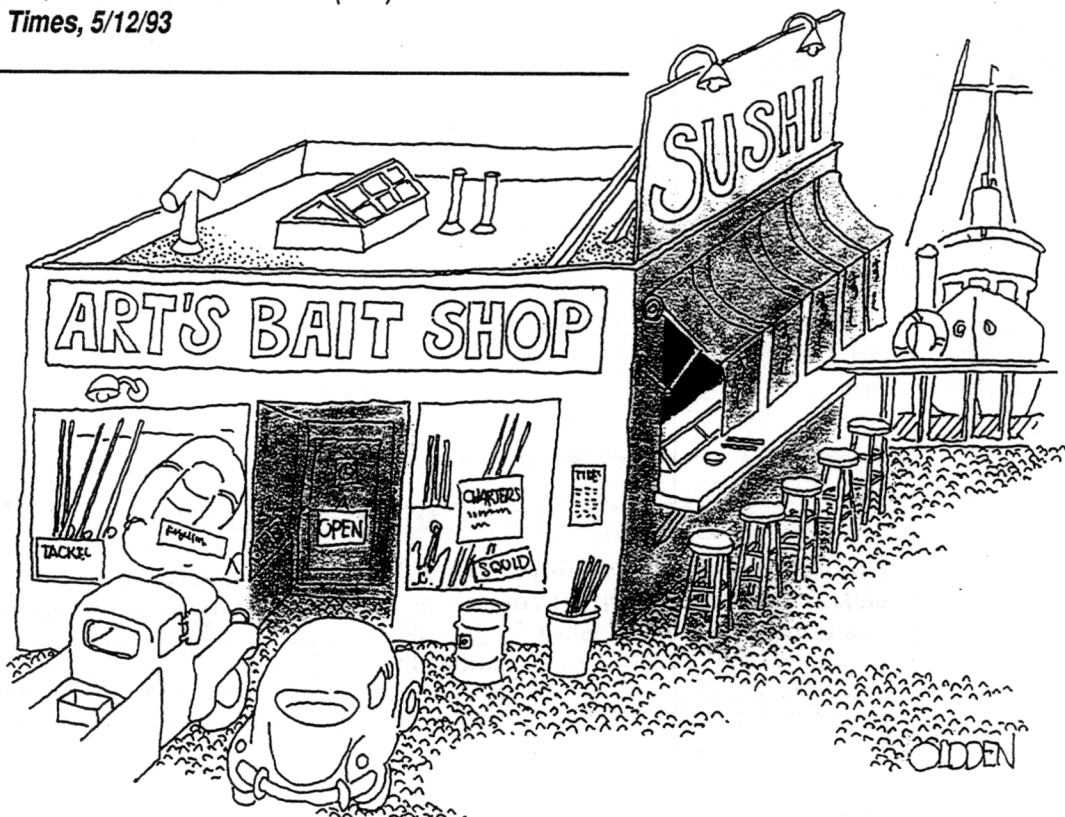

SALTWATER FISHING

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's latest El Nino advisory says that a trend of cooling water indicates the recent warmer water was "a residual from the 1992 El Nino" and not a new El Nino. The advisory adds, however, that with recent catches of albacore as close as 400 miles southwest of San Diego, and yellowfin, skipjack and bluefin tuna 350-400 miles south of San Diego, "depending upon the rate of (seasonal) warming in Southern California waters the next few weeks, local fishing conditions ... could rapidly improve" ...976-TUNA offers a free newsletter, "Tuna Times." Dear Mr. Secretary:

I am writing to ask for your help. It appears that the People's Republic of China has just committed a violation of the worldwide ban on large-scale driftnet fishing, and you have the authority under the High Seas Driftnet Fisheries Enforcement Act (PL 102-582) to take prompt action against the PRC.

Earlier this month, a Coast Guard cutter spotted the Chinese driftnet vessel Yingyu 601 fishing 800 miles south of Adak, Alaska. The Coast Guard reports that at the time of the sighting, the vessel had fish on its deck and was in the process of retrieving two miles of additional driftnet. Coast Guard patrols subsequently boarded the vessel and ordered it back to China.

The Coast Guard noted that this is the first sign it has seen of fishing activity in violation of United Nations Resolution 46/216, which called for an end to all large-scale driftnet fishing on the high seas by Dec. 31, 1992.

This violation of international law presents the United States with a key test. The High Seas Driftnet Fisheries Enforcement Act calls upon the Secretary of Commerce to identify the offending nation, notify the President and that nation, and within 30 days, trigger a series of consultations with that nation to terminate immediately illegal large-scale driftnet fishing. Further, if consultations have not progressed satisfactorily, the Act calls for directing the Secretary of the Treasury to prohibit all imports of fish, fish products and sport fishing equipment from the offending nation.

There also is a provision in the law that calls upon your agency and the State Department to publish a list of offending nations and to direct the Secretary of Treasury to deny entry of vessels from these nations to U.S. ports.

I would respectfully ask you to consider taking the aforementioned steps to make abundantly clear to China and the world community that we cannot allow these illegal actions to occur. I strongly believe we must tell the world that we will not tolerate large-scale driftnets that steal our salmon and steelhead, undermine sustainable fisheries management, and wreak havoc on the world's marine resources. If we do not use all the tools at our disposal to enforce this ban, we risk further devastation of an already over-exploited resource.


Strong action by the U.S. would have the added effect of convincing other nations that they must comply with the driftnet ban. Those nations who had the largest fleets of driftnet vessels, such as Japan, have every bit as much of an interest in clamping down on these "pirate" vessels as we do. That's why I believe we should enter into negotiations with the Japanese and with others who signed onto the U.N. ban in an effort to seek international enforcement agreements. I hope you will urge the Secretary of State to pursue such agreements.

Mr. Secretary, many of us have serious concerns about NAFTA. Some of those concerns revolve around how we enforce our own and international environmental standards. This may well be a test. The PRC's violation of international law would appear to be a classic example of why many of us in Congress are fighting for legislation to include this kind of enforceable condition.

I would appreciate your help in pursuing this issue and would ask that you please keep me informed of the Department's intentions.
