RE: Clarification of Filleting of Fish

*It has been brought to my attention that there is some confusion over the legal right to "fillet" salmon other than at the dock.*

*Having been involved in the revision of California Fish & Game Code Section 5509 back in the mid '70s and, after having reviewed both that section of the Fish & Game Code and Regulation 27.65 of the Regulations of the Fish & Game Commission, I want to advise members of the Club that salmon may not be filleted on any boat or brought ashore as fillets pursuant to Regulation 27.65 (c). The same regulation is true as to California halibut caught north of Point Arena in Mendocino County.*

*The regulations are also specific as to the right to fillet and required length of fillets and one-inch square patch of skin for kelp (Calico) bass, sandbass, spotted bass, ocean whitefish, and all brown-skinned rock fish; barracuda; ling cod and cabezon, white seabass, Pacific bonito, and California halibut taken from or possessed aboard a vessel south of Point Arena in Mendocino County.*

*All other fish, except as set forth in Regulation 27.65 (c), may be filleted, which fillets may be of any size and each fillet shall bear in tact a one-inch square patch of skin.*

*The listed fish that may not be filleted or brought ashore as fillets, in addition to California halibut north of Point Arena and salmon, are any other species of flat fish, including Pacific and Greenland halibut, tongue fish, sole, turbot, flounder, sanddab, steelhead, striped bass, sturgeon and, of course, salmon.*

*You may want to republish this memorandum in the Chum Line for the information of all members since I do not believe, although the regulations are posted on sportfishing boats, that all of our members are aware of the filleting-at-sea requirements.*

So when our friendship was renewed in 1988, it was me this time, bursting with pride as a "veteran" LARRC member that helped welcome a great fisherman like Marty into the club.

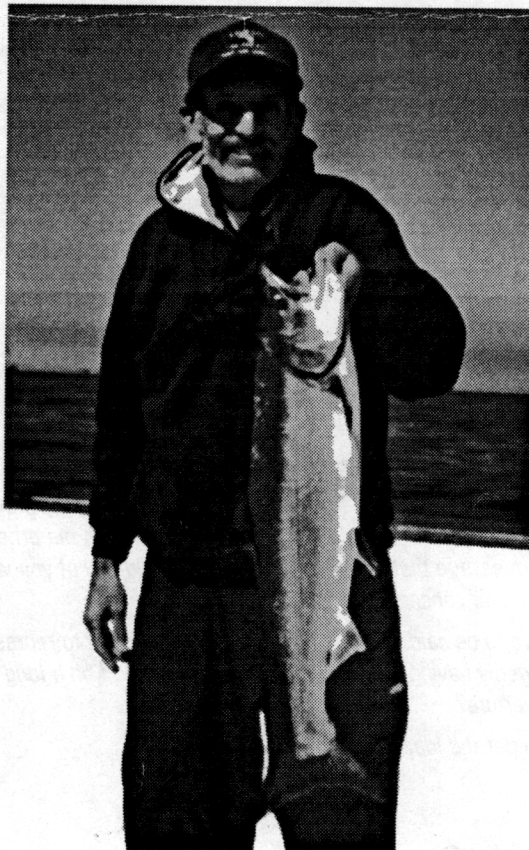

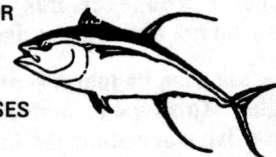

**SWORDFISH STUDY LAUNCHED:** A new research project launched at the Southwest Center's Honolulu Laboratory with funding provided by the NOAA-University of Hawaii Joint Institute of Marine and Atmospheric Research will incorporate environmental information into a mathematical model for swordfish in the central North Pacific. Sea-surface water temperature regimes are thought to play an important role in the dynamics of swordfish distribution and their vulnerability to fishing gear. Understanding these relationships will help scientists better interpret swordfish catch per-unit-effort data used to evaluate management alternatives for the domestic longline fishery. ## Letter From the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County

May 19, 1995

To: LA Rod and Reel Foundation

RE: California Halibut Tagging Program

Dear Sirs,

I am pleased to report that the halibut tagging program of the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County is going strong and on its way to its goal of marking 100,000 fish. As of the time of this letter we have tagged 15,586 California halibut, and have recovered 525 of those individuals. This success has only been possible with the important funding that your organization has provided. Your support has gone towards the purchase of tags and the materials necessary to enlist the aid of the many volunteers in our community who are actively tagging halibut.

Now entering its fourth year, the tagging program has provided valuable information about the commercially important California halibut. This type of mark and recapture study can tell us the size of the halibut population in Santa Monica bay and whether or not these fish move along the California coastline. Such information is very important to the maintenance of this species. Considering the value of the California halibut to both commercial and recreational fisheries, and the continued destruction of this species' wetland nursery habitat, a continuing assessment of the halibut population will be vital to its survival.

Currently we estimate the size of the California halibut population in Santa Monica Bay to be approximately 200,000 to 250,000 individuals. The majority of recaptured fish are found very close to the site at which they were originally tagged. While it appears that halibut do not normally migrate along the coast of California, several fish have been recaptured after moving long distances. One individual was recaptured as far north as Morro Bay, while another made it down to San Diego. As the program continues we hope to involve more halibut taggers in other parts of the state in order to get a better idea of how these fish move around.

With the completion of another successful Halibut Derby came a rush of new tagging data. In the next few months we plan to analyze this and all other information collected over the last four years in order to produce an up-to-date report on our efforts so far. This report, combined with research on the California halibut that the Natural History Museum is conducting at the Redondo Beach Hatchery facility, will teach us much about this interesting and important member of our local marine environment. You should know that this work is only possible through your generous contribution.

### SB885 Loses In The State Senate

The anti-longline bill sponsored by United Anglers and introduced into the State Legislature by Sen. Richard Mountjoy was not voted out of committee on a second vote taken May 9th. What this means is that we will find another sponsor for the next legislative session and learn from our efforts.

Basically, we have a number of boats out of So. Calif. ports whose home base was either in Gulf Coast or Atlantic ports, and who are now fishing in waters not yet "depleted." Strictly speaking, these vessels are supposed to fish outside the 200 mile limit. Since however, there is no surveillance, no one knows precisely where they fish. The National Marine Fisheries Service has caught boats poaching off Hawaii (i.e. in their waters) and has mounted electronic monitoring equipment on them at a cost of \$3,700 each so that they can be located via Satellite. Hawaii has, as a matter of fact, put a legal cap on the number of long liners that fish out of their ports.

Why did we lose? The vote was five "ayes" and two "noes" and four abstentions. The abstentions are what hurt. Tom Hayden, (Santa Monica), Jack O'Connell (Ventura) were the local votes that would have swung the result. A solid phalanx of California Gillnetters Assn., Pacific Offshore Fishermen's Assn., Pacific Coast Federation of Fishermen's Assns., West Coast Seafood Processor Assn., Western Fishboat Owners Assn., were in opposition as was Mr. Craighead the owner of High Seas Industries and several Florida-based vessels, were opposed.

We need more membership, we need more participation; and letter writing when needed. We'll try again.

## LARRC Foundation

### WHO, WHY, WHAT AND HOW

Every year, the Los Angeles Rod & Reel gets a dozen or so new members and they soon start getting solicitations from the LARRC Foundation. Some of them get these requests before they even know what the Foundation is, why it was established, who runs it and what it does. It's been two years since these questions were last answered, so, with the help of past responses written by Julian Wolf and Earl Warren, it's time for me to do it again.

The foundation was established in 1951 by three of the club's Charter Members. It is a non-profit, charitable organization, contributions to which are tax deductible. The "Declaration of Irrevocable Trust" that the foundation's three founders wrote expressly provided that the initial purpose of the Foundation was to provide funding for the recreation of homeless children and for a variety of such other purposes as the Trustees may deem worthwhile. For those of you who care to read it, the declaration, as amended, is printed starting on page 25 of this year's LARRC Year Book.

The Foundation is run by seven Trustees, who are elected by the LARRC's Board of Directors. The other foundation trustees elected me chairperson of the foundation. The other trustees are Phillip Bardack, Harold Goodman, Allan Mannheim, Lad Rubaum, Marv Scheinbaum and Bill Vogel. The trustees serve three year terms, the starts of which are staggered. For example, Lad, Marv and Bill's terms are up next year and elections for their posts will be held at the December LARRC board meeting. Earl Warren once described a suitable trustee as a person who: 1) is a long-standing and active member of the LARRC; 2) had previous experience as a LARRC board member and officer; 3) has exceptional organizational and management skills; 4) has a background that enables proper assessment of grant applications submitted to the foundation; 5) has sufficient time to fulfill the responsibilities of a trustee; 6) understands the history and role of both the club and the foundation.

To repeat, the foundation's primary purpose is to underwrite the Kid's Trip, the first one of which was run in 1950. The first trips took kids out on fishing boats. Later, due to the increased number of kids on each trip, barges started to be used. Since their inception, the LARRC has taken thousands of kids on these trips. That these trips are appreciated can be inferred from the contents of a typical letter we received. This one was written by Glenn Adams, Executive Director of the Boys and Girls Club of Hollywood in 1989. Glenn wrote: "Our kids never have the opportunity to fish except for our participation on your annual trip. To go out on a real barge, with real equipment, on a real ocean, with people who really care was and will always be remembered as a very special treat for all of our members."

To paraphrase Julian, the foundation's other projects have not been as visible as the Kids' Trip. That is regrettable because the foundation's other activities involve contributions to endeavors that will have a positive impact on your ability to fish. They have ranged from assisting in artificial reef construction to consolidating marine resource management. The foundation does not contribute to most of the projects presented to it. It does not contribute until the merits of a proposal have been carefully reviewed. Among the undertakings to which money has been given over the past 15 to 20 years are the following: various artificial reefs—±\$22,500; bass transplants—±\$9,000; kelp restoration—±\$17,000; various conservation, environmental, scholarship and research projects—±\$23,000. As you can see, the foundation is involved in much more than just the Kids' Trip.

Club members' donations are the mainstay of the foundation. So far this year club members have contributed \$5,958. The foundation gets additional income from interest paid on the principal of its trust and we expect this amount to be about \$2,000 this year. The foundation has also received money from a variety of businesses and from the LA County Fish & Game Commission. The bulk of the food, gifts and beverages for the Kids' Trip are in-kind contributions from the companies that provide them. Some years, the foundation spends what it takes in. In other years it spends more and in some years it spends less. This year we will spend ±\$3,300 more than we take in. Over the years, the foundation has increased the amount of its trust. It will continue to nurture the trust so the foundation's future will be secure.

Perhaps now you have a better understanding of how your foundation works for you and for future club members. I hope your understanding will motivate you to assist with the Kids' Trip and to become an enthusiastic supporter of the LARRC Foundation.

## Salmon News

Whenever it appears the salmon are finally going to head north where they belong, they come back for an encore. Not that anyone is complaining.

It has been more than two months since the king salmon arrived off the Ventura-Santa Barbara coast and landing operators are calling it the best season in the area in more than 20 years.

"We had a few bad days over the weekend, but (the salmon) popped up again Monday and (Tuesday)," said Louie Abbott, owner of Harbor Village Sportfishing in Channel Islands Harbor. "This thing just keeps going on and on, it's unbelievable."

Biologists have said that the salmon, though well south of their traditional ocean feeding ground, are remaining there simply because there is an abundance of baitfish.

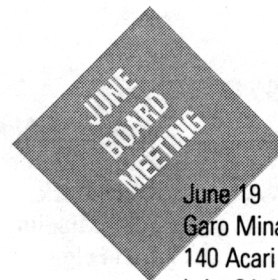

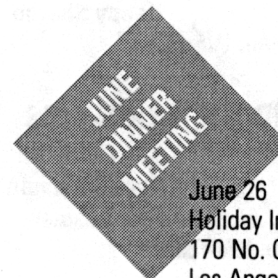

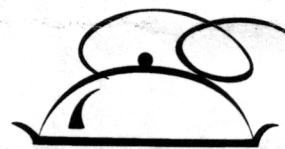

1. Departure Time will be at 5:00 am, from Sea Landing, Santa Barbara. However, some trips may depart earlier. These earlier departures will be at the sole discretion of the CHARTER MASTER after consultation with the Skipper.
