However, after reviewing the club's financial status, the Board of Directors found it necessary to implement this \$5.00 increase in the cost of the dinner meetings.

### 1998 Tuna Fishing Trips

I have tentatively chartered the 65-ft. Patriot for two separate "fish-filled" sport-fishing trips this summer. I will proceed to firm up these charters if I have a favorable response to my letter.

#### July Trip:

Board: Thursday evening—July 2nd  
(covers July 4th weekend)

Return: Monday evening—July 6th  
(4-day trip)

#### August Trip:

Board: Wednesday evening—August 19th  
Return: Sunday evening—August 23rd  
(4-day trip)

We are scheduled to board at approximately 10 pm for departures and return at approximately 7 pm (depending on proximity of fish and boat schedule).

The charge for a four-day trip for six persons is \$6,800 or \$1,135 per person. A deposit of \$600 is required per scheduled trip. No reservation will be held without a deposit.

All charters are inclusive of yacht, crew, fuel, insurance, Mexican fishing permits, all fishing tackle, bait, fish filleting, meals, snacks, soft drinks, taxes, port and landing fees.

The yacht will depart from and return to H&M Landing, 2801 Emerson Street, San Diego, California. Parking will be available next to the Landing Office. Be sure to have your parking stub validated in the office. It will reduce your parking fee from \$8.00 to \$2.00 per 24-hour period.

We are limited to six passengers so an immediate response is essential.

I will drop any proposed charters that I am unable to fill within the next couple of weeks.

## Great Investment

I know that many are looking for investment opportunities and this may be the one for you.

I am considering starting a cat farm near Ensenada. I plan to start rather small, with about one million cats. Each cat will average about twelve kittens per year and the pelts can be sold for .20 for the white ones and up to .40 cents for the black ones. This will give me 12 million pelts per year which will be sold for an average price of .30 cents each. ## GPS Time Issues

GPS Units depend upon time as an essential element in calculating positions. GPS time is computed in weeks, Julian days, and seconds. Week one began January 6, 1980 when the GPS system was started. Because of data transmission restrictions, the largest week number the system can transmit in the time field is 1023. Week 1024 will begin at midnight, August 21, 1999. At that point, the week data field will roll over and start over at week 0000. Were a unit to read this as the original week 0000, i.e. January 6, 1980, there would be a mismatch between the internal "almanac" (record of orbital information stored in your GPS receiver) and the actual satellite positions based on the new GPS time. Simply put, the rollover could be interpreted as January 6, 1980 and the unit would look to the internal almanac for the satellite positions as of that date instead of the current date. The result would be faulty readings because the internal computer is using an incorrect satellite position base for the current date. How and if this affects your GPS readings depends on how your unit stores orbital information (the "almanac") and how that information is updated.

A survey of major manufacturers done by *Cruising World* Magazine showed that current production model GPS units from the major manufacturers will not be adversely affected at all by the "week roll over" occurrence. They will continue to function and update their internal data without need for any modification to the unit. Units that are between ten and two years old may require some form of modification to handle the roll over. It would be best to contact the manufacturer for those units. According to *Cruising World* units older than ten years old cannot be modified or updated.

I spoke with several manufacturers of the most popular units about these issues and here is what they reported. Lowrance and Garmin say that these issues do not affect any of their units regardless of when manufactured. Magellan has stated that there is no problem with any of their units manufactured after 1993 and they will be offering some kind of program for the earlier manufactured units. Furuno responded that with the exception of their very first unit (the GPS300, of which there are only a few left in the world) none of their units are affected by the Year 2000 or the Week Roll Over issues.

A separate but related matter is the so called "Year 2000" issue, i.e. the fact that many computers read year dates by the last two numbers and therefore they will read "00" as 1900 rather than 2000. This is not an issue for GPS units. Since GPS units reference their time to weeks and seconds and not years the Year 2000 factor will not have an effect on GPS calculations. The display of the date on the unit at, for example, July 4, 2000 or 07-4-00, (depending on the style of the readout) will also continue to function normally.

## First Club Charter on Toronado Huge Success

After the first two scheduled LARRC charters on *The Toronado* were scrubbed due to bad weather, the boat finally got out on May 20. Poor fish counts for the week preceding the trip, along with the threat of more bad weather, kept many participants away. However, *The Toronado* did get out with 15 eager souls.

The trip left from its temporary landing in South Long Beach at 9:30 p.m., and after a stop for bait (anchovies for chum and nice medium-size sardines for hook bait) headed for San Clemente Island. The crossing was smooooth. At about 4:00 a.m. the anchor was dropped in the lee near the east end. Action was non-existent until daylight. Then the yellowtail started to show. **Dan Frumkes** was the first to hook up, and landed a nice fish on iron. Shortly thereafter **Dan Felger, Bob Horowitz, Bob Selvin,** and **Abe Cohen** got into the act. All

told, 14 yellowtail were caught. The skipper moved the boat several times and at each spot one or two yellows were caught along with calicos. The calico bite, although not wide open, was steady all day. Most of the participants caught their limit of bass, and a great many were released. At 2:00 p.m. *The Toronado* headed for home. Other LARRC participants were **Joe Stern, Jim Marshall, Royal McNair, Shonone Frumkes, Michael Lapidus, Richard Lapidus, Warren Haddad** (new member), **Bernie Mayers, Mike Epstein,** and **Eric Rogger**.

*The Toronado* is a very comfortable and roomy 75-foot boat. It has a nice galley and seating both inside and outside. The bunks are large and very comfortable. The crew was most accommodating. The next trip is scheduled for June 17.

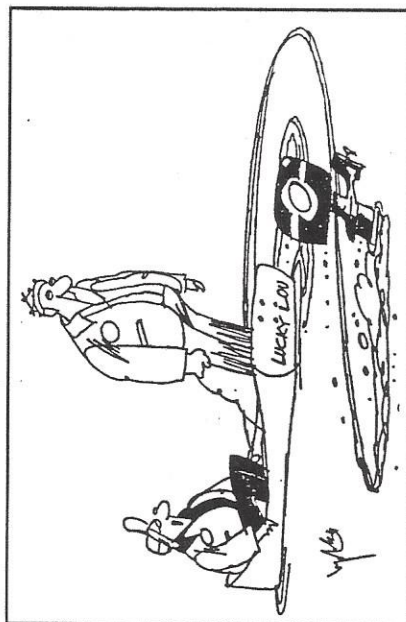

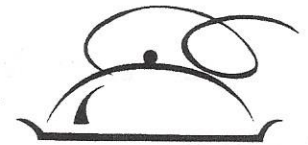

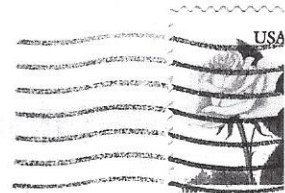
