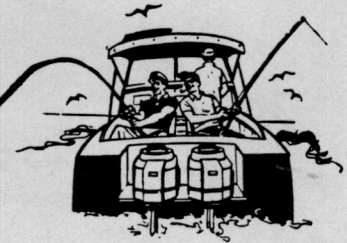



A WEEKEND IN CABO

On thursday Oct. 17, 1991 Bob Press, Norm Weinstock, Barry Fischer and our wives flew down to Hotel Palmilla for a few days of fishing. This being our group's annual pilgrimage to the cape we were eagerly anticipating three days of fishing as well as some R & R.

Upon Checking in on thursday afternoon we were told to be ready for the ride down to the dock at 6:50 AM the next morning as the boat we had requested, " Miss Palmilla", would be departing promptly at 7:00 AM.

The next morning we were on the sand awaiting our boat at 7:00 AM as directed. Other fishermen were coming down and departing in their boats from time to time, however our's remained moored in the bay. Seven AM had long since passed as did 7:30, 8:00 AM, and finally the staff told us that our boat would be in shortly as they were experiencing some problems in starting one of the engines. Finally Bob Press and myself went totally bananas and Norm in an effort to keep us sane started saying to us "Relax and breathe deeply, relax and breathe deeply". Finally at 8:15 I suggested to the staff person in charge that he'd better get us another boat before violence occurred. He did and by 8:30 we were chugging out of the bay on "Palmilla Quatro".

We headed toward Gordo Bank and as we got closer we could see a mix of about two dozen pangas and cruisers on and near the bank. As we arrived we could see yellowfin jumping and boiling around us so we baited up with sardines (which were plentiful) and started fishing. Norm was first to hook up. He had one on for about ten minutes and then farmed it. I was next and also farmed mine. Bob then also went into the agriculture business. All in all we farmed about 6 or 7 fish during the next couple of hours while landing 5 in the 20# class. The action subsided around 11:00AM at which time we decided to troll. After several minutes at a slow troll we wondered why the troll was as slow as it was and sure enough the captain was trying to hide the fact that one of the engines had broken down. So we limped back to the dock at an extremely slow pace and our fishing was ended for the day after only 2 1/2 hours of fishing time. During our brief fishing time we had several unofficial records made or broken. First, Bob Press caught a fish without using his hands. He was baited up and in the water when he decided to get a beer. He put his rod in the holder on the rail with the clicker on and went for the beer. When he returned the clicker was sounding off with a fish on that had hooked itself, so all he had to do was reel it in. Next, Norm out did himself twice with his casting prowess. He cast his sardine which wrapped around the outrigger three times, then after that he rebaited his line and cast it at least 50 feet off the port side of the boat, meanwhile his bait went at least 50 feet off the starboard side. Again, a supremely excellent cast.

Our second day of fishing commenced at 6:30AM the following morning, the time we were given for departure as the hotel wanted us to have some extra fishing time to make up for the previous day's problems. Well, 6:30 came and went as did 7:00, 7:30, and 8:00, then finally we told the dock man to

take us out to "Miss Palmilla" which was still moored in the bay. When we arrived at the boat there were spare parts and batteries on the deck. Finally at 9:00 we headed out toward Gordo on a greasy, dirty boat. About a half hour out the deckhand was cleaning the grease and grime off the rail when he hooked himself deeply through the hand on Bob Press \$49.95 Marauder II. The hook and barb went so deeply into his hand we couldn't remove it, so we turned around and headed back toward the dock at which time there was a loud "pop" and the engine started belching black smoke. Yes, we had broken down again, only this time with a deckhand shaking from the hook in his hand and we were still five miles out. We were finally able to limp in in a little over an hour and the deckhand, lure and all, went off to the hospital. The crew repaired the boat problem with, I think, tape, wire, and chewing gum and out we went again only 5 1/2 hours after our 6:30AM start and we hadn't fished yet. We then spent some time at the bank, trolled a little, and during the remainder of the day picked up another five yellowfin of the approximate 20# size.

So far our score was two days of fishing totalling maybe six or seven hours and ten fish, however we eagerly awaited our final day of fishing which was to be aboard a 38' Uniflite which Palmilla had chartered especially to make up for two days of fiascos. By the way, Bob Press did get back his Marauder II less half a hook which the doctor hacksawed off in order to push the barbed portion of the hook through the hand.

So day three started out with Norm again saying "relax and breathe deeply, relax and breathe deeply". I think he might have been in labor. Anyway, since we had such a roomy boat our wives decided to come out with us. We arrived at the bank at about 8:30 and got right into boiling and jumping tuna. We landed eleven of the same approximate size and also lost several more with a double and a triple hookup included. We finally had a really good time that morning. As the school departed we trolled for a while. One lure we used was a red and white feather purchased from Jeff "The Fishing Spot" Ellis. Of course, no tuna hit it, but instead a sail fish, which we soaked while we put a harness on Norm's wife, Sandi, who brought it in like an expert. It was a nice fish, however we released it not knowing the weight.

So all in all we hooked up and brought in 21 tuna, 1 sail fish, and a deckhand on our weekend in Cabo.

NEW CHARTER RULES

The LARRC Board has instituted a new rule regarding all club charters. Effective immediately, all players on a club charter will be subject to standards of good conduct and sportsmanship. The Charter Master, along with the boat Captain, have the complete discretion on where to fish and how long to fish and their determination shall not be interfered with by the players. If a member gets out of line, in the opinion of the Charter Master, he will be given a warning. If, after one warning, a player continues to be out of line, he can be prohibited from joining a future charter by the Charter Master.

A FRIEND OF MINE, a comparatively inexperienced fisherman, coaxed me into taking him along on one of my many excursions after muskelunge. The muskie, a fierce and vicious freshwater fighter, grows to a tremendous size, sometimes in excess of 60 pounds, and is extremely difficult to land.

The morning of our third day, my friend hooked a large fish. He played it well, but despite his every effort, the fish shook itself loose with a terrific leap when less than 20 feet away from our boat. He slowly reeled in the limp line, and then slumped in his seat. Wiping his hand across his brow, he said, "Man! Wasn't that something? You know, for a while there I didn't think I'd ever get away."

ANOTHER WAR STORY

Did you know that Otto holds the Silver Star? That's not far below the Congressional Medal of Honor - given for valor in battle. I've been nagging him for years to get the story of his experiences as a member of the Lincoln Brigade in Spain during their Civil War and later in World War II. Well, I finally broke down his resistance and the stories began to flow. By the end it was tough to get him to stop talking - but - that's Otto.

Since he won't let me have more than a page we'll deal only with World War II. Otto was a paratrooper; what else? He made his 1 st. combat jump in Sicily to warm up for Italy after the Salerno landing. When our troops broke out of the beach head and advanced up the boot of Italy the Germans were fighting a fierce retreat in good order. They set up an observation post directing artillery fire against the American troops attempting to reach and cross the Volturno River. Still well short of the river Otto's outfit jumped in to wipe out their position. Eighteen guys, seven miles out in front of their own people. They found the pill-box on a knoll and dug in about a 100 yards in front of it and the party started.

The German position was almost impregnable against a small raiding force - open at the top to allow mortar fire outward but just a horizontal 3 feet by 6 inch aperture in front for observation and a machine gun. They had a good field of fire.

The assault was getting nowhere and in the noise and confusion the paratroop officer called for a pull back. Spread out the way they were Otto claims he did not hear the order and didn't realize he had been left alone. He was firing a B.A.R., a very heavy two-man weapon mounted on a forward tripod. The belt man had gone. Never get Otto mad at you. He was spraying up and down and back and forth at the aperture. Suddenly there was a huge explosion and then, quiet. His people came forward and investigated the bunker. They counted thirty-eight dead Germans. Apparently a ricochet had hit their ammo stack.

The lieutenant threatened to have Otto court-martialed for disobeying the order to retreat but, instead, they gave him the Silver Star. I've seen it.

One week later he was severely wounded in another jump. His primary parachute failed to completely open and he was bent into the fetal position face down when he opened the secondary chute. The jar on his harness broke a rib which punctured a lung and he caught shrapnel in the throat on the way down.

Well, they sent him back to the States for repairs and offered him a medical discharge. He was still pissed at the Nazis and refused. Ended up in a special photographic unit in the basement of the Pentagon which microfilmed sensitive orders and documents from somewhere upstairs. These were sent to various commands around the world. Very top secret. Couldn't copy them without reading them, could they? Otto and his buddies learned two hours before take-off that Operation Overlord was to begin on June 4, 1944. Then a storm delayed the Normandy invasion until June 6. So, how do you keep him and his team from blabbing it all over town? They were locked in their basement room for 48 hours. Food was passed in through the only door and half a dozen marines stood in the corridor facing that door with submachine guns at the ready. Otto decided not to make an issue of it. Why make a fuss? Easy to get along with, Otto is.

I told him to print a picture of himself in uniform. If he doesn't he can whistle for the next birthday boy column.

Sushi Lovers Could Eat Bluefin Tuna Into Extinction

Conservationists fear Japan's craving for the species may be its undoing. In 20 years, its numbers have declined 90%.

WASHINGTON—Sushi and sashimi—Japan's two most prominent raw fish delicacies—are the world's newest villains in the battle to save endangered species.

Environmentalists say Japan's seemingly insatiable appetite for raw fish is threatening to kill off the giant bluefin, the fat, delectable Atlantic tuna that is the staple of both dishes.

Scientists estimate that, as recently as 20 years ago, more than 300,000 giant bluefin a year migrated along the western Atlantic. But years of overfishing have reduced that number to only 30,000. And conservationists fear that the fish may soon virtually disappear from U.S. waters.

Under quotas set by the 23-nation International Convention on the Conservation of Atlantic Tunas (ICCAT), the United States, Canada and Japan catch 2,660 metric tons of bluefin in the western Atlantic each year. The U.S. share is 1,500 tons. Two-thirds of that winds up in Tokyo.

THE ISSUE: The economics of tuna fishing encourages species depletion. With raw fish dishes so popular in Japan, prime bluefin fetches as much as \$40 a pound there, making a single giant tuna—which can weigh 600 pounds by the time it is 30 years old—worth almost \$24,000.

Moreover, with the numbers of giant bluefin on the decline, the depletion has led to increased pursuit of smaller fish, even the juveniles that provide the breeding population for the future.

The giant Atlantic tuna, one of the largest bony fish in the world, migrates over vast distances—from its spawning grounds in the Gulf of Mexico in early spring north through the summer to the waters off New England, Nova Scotia and Newfoundland.

With these migratory patterns—and the fact that some tuna linger in areas of the Gulf Stream—fishing goes on year-round.

THE CONTROVERSY: Conservationists and environmental groups are pushing for new international action to limit the worldwide catch.

In 1981, ICCAT imposed a quota of 1,160 metric tons for the catches of the western Atlantic. Its scientific committee recommended that the limit be "as near zero as feasible" for the succeeding two years.

But protests from fishermen—and a continuing dispute over the actual size of estimated stocks—led

officials to raise the quota back to 2,660 tons in 1982. It has remained there since.

Not surprisingly, American environmentalists are pressing for stricter quotas. And they want the 100-country Convention on International Trade in Endangered Fauna and Flora to place the fish under its protection at a meeting next March in Kyoto, Japan.

Many scientists and groups such as the World Wildlife Fund want to see giant bluefin fishing in the northwest Atlantic stopped entirely.

The Bush Administration is steering something of a middle course. It refused to call for placing the bluefin problem on the trade in endangered species convention's agenda at the Kyoto meeting. Instead, the U.S. Marine Fisheries Service has recommended that American negotiators seek to cut the western Atlantic quota by half at ICCAT's annual meeting in Madrid next month. Washington contends that tuna protection should remain in the hands of ICCAT.

OUTLOOK: For the moment, environmentalists are disappointed. "We never anticipated that the United States would support a [Convention on International Trade in Endangered Fauna and Flora] listing," said Mike Sutton, a senior project officer for the World Wildlife Fund. "The commercial fishing lobby is too powerful to resist."

But the fight may not be over. Sweden has formally called on the Kyoto meeting to ban all international trade in giant bluefin tuna, ensuring that the issue will be on the convention's agenda after all.

THE CASE FOR HEAVIER LINE - A REBUTTAL

In the last two issues of the Chum-Line we were asked to read articles by Jim Marshall extolling the virtues of light line. I must take exception on several counts.

Firstly, by implication he disparages certain members who use 20 and 30 pound test as "meat men". I just hope Bobby Horowitz didn't read those articles. Jim characterized anything heavier than 12 pound test as "rope". I'd be somewhat cautious, Jim, using that term insultingly in the presence of a cowboy. Next to his horse and a six-shooter the cowboy's best friend is his rope. With this he captures calves for branding, pulls out tree stumps, pickets his bronc and strings up outlaws. Take away his rope and you've made an enemy of a cowboy and most of them are pretty tough hombres.

Secondly, Zane Grey put sportsfishing on the map and he used linen "rope" because monofilament had not yet been invented. Have you no respect for tradition, Jim? Zane Grey was a great American, possibly as important as Davy Crockett or Nathan Hale. I don't know why you can't see that, Jim. Nathan Hale was hanged with a rope and many of us venerate his memory. Don't get me wrong, Jim. I'm not questioning your patriotism but your insistent reference to "rope" gives any right-thinking person some cause for concern. I hope the readers understand that I don't doubt your loyalty to this country but it wouldn't surprise me at all if you turned out to be against Mom's apple pie, too. Think what might have been if Johnny Appleseed had decided to not trek America planting apple seeds all over the place. We'd be eating French pastries and cheese Danish instead of Mom's American apple pie. Wouldn't our nation have been poorer without Johnny Appleseed and Zane Grey and Nathan Hale?

Let me tell you something, Jim. Russ Izor manufactures heavy line. He wouldn't try to ruin the CPA business.

The trouble with young people, Jim, is that they demand ever newer technology. They discard the tried and true: calculators to replace multiplication tables, computer games for checkers, light monofilament for rope. They're even herding cattle with helicopters. Those helicopter pilots with their black baseball caps and sun glasses are afraid to get their hands dirty. I'll bet they all have manicures. Give me a good old-fashioned horeback cowboy over a helicopter pilot in a saloon brawl any day. And, I never saw a multiplication table break down.

But, let's get back to fishing, Jim. You say you often can't pull a fish out of the kelp using light line and you consider that a virtue. Wouldn't it be smarter to use 50 pound test and yank the kelp out with the fish? Do you know how much terminal tackle costs these days? Jeff Ellis must love you. He sells terminal tackle.

You think Davy Crockett wasn't a "meat man", Jim? How do you think he ate? He went out and got himself a bear or a wild turkey. Bobby Horowitz uses 30 pound test and if that makes him a meat man then I'd say he's in pretty good company. Bobby Horowitz happens to be a friend of mine, Jim.

I got an albacore once. It was a jig fish and the line was heavy. I'm committed.

On motion of Commissioner Kobayashi, seconded by Commissioner Nuremberg and unanimously carried, the map was approved for recommendation to the Board of Supervisors.

Chairman Crew noted that Winchester Arms and others have offered to print the map for distribution. Fish and Game Warden John Hernandez will assist with updating the information included on reverse of the map.

1. Los Angeles Rod and Reel Club Foundation, to partially supplement the funds for their Sand Bass Fishery Tagging Program. Request--\$3,000

On motion of Commissioner Nuremberg, seconded by Commissioner Lippey and unanimously carried, \$3,000 was granted.

2. Los Angeles Rod and Reel Club Foundation, to partially supplement the funds available through their Foundation to conduct the Annual Under Privileged Kids Fishing Trip to be held on Monday, June 24, 1991, aboard the Barge "Annie B." located in San Pedro-Los Angeles Harbor. Request--\$2,500

On motion of Commissioner Kobayashi, seconded by Commissioner Lippey and unanimously carried, \$2,500 was granted.

Gill Net Fishing Threatens Atlantic Marine Stock, Too

Marine life in the Atlantic Ocean faces a new threat, as gill net fishermen move from the Pacific Ocean to evade tighter restrictions and bans, according to a recent article in The New York Times. The monofilament gill nets are the target of international outrage, with environmentalists and sport fishermen claiming several species are in danger of being wiped out unless the nets' use is outlawed.

Opponents also claim that the nets indiscriminately kill sea birds, marine mammals and other commercially non-viable fish which are then tossed back into the ocean.

Reports have surfaced recently of Taiwanese fishing vessels outfitted with the gill nets, docked in Port of Spain, Trinidad. Taiwanese vessels have also been reported fishing the Atlantic waters off the African coast for the last six months. Other reports have placed them in the Indian Ocean.

A resolution calling for a world-wide moratorium against the high-seas use of the nets after June, 1992, was unanimously passed by the United Nations General Assembly in December, 1991.

Particularly vulnerable are sharks, which are slow to reproduce. Dr. Carl Safina, the National Audubon Society's director of marine conservation, says it would take decades for the sharks to recover from just two to three years of gill net fishing.

Other species, such as swordfish and the bluefin tuna, both populations already reduced, could be wiped out, according to Safina.




