In closing do not forget that we still are looking for donations for the Kids' Trip. We are also actively looking for new members to join our club.

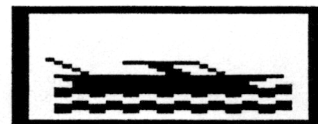

## LETTERS TO LARRC

I went fishing in Cabo San Lucas in January. My dad took me to celebrate my tenth birthday. I was very excited when I caught my first marlin.

Our panga was running under a bunch of birds when I saw a fin come up behind the lure. The deckhand took the rod and set the hook really hard. Then he handed it to my dad and my dad passed it to me. The marlin jumped a lot. It was hard for me to reel the marlin in because the harness was too big and my dad wouldn't let the captain chase the fish. At least he kept me from being pulled overboard which was good because I only weigh 60 pounds. I was on the fish for about 45 minutes. It was a striped marlin and weighed about 100 pounds. I wanted to release it but the captain wanted to keep it.

The next day, I caught another marlin and my dad did too. It took me about 30 minutes this time. The captain kept my dad's marlin so he let me release mine. They weighed about 100 pounds and we caught them on bait.

The next day we fished near the beach. I caught roosterfish, pargo, grouper, sierra, snapper, and a needlefish.

Every day after fishing on the boat I went to the harbor and caught barracuda and grunts. This was the best salt water fishing I ever had. —Shanone Frumkes

## A TRUE FISH TALE

Prior to our long range 12 day trip, I mentioned to "cousin Ger" that I felt I would have an unusual catch on my 4th or 5th day out fishing on the *Excel*. Well that old ESP was really working.

On day #5, both myself and another fisherman were hooked up to some pretty good size tuna (at opposite ends of the stern). It seems the deckhand asked him to pass his rod underneath another angler and then as quickly as he asked, he changed his mind. The other fisherman had already passed the rod under and let go of it. You got the picture now. Everything, his rod, Penn International and fish went overboard. To say he was upset was an understatement. About 15 minutes later I am still working on my tuna, and it's finally closer to the boat. (Thank God for weight training.) All of a sudden John (second skipper on the *Excel*) yells "Color", and then he started to laugh. Pretty soon half the crew & guys are looking overboard and laughing too. (Now keep in mind we were hooked originally into two separate fish.)

What I reeled in was the other angler's rod, hooked perfectly through the last eyelet, with his fish still on. That was one happy angler. I turned it over to him and he reeled in his tuna. The crew said "That's one in a million chance, like winning the lottery". Guess I'll try that next. What happened to my fish? Looks like I'm forced to take that 16 dayer in January and find her. I'm hooked.

Our sixteen day trip on the *Excel*, with 29 fisherman got off to a good start. Our first stop at the Lunker Hole produced a 345 tuna, one at 316, 228 & 225 lbs. Ger took third prize with the 228 lb. tuna. These fish were picked up in the first hour of fishing. Then it really died. We made bait and then headed to Roca Partida, where we picked up 100-180 lb. tunas in a wide open bite. We next traveled to San Benidicto for more bait and wahoo. The reports out of Clarion were not good, so our skipper decided not to chance it. We spent a day heading to Socorro Island infirmary for an injured fisherman, then back to the Lunker Hole to play with the sharks. At Roca we brought in more tuna and wahoo, but nothing exceptional in size. Two hours after we headed home we received word of the underground volcanic eruptions, which we assumed influenced the slow bite.

Ger got a great fish and I picked up some over 100 lbs. plus I was lucky and won the Super Bowl pool. What an education fishing is. We also released a number of the smaller fish.

Looking forward to fishing Alaska next. —Sally Vickers

In the 50's Sam bought an RV and took it down to Ensenada and built a huge cabana on the side of the RV which slept 15 fishermen. We would all go down there, drink, play gin, eat, fish and tell long tales and oh what times we had. Never a dull moment. We would spend a week fishing, come home and plan another trip. After a few years I bought the trailer from Sam and carried on the tradition. In all the years I had known Sam we never had an argument. He was a Prince among men.

The last few months Sam was in and out of the hospital and the medics held out little hope for his recovery. It was a terrible thing to see him slip away.

At his funeral many LARRC old timers attended, even Sid Schway who has a debilitating condition attended. As crippled as he is, he was there with his lovely wife Sylvia.

Sam joined the Club in 1950 and was President in 1964. The kids' trip was his joy and he was always putting his hands in his pockets for cash to see that the kids' trips were a success and that they had a great time. He was a great guy and we will all miss him. Sam was always there to help you on a fishing trip and he would show you how to catch fish like no one I know. He taught me all I know. —Otto

Subject: Streamlining of Fishing Rules

At the last board meeting we wrestled extensively with possible changes to the current rules. These changes will be voted on at the next board meeting.

1. That local AND foreign waters be considered the same in terms of qualifying for trophies, i.e. A tuna caught off Baja and a tuna caught at Cortez bank are the same and contend for the same recognition.
2. That no gender distinction be made. Ladies are now fully vested members of the club and for purposes of trophy contention are equal to men. We are discussing possibly having one member of a family qualify for the entire family.
3. A category for fly fishing be established. We will establish some rules for fly fishing shortly but did agree that fly fishing, whether ocean or freshwater should be in ONE category.
4. The board heard a request that there should be NO second place awards.
5. A suggestion was made to limit the species of fish in our categories. It would be confined to the major types and those species to which most of the members have access. After all, we are not the IGFA.
6. A suggestion was made that the line test requirements be changed to a 1:1 ratio. We presently have a 60% ratio which means that in order to get a trophy your 10 lb. line test fish must weigh at least 6 lbs. Under the new rules your fish must weigh at least the pound test of your line. Example: Catch a 50 lb. salmon on 20 lb. test you're OK. Catch a 20 lb. salmon on 50 lb. test and you have a nice fish but not a trophy contender. This suggestion bears on the fact that fishing is more difficult, there are simply fewer and smaller fish to be caught and sportsfishers should not take pride in fish caught in an unsportsmanlike manner. There would be exceptions to these rules such as calico bass and certain other small types.
7. Another suggestion dealt with the removal of club records from our yearbook if those holders have not been active in the club for some time.

I am asking club members for comments to these suggestions! Please consider not only the sportsman issue but also the economics resulting from these deliberations. Call or write me:

**CONCERNING THE KING SALMON LIMIT IN 1993**

*Special Note from Willi Herff, General Manager*

*Dear Friends—My discussions with the Department of Fish and Game left me feeling reasonably confident that the start of the 1993 season will have a two (2) King per day allocation. As the season progresses it is possible we would be cut back to one (1) King per day per person.*

*The 1992 sport fishing season was short 4,000 Kings of the allocated 52,000 set aside for sport fishing. Therefore, I believe that any limit reduction will not occur until the middle of August. More accurate information will be available to us by the end of January. It will be my pleasure to be of service to you in 1993.*

**After a disastrous 1991 when the one-day sportfishing fleet recorded 162 albacore, 2,189 yellowtail, 993 bluefin tuna, 136 bigeye, 1,977 yellowfin tuna and 85 dorado, the fleet rebounded in '92 and nailed two albacore, 31,800 yellowtail, 7,009 bluefin tuna, 114 bigeye tuna, 62,527 yellowfin tuna and 24,327 dorado. The dorado and yellowfin catches are local records, according to figures compiled by Fisherman's Landing general manager Paul Morris. A repeat or better fishing than that is great news to local sportfishermen.**

### **GILLNETTERS ABOUT TO FILE SUIT TO DECLARE PROP. 132 UNCONSTITUTIONAL**

After all the work we've done to get this legislation passed, and expected enforcement to commence at the end of this year, the California Gillnetters Association filed suit on San Diego seeking relief. The State, Department of Fish and Game and Attorney General were named as defendants.

The suit claims the initiative process has been abused and asks that netters be permitted to continue their livelihood and that all funds collected through the Marine Resources Protection Stamp program (\$3.15 million) be turned over to "disadvantaged" netters.

Doris Allen, who spearheaded the effort to pass Prop. 132 claims that constitutional aspects were checked prior to the introduction of the initiative. Jim Paulk, director of United Anglers' Southern California Council, claimed to not be surprised by this action. He stated that one of the options of United Anglers is to file suit as an intervenor.

Stay posted. Meantime it's disturbing to note that due to an injunction request the courts may decide to put off enforcement of Prop. 132 provisions until this matter is settled in court.

### **MEXICAN SPORTFISH ECONOMIC SURVEY RESULTS**

*The first comprehensive survey of US anglers who fish in Mexican territorial waters in the Pacific Ocean and Gulf of California (Sea of Cortez) reported that 44,673 US anglers fished from vessels in Mexican waters during 1991 and made over 146,500 angler trips. About 820,900 fish were caught in Mexican waters in 1991 by boat-based US anglers. Cabrilla, rockfish, yellowfin and other tunas, bonito/barracuda/bass, dorado and yellowtail together accounted for over 60 percent of total harvest. About 35 percent of the fish caught were released. Fishing trip expenditures totalled \$79 million in 1991. For further information, contact Cindy Thomson at NMFS (619) 546-7116.*

## CONSERVATION DEPARTMENT **A WHALE OF A PROBLEM...THEY ARE KILLING WHALES AGAIN.**

The International Whaling Commission (IWC) was established by international treaty to manage world whaling.

In 1982 IWC declared a world wide moratorium on all commercial whaling. Before the moratorium the whaling nations depleted species after species of large whales. Once there were 200,000 blue whales and today only 9,000 remain.

The minke whale population is estimated between 60,000 to 100,000. But the IWC has not yet established quotas on minke whales. Norway, a signatory to the whaling treaty has unilaterally decided to resume commercial whaling in 1993 and to establish their own quotas of 2,000 minke whales per year.

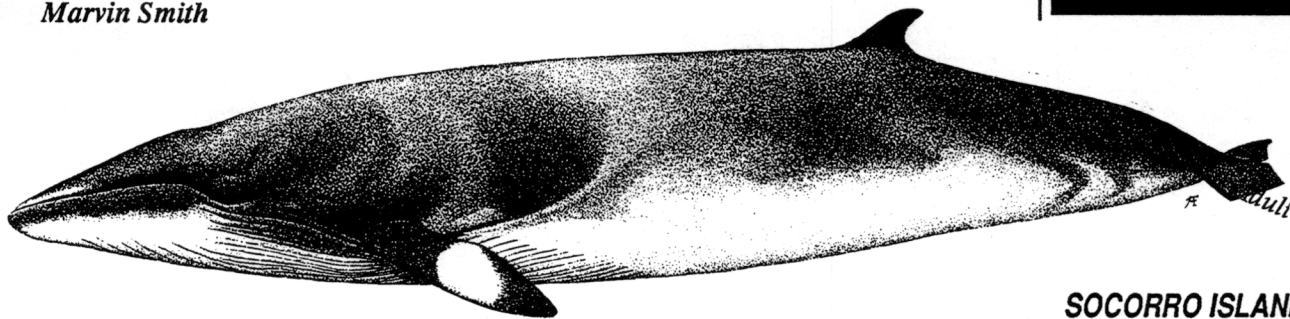
Minke whale meat sells for up to \$23 per pound in Norway. They export 49% to Japan where it has been reported to sell for \$200 per pound. The minke whale industry in Norway is expected to generate \$340 million per year.

What the World Community objects to is the Commercial use of whaling. Is it necessary for whales to be caught so that they can be sold at expensive restaurants?

What can you do to help prevent the slaughter? Don't buy Norwegian salmon (fresh frozen or canned), sardines or any other Norwegian fish products.

Pass the word on. Tell your family and friends and neighbors to save the whales. Tell them not to buy Norwegian fish.

## **HATCHERY PROGRAM**

The Section of Fishes of the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County, with support from the Santa Monica Bay Halibut Derby and Southern California Edison Company, operates a hatchery for California Halibut at Redondo Beach to study this species and to enhance the halibut population in Santa Monica Bay. The hatchery has shipped halibut eggs and juveniles to numerous fisheries study groups throughout the United States to support research on this remarkable flatfish. During their natural spawning season about 1 million fertilized eggs are produced daily by the adult broodstock from February through July. Eggs are cultured and young halibut are raised to lengths of 3-inches before they are released in the coastal areas, including Santa Monica Bay. Both hatchery reared and captured wild halibut are utilized for spawning purposes.

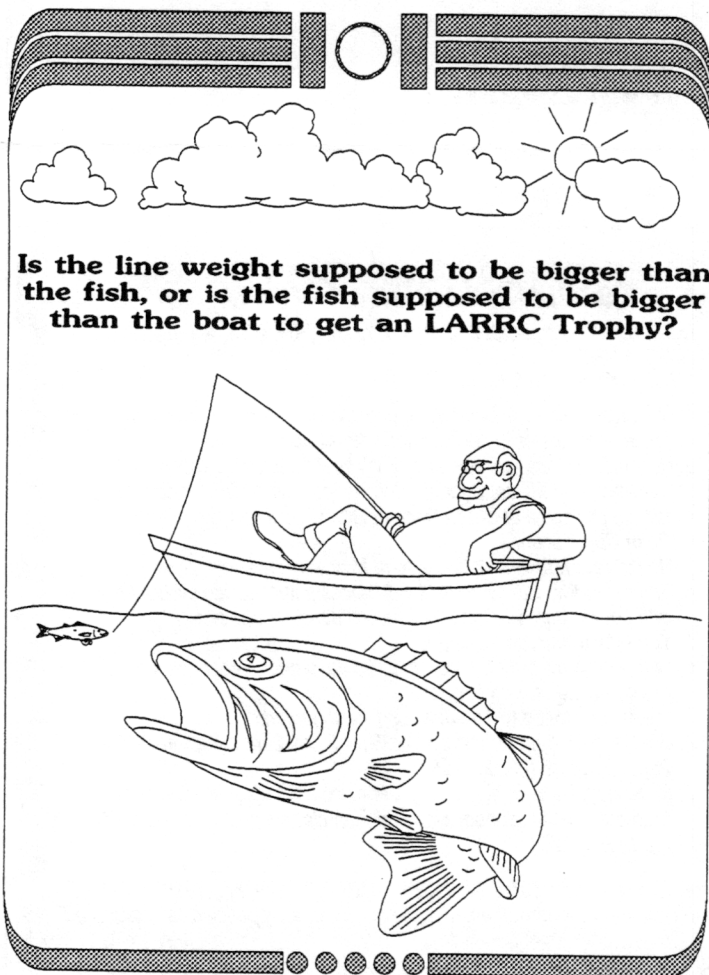
Pre-heat oven to 450°
