Who Says LARRC Never Catches Exotics? *Salmon Fishing on the SeaHawk*

The club charter on April 12th turned into quite an adventure for the fishermen aboard the *SeaHawk LXV*. King Salmon were running in the Santa Barbara Channel. Two weeks earlier I had seen one, a beautiful iridescent 15 pounder on ice in a cooler aboard the same boat. That was as close as I had ever been to one and I surely admired that fish. Now 16 of us would have a chance to participate.

Over the PA, Captain Merit gave instructions. "You're going to need a six to eight foot leader with a three ounce sliding sinker or torpedo behind. Use a number one hook. Set your drag on the loose side. You have to play these fish twice as long as for calico bass.

There were dozens of small, private boats trolling around us. Every once in awhile we'd see a bent rod. Then someone would give a yell and we'd see a big silvery fish netted.

Our first stop produced no fish. Then Merit announced that three salmon were just caught in a matter of minutes on the Hornet, which was in sight about a quarter of a mile north of us. Soon we were in that area. All of a sudden Eric Rogger was hooked up. He moved over and under us and around the boat, only to lose the fish right at the boat. I loosened my drag even more and waited. Next Marv Smith was on one near the bow. Soon his fish was netted and in the boat. Everyone cheered and we all looked at his fish.

Merit would keep saying things like, "the fish are metering at sixty feet." Sometimes he would say "forty-five pulls." So we had to fig-

ure out whether to stand there and pull out line forty-five times or just guess. I just guessed.

The new deck hand, Jason, kept giving me advice. That was probably because when I first came on board I asked him a million questions. At one point he look at me and said, "you're next." Almost immediately I felt a tap, tap, tap, then a short pull. I had been fishing in free spool, so I put my reel, a Calcutta 200, in gear and set the hook with a light to medium jerk.

Immediately the fish took off. Someone else got hooked up, and landed his fish. I never found out who that was, as I was busy moving around the boat almost half way, then back again. Every time I got the fish up and saw the color, it would see the boat and take off again. Finally it came up and Merit slipped the net under him. There were cheers and high 5's all around. Merit even took my picture holding the 10 pound salmon.

The first 6 or 7 salmon were all caught by different anglers. For awhile it looked as if we would all get one. But a former charter master didn't have one yet, and he commenced clearing his throat loudly, apparently signaling that we should move. But soon even he had one going, and after he landed it he didn't begin coughing again until he had his two fish limit. Then the coughing spells seemed almost nonstop until we moved up to Elwood to try our hand at catching Calicos.

The bummer was that everyone, including some of the club's best fishermen, did not get a salmon. Some never had a single bite. In total eleven fish were caught by nine anglers. Clearly I was one of the lucky ones, and I'll never forget how everyone cheered and yelled every time another one hit the deck. — Richard Lapidis

P.S. Editor's Note — Someone tried to gaff Eric's fish. Make sure your deckhand uses the required net.

The distributor must be able to prove that his fish comes from another area. 153 restaurants have been contacted and so far 81 have discontinued their use of these fish from their menus.

Captain Izor's Opinion

In my mind, nothing was ever so ridiculous in all of the mismanagement of our marine resources as the "Black Sea Bass" no possession law!! I urge you to consider this in totality!!

I don't remember which of the DFG biologists (?) was responsible for calling our attention to this "Non-Problem" ... But, they gathered data from the sportfishing log books and found that the year just passed had shown only about seventy-five (75) black sea bass taken by the sportfishing fleet (in local waters). All other data came from the commercial fishermen's log books (proven by any examination of fact to be hopelessly inadequate). The simple-minded "regulators" (DFG) decided that the simple-minded answer was to prohibit the take of this animal by sportfishermen. However, until January of 1994 this 'mis-management team' in Long Beach left in place the take of the black sea bass by commercial gill-net fishermen.

When the sport-angler caught one of these big fish, he was obliged to return it...and he was devastated when he saw his returned fish float away!! (sometimes a sea gull standing on it's dead body) the 'Floater' couldn't survive the struggle or the inability to acclimate to the depth change. Also, three fishermen, including a fishing guide, have been charged in an incident on the Brazos River below Possum Kingdom Lake's dam last weekend.

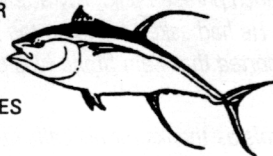
The bizarre incident involved the use of rainbow trout as bait, the use of a remote-controlled hobby boat and balloon to place the bait in a restricted zone beyond normal casting distance, and an air boat, said Gary Tarpley, regional supervisor of the TPWD.

Charged with three counts of violating fish laws was fishing guide Shane Davies of River Run Guide Service. Jimmy Jackson of DeSoto, who caught the striper, and his brother, Dennis Jackson of DeSoto, both clients of Davies, were charged with one count each of using rainbow trout as bait.

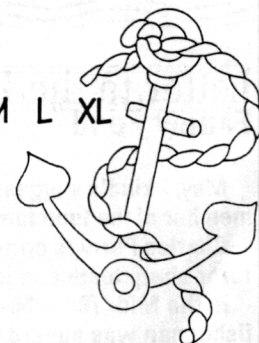

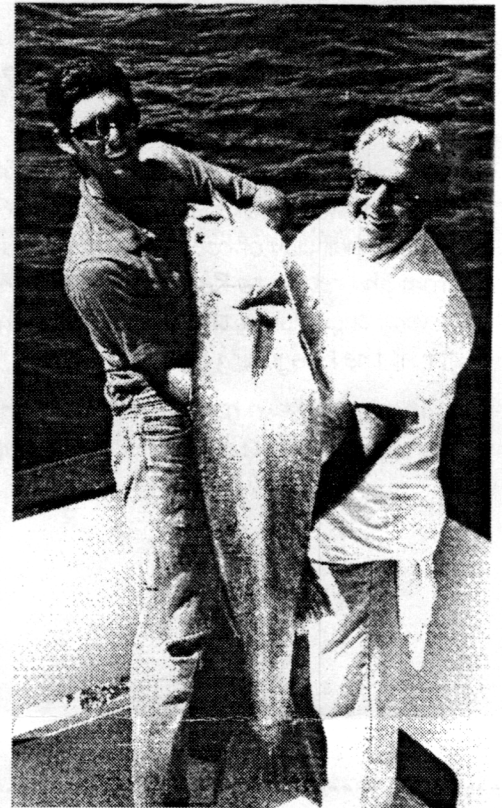
Indian Charters Looking for Players

Sardine News: CDFG and NMFS scientists calculate the California sardine biomass at 330,714 metric tons and predict that this year California sardine may likely comprise the most important fish catch by weight in California.

On the other side of the Pacific, Japanese sardine may not be faring as well, but this may have an unusual side benefit to U.S. fishermen. A recent Southwest Fisheries Science Center study shows that increased migration of northern bluefin tuna occurs when Japanese sardine are relatively scarce in the western Pacific. If the current decline of Japanese sardine continues, more northern bluefin may migrate out of the western Pacific, leading to increased catches of northern bluefin off Hawaii, California and Mexico.

Incredible Shrinking Fish USA—Washington state wildlife biologist Steve Phelps has discovered that between 1980 and 1991, the average size of Pacific salmon dropped 27 percent. According to the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, salmon "down-sizing" is due to "overgrazing" by billions of hatchery-raised fish and modern fishery methods that "skim off the big fish." This removal-of-the-fittest is subverting the evolutionary process, since it leaves behind only the smaller, less vigorous fish that are less likely to survive and reproduce.

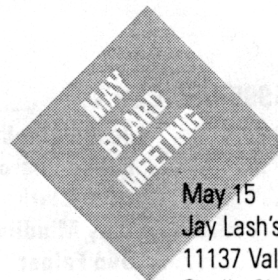
Reminder: To be eligible for a trophy a member shall have attended a minimum of three regular meetings during the calendar year. This rule does not apply to junior members or ladies.

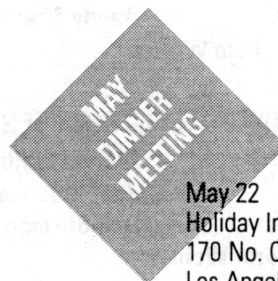

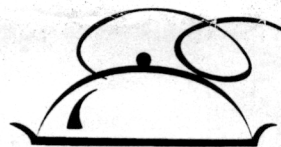

1. Departure Time will be at 5:00 am, from Sea Landing, Santa Barbara. However, some trips may depart earlier. These earlier departures will be at the sole discretion of the CHARTER MASTER after consultation with the Skipper.
2. The trips will be planned for local surface calico bass; however, opportunities to fish for exotics, such as white sea bass and yellowtail, will take precedent. Also, several trips will be for light tackle rock fish and/or halibut at Santa Rosa or San Miguel Island. Other trips may be to Point Conception.
3. Return time will usually be 4:30 - 5:00pm, but could be earlier or later depending on fishing conditions and weather, and will be determined by the Skipper.
4. Bunks will be on a first come basis and cannot be reserved. However, the CHARTER MASTER may reserve two, large forward bunks for those participants who because of age or physical limitations require special consideration. If you think you qualify please let the CHARTER MASTER know.
5. Loads will be limited to 16 adults or 17 people if juniors are participating. The CHARTER MASTER reserves the right to overbook by one.

Junior members pay 50% (up to 2 per trip). With the uncertainty of fuel costs there may be a fare adjustment.
