**LARRC'S ANNUAL 52ND KIDS' TRIP  
TAKES OFF!**



Just about every organization has a “signature event”. For the Los Angeles Rod and Reel Club, it's our annual Kids' Trip.

The Kid's Trip dates back to our founding year, 1950 and has been held every year since. In that time we have hosted more than 25,000 disadvantaged young people to a half-day of ocean fishing—many for the first time.

As far as we know, LARRC invented the concept of the youth fishing program. Outdoor Life magazine even did a feature article on the 1952 trip, providing LARRC with national coverage. For many years, the Kids' Trip received regular newspaper and television coverage in the greater L.A. area. Sad to say that coverage no longer exists.

This year's Kids' Trip (Monday July 11) ran like a well-oiled machine and every kid on every boat (178 in all) caught fish. A few fell victim to “mal de mer”, but other than that, no complaints.

This event takes months of planning and plenty of “sweat equity” to pull off. So at the risk of forgetting someone who put in more than their fair share of time, here are those that made a difference.

**Paul Varenchik.** Every year Paul coordinates this complex event, deals with the landing, coordinates delivery of most of the food and does it with a smile. People like Paul don't come around very often. We're lucky to have him.

**Linda Simon,** wife of Foundation Chairman Steve Simon, arranges for the groups. It's endless emails, letters and phone calls, yet Linda makes it look effortless. Job well done.



Lori and I met **Scott Schiffman** at Gallions Corner in Castaic at 5:30 a.m. on Sunday, June 26th to begin a day of Striped Bass fishing on Castaic Lake. We successfully bid on a trip with Scott at the Awards Banquet and had been looking forward to our chance to catch some stripers. We loaded our gear into the boat, parked our car and headed off to the lake.

We successfully launched Scott's very comfortable boat and away we went. Scott headed to the buoy line at the back dam, looked around until he metered some fish and we set out two anchors to hold us in place in front of a promising looking cover. We baited up with chunk sardine and sat back with anticipation.

Lori was the first to get bit and she connected with her first striper ever! I knew that she was having fun since stripers are strong hard fighters and because of her huge smile. It wasn't long before she caught another nice one and Scott and I looked at each other—we knew we were being schooled by Lori. We got bites but no fish. I finally connected and had a nice fight with a decent sized fish. Then a lull in the action set in. We discussed tried-and-true things to do to get the fish to bite but it wasn't until Lori pulled out a sandwich and had a knife full of mayo in her hand when her rod started jump-

She got the mayo under control and had another nice fight on her hands, this was a bigger fish that walked her around the boat a bit but she won out in the end and landed another nice one. I followed that a while later with my personal best striper: **Man, do those fish fight hard for their size!** Fishing with Scott is a great experience because he is a wonderful host and knows his quarry, he is a student of the striped bass, knows its biology, habits and menu. ## Sophia Hyunh Reports On Her Trip to Kingfisher Lodge

**W**hat is green and white, has two eyes on one side and has never been hooked by Health and Happiness Chairperson **Sophia Hyunh**? It is a halibut! This fish has eluded my hooks for many years. I have been on trips where anglers on both sides of me have hooked up on halibuts or there was a hot-halibut bite the day before and after I went out. Well, all that changed this June when I went fishing out of Kingfisher Lodge Charters in Sitka, Alaska.

As we began our descent through the clouds, the view of the islands and town of Sitka opened up. All the mountains were green and the very tops snow covered, there are so many islands in the bay—some with private homes or B&B's tucked between the trees. When we landed, two guides were waiting for our anxious eight person group. They helped with the luggage and tried to get us focused enough to get on the shuttle bus to take us to **Shee Atika Totem Square Inn**, where we spent the first night.

The first full day in Sitka was spent with the “newbies” sightseeing and three “oldies” going on a beautiful waterfall hike and to the “fortress of the bears”. The newbies visited the Totem National Park, walked to the Raptor Center and hitched a ride with a shuttle van around town. We took a taxi to the Sheldon Jackson College Hatchery and Aquarium.

(Anyone interested in my tested “One-Day Sitka Tour Map” let me know!) Kingfishers picked us up at 3 p.m. to take us to their lodge where the fishing adventure began. The accommodations are amazing: 4 bedrooms with a bath in each, spacious living/kitchen/dining areas. With 7 lady anglers and one gentleman angler it was quite comfortable. Delicious appetizers were dropped off prior to dinner at 6 p.m. Great food, choice of entrees, soup and salad bar with great desserts to follow.

Rise and shine was at 4:30 a.m. breakfast at 5 and on the way to the harbor by 6 a.m. The first day was on the *Kaiya* with Captain Bryan and our

total that day was 9 halibut, 2 yellow eye, a dogface shark, a skate, 3 kings, 1 lingcod, and at least 20 “pinkies” on the line. We saw puffins, sea otters and humpback whales. Conditions were unbelievable: flat seas, blue skies, no wind and too much fun. The second day on the *Kaiya* with Captain Paul and our count was lots of miscellaneous rock fish, four kings, 4 pinkies, 1 silver, 3 short lingcods, 2 yelloweye, 2 big coppers, several black bass and one china rockfish. We also had a grey whale about 20 feet off the bow. The third and final day was exciting! **Sandi** reeled in a 200-lb. halibut which was safely released, a 47” ling, a 25-lb. king, 37” halibut and limits on silvers and pinks, some black bass and chuckleheads. The weather was great and the fishing everything I hoped for and definitely would love to go back next year!

## Bert Serden Reports on North King Lodge Trip

**M**embers **Bert Serden, Dietmar Kruger, Ted Weitz** together with friends and family members recently completed a 3-day fishing trip to a remote bay 250 miles north of Vancouver, but one that turned out to last more than six days as a result of bad weather.

Travel to the lodge requires an overnight in Vancouver, a flight the next day to the north of Vancouver and then a float plane to the lodge with planned fishing a half-day on the days of arrival and departure with two more full days in between.

Weather did not allow us to get there as planned, nor to depart as planned, so instead of traveling from July 1 to July 5, we travelled from July 1 to July 7.

While almost every one of our 11 fishermen could report salmon limits (4 kings, 4 cohos) halibut limits and ling cod eluded some. It also should be reported that there was significant but not measured catch-and-release fishing, which is helped by barbless hooks used in B.C. waters, along with single action 10-foot fly

rods for salmon. The Lodge records indicated that the 35 fishermen left with 2,250-lbs. of fillets or 4500 lbs of live catch.

Needless to say, skies were overcast, rainy and the days were windy. Since the fishing is primarily in the lee of the numerous islands in the area, no one was inhibited from going out in the open, well-equipped boats. Warm, cold-weather gear and oilskins provided by the lodge protected us against the elements. The weather in sharp contrast to the sunny skies in Vancouver.

**W**hy get up at 2:30 am to catch fish at 1:00pm? Because you have to pay your dues to catch the elusive white seabass. That's what Club members, **Rob Masters, Ross Lombard** and **Nick Ekdahl**, along with a group of friends found while fishing the *Highliner* on July 2nd.

We were on the water before 5:00am fishing the grey light with dozens of private boaters in the latest WSB hot spot. Unfortunately, neither the fish or the current received the invitation as we spent hours drowning

squid with no bites. Two extra-large bat rays were hooked but muscling-up trash can lids isn't why we woke up early.

**Capt. Gary** tried a number of spots around PV with similar results.

Then after lunch, we parked in the 'hot afternoon WSB spot' near Pt. Vicente. Conditions were optimal...71 degree water and a good current flowing away from the stern. This commotion brought curious WSB and calicos to the surface. And the pandemonium was on! One hook up, then two, then two more! It was common to have three to four of our eight anglers hooked up at once. Gary and TC worked double time netting and measuring WSB. The bite lasted a good hour during which 14 legal WSB were landed and double that in shorts were tossed back. We also caught 20 calicos, 1 legal ling and a dozen various rockfish.

The jackpot fish was a 38-lb. WSB caught by Ross. Rob caught a very impressive 8-lb. calico. Everyone caught at least one legal WSB, so a memorable time was had by all. ***Definitely worth losing sleep over!***

## MLPA UPDATE...

Sept. 26 is the date set for a hearing in San Diego Superior Court. The judge will decide if the Fish and Game Commission exceeded its authority when it devised its network of Marine Protected Areas.

The petitioners have challenged the statutory authority to adopt MPAs. They have also claimed the failure to obtain coastal development permits in setting their zones. Also challenged is the commission's failure to comply with CEQA. (California Environmental Quality Act).

## IN CASE YOU HAD NOT SEEN IT...

The *Los Angeles Times* carried an article on bluefin tuna farming in the July 21st, Food Section.

Those club members who ride the boats south on multiple-day trips have often seen the tuna pens near Ensenada. Recently another set of pens were set up at the Coronado Islands. Fearful of the diminishing availability of the bluefin in the face of its' increasing prices, commercial interests are now growing these top predators in 100-foot deep nets. There are a total of 32 pens—each can accommodate 60 tons of fish. The owners, Umami Seafoods, claims their operation has left but a small environmental foot print.

An accompanying illustration showed the tuna being fed shovels of sardines in an effort to bring these fish to a weight of 300 lbs. The tragedy of this is the effect this has on the ocean food chain when it takes 17 lbs. of sardines to add one pound of weight to the bluefin!

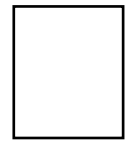
