August 10-15, 1996

The good news is, we caught 236 yellowfin tuna, 98 dorado, 130 yellowtail, some calico and whitefish. The bad news is that it had to end too soon!

DATA:

- Polaris Supreme:**
- Roomy enough for munchkins and the giants
 - 3 tables and a sitting area in the galley
 - 2 state rooms and a head on galley level
 - 12 state rooms with closets, and 2 heads with showers on the lower level (I could actually bend my back to wash my feet without having to open the shower door!)
 - Comfortable upper deck
 - Main deck has relatively low rails, plenty room for tackle boxes
 - Seating accommodations on the deck: If you're bigger than a bucket, you're out of luck!

FISHING THE KELPS


Most fishing trips leaving San Diego this time of year will be fishing kelp paddies on their way south. Many of these stops will be very productive yielding yellowtail, tuna and dorado. While most anglers will have success using live bait, often the larger fish will be taken on jigs.

The trick using jigs is to let them sink 100 feet or more. You don't have to be right on the kelp either. Fish the bow, away from the bait guys. Cast below the kelp and let the jig sink. Once the jig has reached the desired depth, retrieve as fast as possible.

It is necessary to use a heavy jig, Taddy 9 and UFO 5 are two of the better choices. Chrome, blue and white and scrambled eggs have proven excellent fish catchers.

More Good Ol' Days

P*olaris, Admiral, Natomah, New Long Fin!*
These were the boats that I fished on during the "fabulous '50s" and was the fishing ever ...fabulous!

In the early to mid-'50s, I was bitten by the bug. At 2:00 pm everyday I would call the Point Loma Sportfishing office for the daily fish count. In those days anything under 1,000 yellowtail for the fleet was nothing to get excited about. But, if the count was up, I was...gone! The *Polaris*, Bill Poole's 63 foot converted Air Sea Rescue craft, was consistently top boat in the fleet. And, of course, that's where I was. This original *Polaris* was the forerunner of Bill's later, more posh boats, the latest of which is the 120 foot *Excel*.

I first fished the *Admiral* in 1952. It was owned and operated by a massive hulk (6' 2", 275 lbs.) of a young man my own age by the name of Mal Fink, the father of LARRC's Dan, and it was out of Port Orange in Newport Beach. Wednesdays aboard the *Admiral* was spinning only and that's where I got my first taste of the "coffee grinder." The *Admiral* was a 42 foot boat, built as a water taxi. It had no bunks, but was a great boat to fish from. A typical trip left Port Orange at 5:00 am, and fished either Dana Point for barracuda or, if the albacore were running, we could go out to the 14 mile bank. Mal was the original "Captain Midnight" and sometimes we didn't get in until (would you believe) the ungodly hour of 6-7 pm!

The *Natomah* was an old boat even in the '50s. It was owned by Past President Horace Denner. It was approximately 50 feet long, with a 10-foot beam and a step-up to the bow. It would even rock-n-roll in the calm of the San Pedro Harbor. In spite of its questionable seaworthiness and other obstacles, I caught many fish on the *Natomah*.

In the '50s, the *New Long Fin* was owned and operated in San Pedro by a fiery rebel by the name of Russ Izor. Russ believed that the world was flat and that the drop off was somewhere just beyond Catalina. He and I didn't get along too well in those days and poor Russ would groan every time he saw me come aboard. The *New Long Fin* was about 42 feet long and an ideal fishing boat. Catalina was Russ' island, and no one has ever, or probably ever will, know this island as well as he.

The '50s were good times. However, the thing that I miss the most is not the fabulous fishing, but the companionship of my two closest fishing buddies, who passed on well before their time. Eddie Gordon and Shelly Flier, I sure do miss you!

FISHING TRUTHS or How 'Murphy's Law' Relates to Fishing

As all anglers know, there are certain truisms that almost always turn out poorly for the fisherman. Here are a few we know about. If you have any good ones to add, send them to IGFA.

1. When conditions are supposed to be just right, they won't be.
2. The number of fish caught by an angler is in inverse proportion to how much they deserve it.
3. When a fish falls off the hook and lands on the gunwale, 99% of the time it will bounce overboard.
4. The more money you paid for your fishing pliers, the more likely you are to drop them overboard.
5. The more important it is to get an early start, the greater the chance that someone in your group will be late.
6. If you have six lines in the water, the biggest fish of the day will always hit the one with a nick in it.
7. The biggest fish always hits the lightest line.
8. The angler that brags the most catches the least.
9. Where the fish were biting yesterday, they won't today.
10. The jet ski always arrives on the flat just as you spot a bonefish.

The Ultimate Fish Wrestling Match

Down in Mississippi, real men who fish disdain using those whippy little fishing rods. In fact, they don't use hooks, lines, leaders or anything resembling standard fishing gear. What's their secret? They use their hands for bait.

While fully clothed, these intrepid explorers of swift and muddy current, dodging water moccasins and other debris dive down in search of catfish — really big catfish. In handfishing, as this sport is called, anything under 24 inches is not a keeper and has to be er, thrown, er, shaken off, er, released.

Handfishing is done in early summer in the Mississippi Delta. Favorite locales for this are rivers and oxbow lakes. The quarry of choice is the flathead catfish. Prehistoric looking, they are squinty-eyed and yellowish. A really big one, however, is big enough to swallow a basketball, while it's still in the net. Forty-pounders are common and a few have been caught that scale out over ninety pounds.

In season, the method is to find a catfish bed, typically a hollow log, where females have just laid their eggs. A male catfish stands guard nearby. The grabber reaches in and the male catfish bites the hand. The handfisher now attempts to retrieve the fish and his hand back to the water's surface.

Handfishing is also known as grabbing or grappling. "It is no sport for the weak," says Ronnie Davis, an experienced hand grabber. He continued, "I put my foot at the whole of a big blue cat, and the fish bit the tennis shoe off of my foot. I went back down and snatched it out of his mouth." His personal best is a seventy-five pounder.

This sport is not for those who heal slowly. Grabbers get knocked around a lot, with scars, abrasions, and broken bones a common occurrence. Herman Green, a 72 year-old Louisiana learned the sport from a blind hand-fisherman. He has a crooked middle finger that occurred when a record sixty-five pound catfish went crazy.

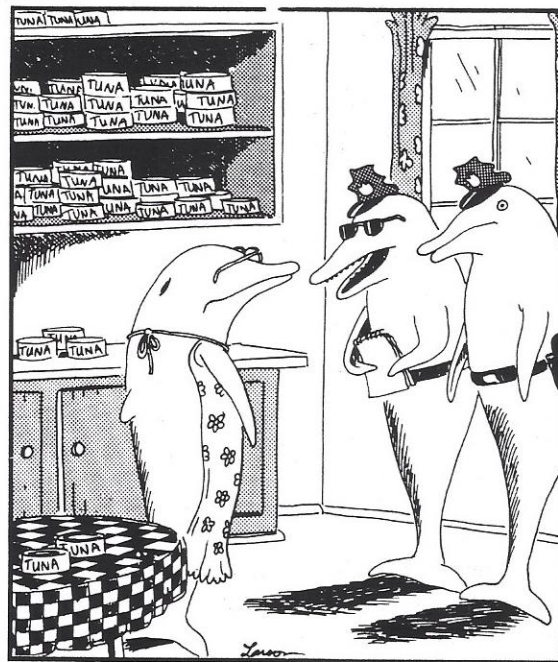
Mr. Green says he has even been rolled over by sixty-pounders who use their tail to "roll me over and over underwater." A day of grabbing sometimes has tragic results. A twenty-eight year-old man died in Oklahoma when his arm became trapped between pieces of concrete when he was hand-grabbing.

Smaller blue catfish proliferate but the prize to covet is *Pylodictis olivaris* or flathead, yellow cat or mudcat, which is generally the largest and among the tastiest. One allure of grabbing is that a good trip can fill a freezer with catfish, a Southern delicacy best fried in cornmeal coating.


The U.S. catfish record is 109 pounds, 4 ounces. The fish was taken by rod and reel; there is no category for hand-grabbers.

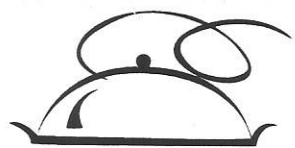

SEA LANDING — SANTA BARBARA**
1996 — 9/4, 9/18, 10/2**, 10/16, 10/30, 11/13-14*, 12/4
*2-Day trip to San Miguel **King of the Calicos

- Departure Time will be at 5:00 am, from Sea Landing, Santa Barbara. However, some trips may depart earlier. These earlier departures will be at the sole discretion of the CHARTER MASTER after consultation with the Skipper.
- The trips will be planned for local surface calico bass; however, opportunities to fish for exotics, such as white sea bass and yellowtail or salmon, will take precedent. Also, several trips will be for light tackle rockfish and/or halibut at Santa Rosa or San Miguel Island. Other trips may be to Point Conception.
- Return time will usually be 4:30 - 5:00pm, but could be earlier or later depending on fishing conditions and weather, and will be determined by the Skipper.
- Bunks will be on a first come basis and cannot be reserved. However, the CHARTER MASTER may reserve two, large forward bunks for those participants who because of age or physical limitations require special consideration. If you think you qualify please let the CHARTER MASTER know.
- Loads will be limited to 16 adults or 17 people if juniors are participating. The CHARTER MASTER reserves the right to overbook by one.
- Cost: \$85.00 2:00am departure; \$75.00 5:00am departure 2-day Trip — \$245
Junior members pay 50% (up to 2 per trip). With the uncertainty of fuel costs there may be a fare adjustment.
- Charter price includes trip, bait, soft drinks, beer, icing fish, BREAKFAST AND LUNCH. Not included are tips and fish cleaning. (Please be generous with the tips for the crew).
