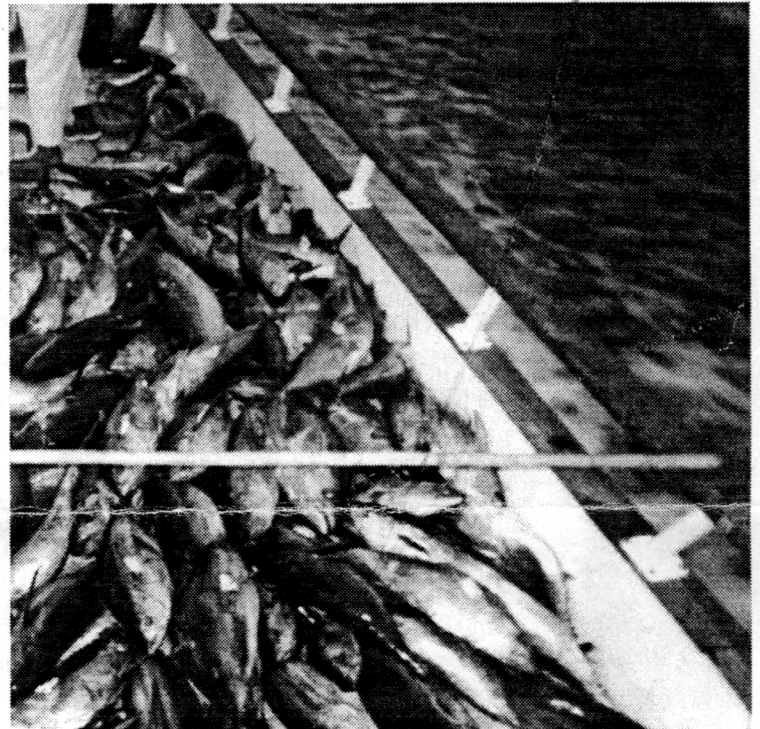

After reading your letter in the last *Chum Line* concerning the LARRC Kids' Trip, I felt compelled to write this response.

Let me first say that I have a tremendous amount of respect for you, and for all of the good things that you have done for the fishing community. I mean no disrespect to you by this response, but I strongly disagree with the sentiments you stated in your letter.

In my opinion, the reason for the 46th anniversary of the Kids' Trip is **not** "tradition." Unlike Tivea in Fiddler who said "I don't know why, but it's tradition," I believe that I do know why.

I agreed to co-chair this year's Kids' Trip because I have a genuine love of fishing, and I wanted to share my love with those less fortunate. My memories of my fishing trips, from the times I spent on the ocean with my grandfather (beginning at age 5) to the times I spent on your boat the *Peace* and continuing to date, are some of my fondest memories.

Without the Kids' Trip, these kids will never have an opportunity to share our love of the sport. Each year, I see the expressions on the faces of these kids when they catch their first fish — and I see the same joy and excitement that I have when fishing. I feel proud to know that the Kids' Trip gives each of these kids a wonderful day on the ocean.

As far as the quality of the fishing this year, I believe that the fishing was the best in years. Many of the kids caught over fifteen fish — the fish may have been small mackerel, but I don't believe that these kids care if they catch a mackerel or a white seabass — they just want to catch something — and they did.

 SUBJECT: FISHING ON THE *MEGLADON*, AUGUST 1995

Don Lee acted as Chartermaster to fishing the *Meglodon* out of San Diego. With Don were Irving Hill, Oscar Deutsch, Bob Fredericks, Dan Scott of the Padlock Ranch, Montana and Emet "Matt" Mathews.

The *Meglodon* is a 70-foot custom built sportsfisher. Built in 1979 in Port Townsend, Washington, it has undergone modifications and improvements. Most recently to the bait tanks and to enlarging the stern for greater fishing space. It is truly a fishing machine.

The boat is skippered by John Kirkpatrick who helped build the boat and has been on it ever since. John has more than 60,000 hours as skipper. The crew were also licensed. Randy Rosell, First Mate, was exceptionally capable in doing deckhand duties. Also in the crew was Steve Covington on a busman's holiday. He is otherwise the skipper of the *Pearl*, also a 70-foot custom sportfisher. He did a more than adequate job as cook and deckhand but as a member of the crew he demonstrated by his expertise and his camaraderie that he must be an even better skipper.

There was no question of who was responsible for the great fishing and the wonderful efforts made for the comfort, satisfaction and all around good time — the skipper, John Kirkpatrick!

We boarded in San Diego and headed south for 180 miles when we were attacked by a humongous school of tuna in the range of 15 to 20 pounds. They were hungry fish and every cast resulted in a hook-up in less than one minute. It soon became an opportune time to try various rigs and techniques. Don Lee and Dan Scott did a creditable (Dan is also a banker) job with fly-lines.

No matter what we did we still got a hook-up. Don ended up fishing a Salas jig with the hooks removed. He brought fish up to the boat but couldn't hold it close enough for the gaff. Emet went to a small spinning reel (Penn 450ss) with 8 pound Maxima and boated a 17 lb. 12oz. tuna. Bob Fredericks tried hypnosis from a lounge recliner, but was unable to convince anyone that there were any fish in the hold as a result of this technique. Irving Hill and Oscar Deutsch formed a partnership so as to use one rod, spelling each other at predetermined intervals. The skipper wouldn't allow them to each take credit for the fish as there was only one fish and not two fish. The judge, in his most judicial manner, cited much precedent and rules of evidence to the effect that it is impossible to catch a one-half fish. However, as the judge did not have his gavel he was unable to hammer away at the opposition or change the ruling.

The amazement was that the bite continued on and on and on. As the averaged age of the fisherman was 75, there was a lot of rest time between hookups, then leisurely meals and finally after dinner resignation to the fact that we were not going to be able to catch the entire school of fish. After having put 100 or more fish into the fishhold, we abandoned the school and went to bed. Hill and Deutsch wanted to circulate a petition to increase the count to 116 fish.

The day ended on a well fed and contented group after a deliciously prepared dinner, a dolphinfish caught by Oscar and expertly barbequed by Steve.

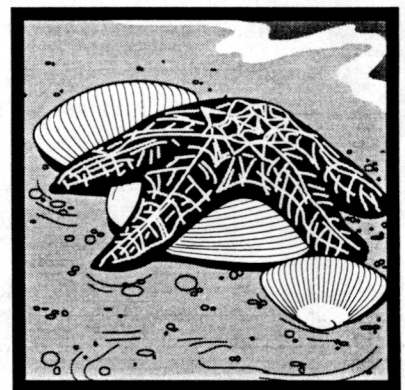
There was a short lived sense of relief and the hope of a quiet relaxed time to enjoy the wonderful weather and the calm sea the following morning. The school of tuna of the day before was gone. The peace and quiet of a gently rolling sea was not to be because the older, and heavier siblings of the previous school took their place. We were now into a school that were 30 to 75 pounds. About 45 tuna were caught before a late breakfast. Although it wasn't as hot a bite as the previous day, it was more than made up for by the weight of the fish. They were being taken on 30 and some on 40 pound line. The count was about 45 fish.

A decision was made to move on to Guadalupe Is. We were not disappointed there either. The yellowfin continued to favor us, this time they were bigger brothers, up to 80 pounds. Total: 25.

At Guadalupe we made bait at 4 a.m., the youngsters, Don Lee and Dan Scott doing heavy duty. While the crew searched for the next bite, we all had a great, leisurely breakfast which was well timed to end with the yelled "hookup." We then started to take yellowtail over 35 pounds and several yellowfin over 50 pounds. Total for the morning was 20 yellowfin.

If the count was down it was because it was a tired group. The skipper must have been chagrined that the count wasn't at least doubled as the schools we hit were big enough and were around long enough.

Our regrets to the skipper who would have liked to have a higher fish count. If it is any consolation to him we couldn't have had a better time or better fishing or a better boat or a better crew.

Growing up as I did in a "non-fishing" family, I learned most of the sport on the local lakes and partyboats by trial and error. Error won most of the battles.

To be sure, I did make an occasional friend who actually knew how to fish, (although for some reason, most of this knowledge was confined to pier fishing, trout and rockfish) but most of the time I was on my own.

One lasting impression of this era was that except for the rarest of occasions, not one person took the time to help a struggling beginner. This was particularly true on the partyboats, where the veterans seemed content to fill their sacks and keep their secrets to themselves.

For that reason, whenever I see someone not catching when everyone else is, I tend to lend a hand. Especially when that "someone" happens to be a kid.

Here's a case-in-point from earlier this summer. I was on a local party boat for what turned out to be a fair pick on the bass and a shot at the yellows (1 was eventually landed). On board were two 12-year olds — enthusiastic but ill-equipped for the task at hand.

The two youngsters fished at numerous places around the boat with little success.

At one point, they managed to cross one of the regulars. I'm not sure what they did, but it resulted in one of the worst tongue lashings they ever received. (It figures the surly sourpuss doing the yelling was easily the best stick on the boat.)

Watching all of this just a few feet away was the captain, who said nothing, undoubtedly not wanting to insult one of his steady customers.

The pair eventually made their way back towards my spot, where one attempted to launch a cast with a rock-cod pole, a Penn Long Beach reel and terminal gear I'm not sure I've seen before. The cast travelled all of 5 feet and resulted in a nasty backlash. I had finally seen enough.

I asked the youngster if he had caught any fish. He hadn't. Neither had his friend. At that point I broke out two of my outfits from the rack and instructed them to put their stuff away. The next hour or so was spent baiting hooks, demonstrating proper casting techniques and doing all the things you'd show a beginner. The result was a handful of bass and one shark each.

After a while, the captain broke his silence. He was annoyed that the baits fished on the bottom resulted in sharks. I replied that it was better to catch sharks on the bottom than to crank on nothing on top. That ended our discussion.

The two thanked me as we docked and were eager to show mom their catch in the parking lot.. (Especially the sharks!)

Did these two have a good time? Definitely. Did they learn anything? Maybe. And maybe the best anyone can hope for is that their fishing memories will be positive and they'll want to go again.

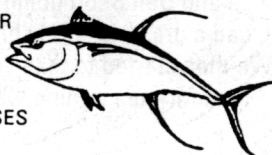
It's interesting to note that during a good mid-summer bite there were only 3 youngsters fishing that day. That seems to be the norm. But that's the subject of another column.

# Report on '95 So. Counties Dept of F.G. Meeting

On September 7th I attended Fish & Game's annual meeting as LARRC's representative. There were fewer than 30 people present, and most of those were from the county, region, or state Dept. of F&G.

There are a few points that might be of interest to our club members. These I will attempt to summarize below.

All levels of F&G are under severe budget cut pressure. This is effecting everything from enforcement to hatcheries. Wardens cannot work over 40 hours per week no matter what happens. So, if a concerned person observes an angler on the Santa Monica pier keeping a short halibut, and there happens to be a warden close by, there will be no response if that warden has already put in his 40 hours.

There is a decline in the sales of fishing and hunting licenses over all western states, but particularly in California. Reasons cited were, fishing is not as good as in prior years; the economy is bad; there were heavy snows in the Sierras; there are many single-parent families; and parents and kids have other interests.

According to their figures, 12% of adults in California fish, and 5-6% hunt.

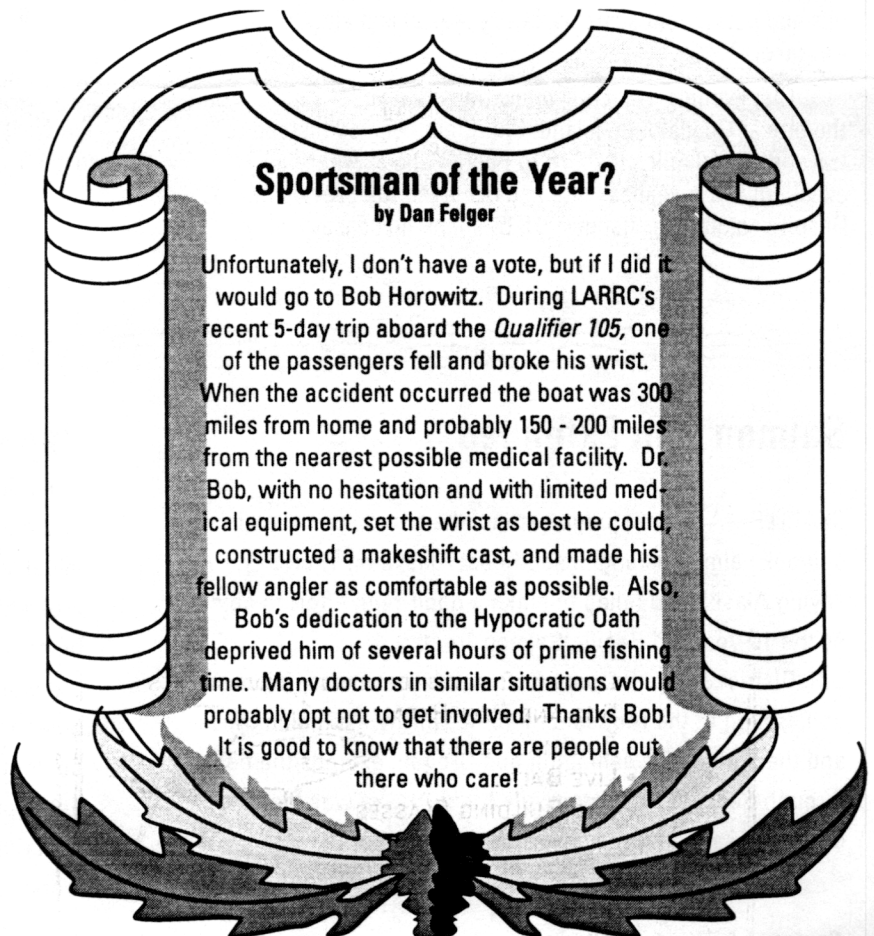
They are now using DNA testing to convict poachers of deer, elk and antelope, and they are studying ways to use DNA for fishing violations.

The forest service is looking for organizations to bring urban kids to the forest to go fishing in streams. Some fishing clubs are participating already on small scales. They have a government grant, and would like to expand. If there is any interest in this, I have the name and number of the forest service representative in charge.

Fish and Game has a new Marine Watch program. They have booklets that explain the program and allow interested parties to report any observed violations. They say that they are actually winning cases against violators this way.

There are 7 white seabass grow-out pens in operation now. The new hatchery at Carlsbad is expanding in October which will release about 300,000 fish/year. Others in Dana Point, Marina Del Rey, King Harbor, Newport Harbor, and a small facility on Catalina Island, are either releasing fish now, or soon will be, or are in various stages of expansion. A few tagged fish have been caught. There are also plans in various stages for building grow-out pens in Alamitos Bay, Huntington Harbor, Oceanside, and San Diego.

Finally, our club received kudos from Mr. Bill Beebe, who attended the meeting for *Western Outdoor News*. He told me that LA Rod & Reel does excellent work. He only wishes that all the fishing clubs did as well.

## Annual Club Trip on the Q-105 by Mark O'Brien

The annual club trip on the *Qualifier 105* (Sept. 8-13) went very well and a good time, apparently, was had by most, if not, all. While the bluefin did not materialize, we all limited out on smaller yellowfin and nice-sized yellowtail. We found the yellowfin on the first day of fishing about 130 mi. south of Pt. Loma in 70 - 72 degree water. The largest tuna approached 30 lbs., but, boy, were they hungry. The second day found the boat anchored off the "Gap" at San Benitos. We had a steady bite all day on yellowtail to over 30 lbs., on sardines, Spanish mackerel and surface iron.

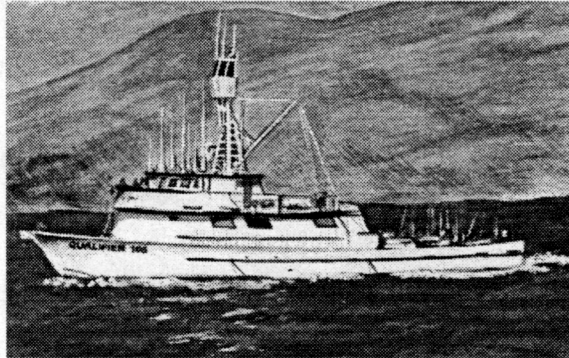
That night, we travelled to Isla Cedros to make bait, where we spent the night on anchor. In the morning, since the yellowtail wouldn't bite at Cedros, we returned to Benitos for more steady yellowtail fishing, but bigger fish. Emet Mathews won the jackpot with a 36-lb. yellow. Dan Frumkes was second at 32 lbs., and Larry Methvin and Dave Neufeld tied for third at 31 lbs.

A legal incident of note occurred when Dan Felger shamelessly confirmed he was way over limits and then willfully, maliciously and without provocation struck Capt. Klein in the chin with a hardened graphite rod, causing grievous and permanent scarring, both physical and emotional. Any takers?

That evening, rejecting indications that yellowfin were on the bite at Guadalupe Island, Cpt. Klein decided instead to travel some 50 miles inshore to Punta Canoas, where an excellent white seabass bite had occurred the previous week. Despite an all-night fishing vigil by some, no seabass were

seen. Instead, we all caught some monster calico and sand bass, whitefish, rockcod, sheepshead, etc.

On the last day, we decided to head North, hugging the coast and looking for kelp paddies. The water, however, was incredibly cold the entire way home, dropping as low as 58 degrees at some spots, and a thick fog enveloped everything. It felt like fishing out of Morro Bay. To everyone's chagrin, Capt. Klein reported that several boats out at Guadalupe had scored well that day on yellowfin up to 60 lbs.



Final fish counts were 287 YFT kept, 277 YT kept, 6,164 lbs. of whole fish filleted, and scores of YFT and YT released. I am preparing an edited videotape of the trip which I'll sell for the cost of the tape alone once finished.

Next year's club trip on the Q-105 is scheduled for Sept. 6-11, so mark your calendars now and contact Eric Rogger to sign up.

### Salmon Ban Extended

SEATTLE—A federal judge extended a ban on commercial chinook salmon fishing in southeast Alaska on Thursday, saying Alaska had failed to make a good-faith effort to abide by the 10-year-old Pacific Salmon Treaty.

U.S. District Judge Barbara Rothstein's preliminary injunction, issued at the request of Pacific Northwest Indian tribes and the states of Washington and Oregon, extends the ban through Sept. 30. Rothstein ruled that Alaska was jeopardizing the salmon run by overfishing.

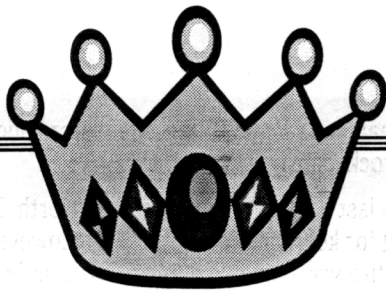

### Japan Bluefin Cage Culture—

Scientists from Kinki University have worked on breeding and rearing bluefin tuna in cages since the 1970s. Despite initial setbacks, the program has shown steady progress. Fresh bluefin tuna grown to about 30 kg in the cages are being sold at markets in Tokyo and Osaka at a wholesale price of about \$61 per kg. The higher price of cage-reared bluefin, compared to wild caught fish, is due to a greater fat content. The tuna are cultured in 30 meter cages in a water depth of about 25 meters at the University's Ohshima Experimental Station near Kushimoto. Researchers are still working on a breeding program; currently the fish for the cages are caught as 100-300 gm juveniles in trawl operations. (INFOFISH *Trade News*, February 3, 1995)

## Board Backs Sinking Old Oil Rigs for Fish

The Board of Supervisors has endorsed the concept of using chunks of old oil rigs to build artificial reefs for fish in Ventura County waters in the future.

A United Anglers of California proposal to use parts from four Chevron oil rigs for reefs fell through earlier this year because of a lack of time and money.

The four old platforms — named Heidi, Hope, Hazel and Hilda — are one to three miles offshore from Summerland and Carpinteria. They are scheduled to be removed in 1996.

Supporters hope the idea will be revived in the future.

"United Anglers is still interested in pursuing this, be it with Chevron or someone else down the road," said Frank Anderson manager of Channel Islands Harbor and a staff liaison for the county's Fish and Game Commission, which supports the rigs-to-reef idea.

The reefs would be used to attract fish to the Big Sycamore Canyon marine ecological reserve near Point Mugu for scientific study on how to boost declining fish populations.

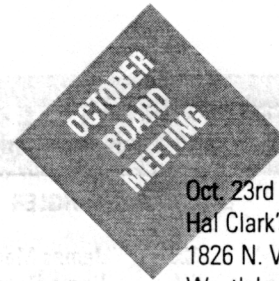

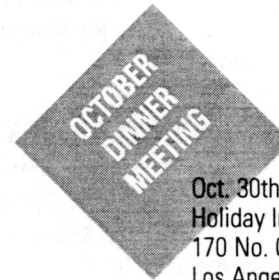

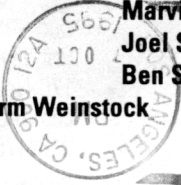
