A Qualified Success on the Qualifier 105

The long-range fishing trip on the *Qualifier 105* from September 6-11 didn't quite "out-do" last year's, but it had its moments. Okay, there were quite a few moments! It won't surprise anyone that Dan Felger took the prize for largest fish with a forty-four pound yellowfin tuna. President Randy Sharon brought a 35-pound yellowtail on board and released 36 other finned friends winning a chance in a drawing for a free long-range trip. Larry Diamant threw a 33-pound dorado on the deck and Chartermaster Eric Rogger brought up the rear (of the prize fishes) with his 32-pound yellowfin tuna. The rest of us had to be satisfied with beautiful weather, occasional rough seas (especially going up-hill), schools of colorful dorado swimming and jumping out of the kelp, gorgeous sunsets, arguably the best crew in existence, and outstanding food.

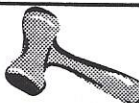
On the first day we were at the "dumping grounds" and the bite started in the dark. Of course no one made sure that the remaining sleeping anglers knew we were in fish. That's where we got most of the larger yellowfin along with some dorado. We then overnighted to Benitos Islands arriving mid-morning on Sunday finding consistent yellowtail fishing with fish averaging almost 20 pounds with many lost even on 30# line. Later in the

afternoon we tried another spot in the area which also yielded some decent calico bass most of which were released. That evening we went to Cedros to make bait — it was a struggle but we were able to get sufficient numbers of small green-back mackerel. On Monday morning, skipper John Klein tried



numerous spots around Cedros with no luck. We went back to Benitos and "what a difference a day made" — basically nothing. By early afternoon, John had us trolling back uphill looking for tuna. There were numerous stops but for small football fish of 5-10 pounds.

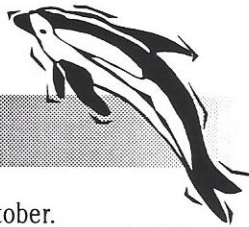

LARRC Sponsors Exciting 8-Day Trip on *Qualifier 105*



The LARRC has chartered the Qualifier 105 for an exciting 8 days of fishing next fall. The details of this trip are as follows.

1. Departure will be from San Diego on Tuesday, November 18, 1997, at approximately 12 noon.
2. The boat will travel south fishing areas such as Guadalupe Island, Cedros Island, Benitos Island, Alijos Rocks, The Ridge, Magdalena Bay, Potato Bank, Morgan Bank, Golden Gate Bank, and Finger Bank.
3. Arriving at Cabo Wednesday morning, November 26.
4. From Cabo San Lucas the participants would fly to Los Angeles to arrive mid-afternoon. Separate arrangements can be made for those who may wish to stay in Cabo, or those whose destination is other than Los Angeles.
5. The eight-day flyback-trip will provide as much fishing time as a ten-day trip returning to San Diego.
6. Targeted species will be yellowfin, yellowtail, wahoo, dorado, grouper and maybe marlin.
7. The cost is \$2100 per person, which includes the trip, all tips (no individual tipping will be permitted), soft drinks and beer, fish filleting (all fish will be pooled and each person will get 2-50 boxes of assorted fillets suitable for airline transportation).
8. Not included are Mexican licenses (currently \$10.50 per person per day), possible fuel surcharge, tackle purchases and rentals (the boat has a complete supply of tackle and it is recommended that large tackle boxes be left at home; you will pay only for what is used). Rental tackle is also available. Not included is air transportation, travel from Los Angeles to San Diego, and transportation from the boat to

the Cabo Airport. Your Chartermaster will be making arrangements for group discount airfare, vans from L.A. to San Diego, and transportation from the boat to the Cabo Airport.

9. Reservations are on a first come first serve basis, and must be accompanied by a \$400 deposit. **Checks are to be**

made payable to the Los Angeles Rod and Reel Club and forwarded to the Chartermaster, Dan Felger, at 5530 Corbin Avenue, Suite 120, Tarzana, California 91356.

Club members and their guests will have priority until 12/31/96.

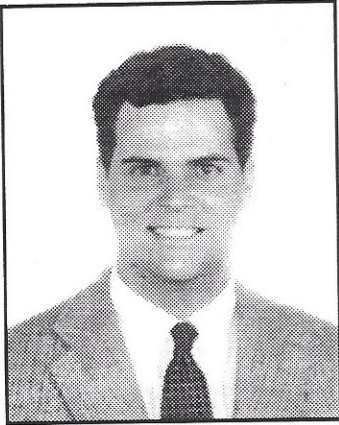
on-board conscience. When we were done, the fish box and trash barrels were full and the deck was covered with blood.

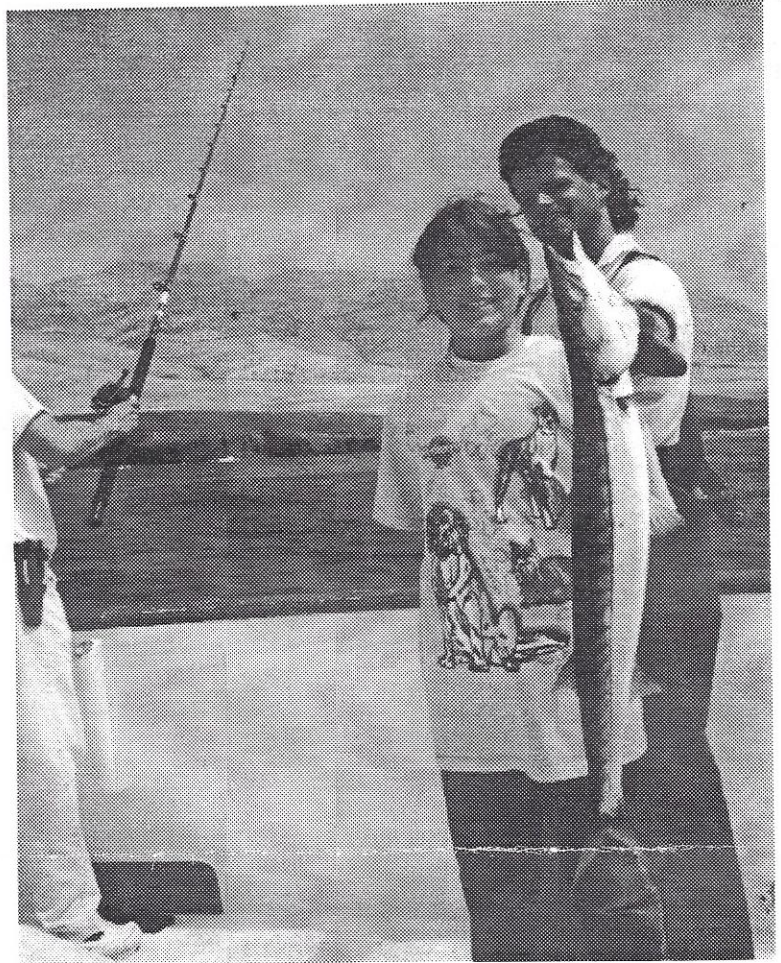


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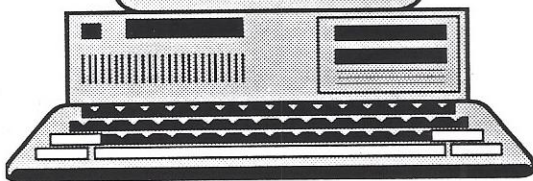

Government and Conservation

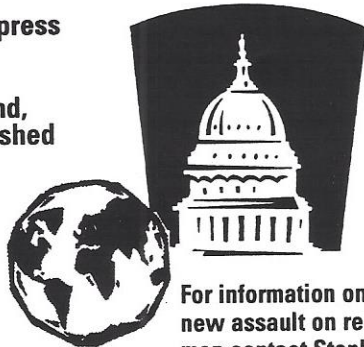
The views I am about to express are my own — they are not the views of the LARRC Board of Directors or its membership. And, yes, this subject matter is enmeshed in politics

I have been concerned for some time that our California Department of Fish and Game has not been able to properly manage our fisheries. The reasons for this are legion: insufficient staffing, lack of sufficient funds, lack of clarity of mission caused by intervening and sometimes overriding political considerations. This has all lead to an erosion of effective enforcement of our fish and game regulations and I think the effects on our fishing are becoming more and more apparent every day. Lest this sound like a bashing of DFG, I want to be clear that I sympathize with the plight but nevertheless deplore the results. Effective management of our fisheries may, at this point, be far beyond the jurisdiction or capacity of DFG. After all, environmental considerations (such as pollution and destruction of habitat) are probably playing as great a role as overfishing or illegal fishing in the decline of our fisheries.

My concern was heightened this month as I read some articles about the effectiveness, or rather the lack of effectiveness of the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS), and other regulatory agencies. First, the tuna situation on the Atlantic Coast. This has been deplored publicly by sportfishing interests but to little avail. The regulations imposed this season so clearly penalized sportfishing and favored commercial harvesting and with predictable results. But NMFS has apparently compounded this "crime" with a bit of statistical chicanery.

Here is an excerpt from an article on the internet by a New York-based radio personality who does a nationally syndicated talk show on fishing (unfortunately not carried in Los Angeles).

"Look out recreational anglers. Your yellowfins are being stolen under your collective noses. The latest ICCAT report shows 4072 metric tons of yellowfins were allegedly landed by recreational anglers. This amounts to 7.50 fish per boat per season. In actuality, recreational fishermen catch 20,000 metric tons per year or an average of 37 fish per boat per season. The Nationals Marine Fishery Service is keeping the count low so that when a quota system comes into effect the commercial interests

Next, I read with increasing concern the editorial in the September 6 issue of *Western Outdoor News* critical of NMFS activity in steelhead regulation. Again, a bit of tinkering with sound science by the ubiquitous NMFS and again a ludicrous outcome at the expense of sportfishing, this time on the Pacific Coast. The editorial pointed out that the NMFS has departed from sound scientific principles in defining the steelhead habitat ("The NMFS will not list critical habitat when it lists the Steelhead. And federally approved projects such as grazing, mining, road construction, dam construction and operation, discharge of fill material, stream channelization or diversion will be allowed under the NMFS listing"). The bottom line is that the NMFS is proposing regulations that will ban all steelhead fishing in almost all waters in Oregon and California. Furthermore, the way the proposed regulations are worded the prohibition against "taking" steelhead will prohibit all catch and release as well. Say good-bye to steelhead fishing in California. What is so mind boggling about this action by NMFS is the twisted logic that permits the continued rape and devastation of the habitat, which will lead to the decimation of steelhead faster than all sport fishing, yet the proposed protective action is to prohibit all sportfishing, including catch and release. Talk about "weird science," this has to be it.

As if that were not enough, another article on the internet by a knowledgeable and concerned fisherman in Northern California decries the mismanagement of the salmon fishery.

"Thanks to the regulations imposed by the Department of Fish and Game, within three miles of shore, and the Pacific Fishery Management Council, 3-200 miles from shore, the regulations designed to protect the endangered winter-run Chinook, have resulted in the mindless slaughter of thou-

sands of fish.

"Regulations allowing mooching, with a high percentage of gut hookups, and setting a minimum of 26" with a two-fish limit, caused anglers last weekend to attempt to release thousands of mortally hooked fish which were keepers under last years regulations. Dead fish were floating all over the place and the sea lions were having a feast. In the salmon life cycle, ocean fish are broken down into one-year/two-year/three-year/four-year and five-year fish. Then they spawn and die. Since there are many more one-year fish than two-year and so on due to predation, disease and fishing pressure (commercial and recreational) the population is essentially a pyramid, with older fish being closer to spawning age, and therefore far more valuable fish.

"To require anglers to keep more valuable fish and release less-valuable fish, in spawning terms, has the exact opposite effect on winter-run Chinook as that intended. This is the law of unintended consequences in perfect illustration. We need to amend the regulations to make anglers keep the first two fish, with say a fifteen-inch minimum.

Jim Paulk, President of United Anglers of Southern California wrote to me last week that "Senator Mello, a United Anglers advocate, wrote a letter to Rollie Smitten, head of NMFS, asking him to fire the western regional director of NMFS over the salmon issue."

I read these things and wonder why it seems so often the actions of our government agencies run directly contrary to the conservation purposes for which they are formed. It is apparent to me that none of the agencies involved have conservation or preservation of the fisheries as their goal. And it is equally apparent they are not managing the resources with any degree of effectiveness. If they cannot, then let's get rid of the agencies. If they can and are not, then let's staff them with people who will. But as a taxpayer I do not think I am getting my money's worth from these agencies. As a sportfisherman, paying perhaps the highest license fees in the country, I fear for the future of fishing. The day may be approaching when the youngsters who come to the sport believe lizard fish and tom cod are sport fish. Sad.

And that is just my opinion.

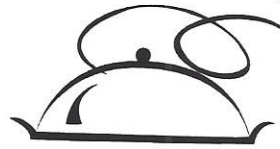

SEA LANDING — SANTA BARBARA

1996 — 10/16, 10/30, 11/13-14*, 12/4

*2-Day trip to San Miguel **King of the Calicos

1. Departure Time will be at 5:00 am, from Sea Landing, Santa Barbara. However, some trips may depart earlier. These earlier departures will be at the sole discretion of the CHARTER MASTER after consultation with the Skipper.
2. The trips will be planned for local surface calico bass; however, opportunities to fish for exotics, such as white sea bass and yellowtail or salmon, will take precedent. Also, several trips will be for light tackle rockfish and/or halibut at Santa Rosa or San Miguel Island. Other trips may be to Point Conception.
3. Return time will usually be 4:30 - 5:00pm, but could be earlier or later depending on fishing conditions and weather, and will be determined by the Skipper.
4. Bunks will be on a first come basis and cannot be reserved. However, the CHARTER MASTER may reserve two, large forward bunks for those participants who because of age or physical limitations require special consideration. If you think you qualify please let the CHARTER MASTER know.
5. Loads will be limited to 16 adults or 17 people if juniors are participating. The CHARTER MASTER reserves the right to overbook by one.
6. Cost: \$85.00 2:00am departure; \$75.00 5:00am departure 2-day Trip — \$245
Junior members pay 50% (up to 2 per trip). With the uncertainty of fuel costs there may be a fare adjustment.
7. Charter price includes trip, bait, soft drinks, beer, icing fish, BREAKFAST AND LUNCH. Not included are tips and fish cleaning. (Please be generous with the tips for the crew).
8. Reservations should be made through Arnie Cohen, 11101 Viking Ave., Northridge, CA 91326, Phone-Msg. Ctr. (818) 366-3300, Home Phone (818) 368-5834, FAX (818) 366-4945. 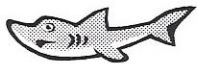

**UASC CO-SPONSORS
MIGRATORY FISH SYMPOSIUM**



Last fall, several UASC Board Members attended a conference convened by the National Coalition for Marine Conservation (NCMC) to deal with the absence of legislation or rules for the highly migratory fish of the Pacific Ocean.

Unrestrained fishing combined with a lack of scientific knowledge leads to unsustainable fisheries and depletion of major species. This is the experience the United States and other nations have had with the Atlantic fisheries. As a result a number of rebuilding programs and restrictions have had to be instituted there.

Quoting NCMC "The Pacific Community is confronted with a challenge and an opportunity in the future management of its valuable but vulnerable pelagic fisheries. "United Anglers is co-sponsoring this event on November 4-6, 1996 at the Monterey Bay Aquarium. We invite members to attend and perhaps combine this "learning" trip with a visit to the Monterey Bay Aquarium, which has just opened its new offshore million gallon tank. This contains the only known collection of tuna captured for scientific study.

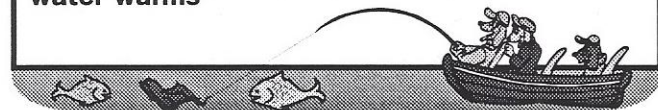
