## When Superlatives Fail

This is a fish report....it's the story of a 10-day trip about 800 miles south of San Diego. The objective of the trip was to offer some very serious fishermen a chance at tuna and wahoo. So, we'll dispense with the usual remarks concerning the loading of bait, clearing Point Loma

and the mention of the players' anxieties and preparations.

Stories of large tuna, our prime target, abound in the media—indeed an unofficial count for this season shows at least 200 of these cows decked. The closure of the Revilla caused the long-range boats to concentrate on Hurricane

## Superlatives Fail Continued from Page 1

Bank, a very productive area about 1000 miles down in international waters, requiring at least four days of travel and the consequent 16-18 day voyages.


This season however has seen much new emphasis on cow fishing (i.e. anything over 200 lbs.) on the part of the ten-day trips. The media is replete with extensive reports of these trips, some runs reporting up to 30-plus cows per voyage. Noted popular reporter **Bill Roecker**—"this weekend was the first time I could not interview every one of the cow catchers in my fifteen years of covering the landing". Sheer numbers were the problem.

We were under way during the third day of travel, the fishing seminars having been held, checking out the occasional kelp paddy for life and searching for warmer waters. In an area approximately west of Magdalena Bay, with the

water temp in the low- to mid-seventies, the search became more immediate. The sonar showed occasional sightings of fish at various depths. Crew members scanning the sea from the mast, reported many schools of dolphin, indeed the sea life was quite abundant.

Tuna are supposed to swim with dolphin but, we now learned that "black bellies" were the preferred target vs. the "white bellied" species. We could see literally acres of dolphin and chased these for hours without a great deal of success. Meter marks seemed to hold the most promise, the boat would be stopped, bait chummed or even brailed, with the drift fishing going on for long periods. The second and third day of this activity resulted in a fair number of larger fish caught as well as some quick hook ups on the kites. November 4 was the date to remember, it was also our fourth day on the banks.

Sardines were used on double-rigged kite outfits. Ever see **two huge** fish going after one of these kites is an experience? Getting fish to bite in areas with much sea life, including forage fish, presents its own set of problems (i.e. demands patience). The closest we came to wide-open fishing occurred on this day when the larger fish seemed to be “on the feed” and things really got serious.

**E**pic, sensational, incredible, are just a few inadequate words to describe the action. Every crew member plus the two from the galley were helping on the blood soaked deck. Over and under was the order of the day, staying in front of your fish was mandatory and the use of 100-lb.-minimum tackle essential. The crew helped save many of our fish since being pinned to the rails definitely restricts your movement. No fish were lost due to tangles. Reels clipped onto a harness, which allows supportive leg muscle use, helped restore circulation to tired forearms. Tuna use mainly their caudal fins to propel themselves and when they hit the deck—stand clear—while the staccato beat of their tails results in a veritable shower of bloody water. The sound to the lucky fisherman is like manna from heaven. Fresh hookups occurred continuously! Grown men screamed and cursed.....Cow fishing heaven! It’s also been called cava-ville.

Our mode of fishing was drift fishing and the choppy seas added another hurdle to the standup adventurers. Eleven cows were landed this day—Nov. 4th—an incredible total of 15 fish over 200 lbs. for the trip. One of these was accounted for by **Norman Moltar**, who celebrated his 85th birthday while on the trip and spent an unbelievable 3? hrs. at the rail one day using 60-lb. line. Seventeen of the 21 anglers achieved their personal bests. The sole

lady angler, **Pam Waters**, achieved a new personal best and landed two cows. Beginner, **Don Hanes** also got two and wound up as jp winner with a 287-lb. monster. Fellow LARRC member **Bill Vogel** got a personal best at 197 lbs. Many fish were landed in the 100-lb.-plus category.

The most painful part of this tale is my personal experience. This fish took me around the boat twice, in and out of tangles, and why did he like the bow so much? I came face to face with my own inadequacies when I simply could not lift my severely bent rod, and my fish finally spit the hook. **Capt. Rothery** assured me I had done nothing wrong—long fights often work to gouge a hole in the fish’s mouth. Some say a ringed hook might be the answer to this problem. I was pleased however, that my line held, the knots, the crimps, etc. That sucker must have weighed at least 500 lbs. Small consolation!. The wahoo were scarce with but 11 landed.

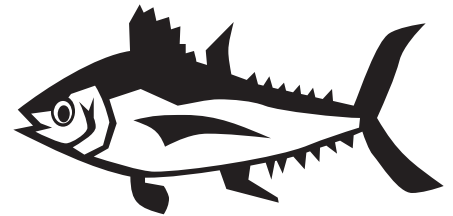
During the course of our Nov. 4th outstanding bite, we depleted our supply of sardines. The estuary of Mag Bay seemed to provide an unlimited amount of mackerel bait which we stopped to fish successfully that evening. An overnight, northward run took us to Thetis bank and a couple of other not too productive banks. Clam Bay, however provided up with a nice yellowtail bite, nothing by way of large fish—in the range of 15-30 lbs. Our total on these was about fifty fish.

Successful cow fishermen (and lady) would receive a *Polaris Supreme* 200-lb.-Jacket as proof of their achievement.. This amazing season at the lower Baja banks has caused landings to book additional trips and order a new supply of jackets.

No fish report would be complete without mentioning the crew: **Derek, Jason, Mike, 2nd skipper Drew Henderson and Tommy Rothery. Joe**

from the galley helped work the deck and **Chef Javier** whipped up some outstanding food. Examples: Chilean Sea Bas, Chioppino, Steak and Lobster Tails, Rack of Lamb etc. This *Polaris Supreme* trip was organized by my friend **Larry Brown** and I should mention that major donations of fish are always made on his charters to the benefit of San Diego charities.

### Progress Report...???

Meetings under the Marine Life Protection Act (MLPA) are continuing under the aegis of the Blue Ribbon Task (BRTF). Input from stakeholders in the Central Coast area—Point Conception to Monterey—has now crystallized into a range of options for new network of Marine Protected Areas (MPAs). The MLPA initiative came to life through the donation of private enviro money donated to the state for this purpose. Many people have found this to be objectionable questioning the fairness of decisions made, literally, by “interested” parties. Now the State of California is being sued on these grounds. Coastside Fishing Club, a central coast organization, has filed suit against the Department of Fish and Game for accepting funding from special interest groups.

Coastside Chairman Bob Franko makes it clear that the lawsuit is aimed solely “at the funding mechanism”. It names the Resource Legacy Fund Foundation (RLFF) as the organization providing the private funding. ■

## Marine Mentors: An LARRC Tradition by Frank Polak

Do you remember that special feeling of taking a young relative or maybe a neighboring youngster on their first fishing trip? It's not so much about fishing as it is about baiting hooks and tying knots and finally catching that first fish.

For the past 10 years, the Los Angeles Rod & Reel Club has provided that experience to select groups of young people through our Marine Mentors program. If you're not familiar with Marine Mentors, here's how it works. Organized youth groups are invited to bring 10 to 12 youngsters, plus 2 counselors, on a 3/4 day fishing trip. For the past 3 years we have chartered the *Betty-O* from Marina Del Rey Sportfishing.

Our late July and August dates practically ensure we'll be in the middle of the migrating sand bass bite. This past summer did not disappoint. Our first trip, on August 1st, hosted a group from the Mid-Valley YMCA. This was a last minute invite as the original participants were forced to cancel 5 days prior to the trip. This group was more than excited, as many had never fished before, or had been fishing without catching one.

The main area of sand bass was a short 15 minute trip from the dock. Bites were instant. This was a determined group! Although we were anchored in good weather, there were a couple of cases of "mal de mer". THEY DID NOT LET THIS DETER THEM FROM FISHING!.

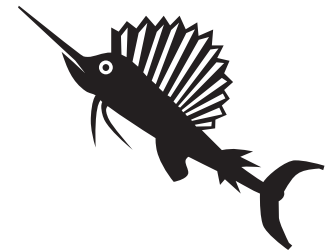
When it came time to head for home at 1:30, we finally heard some complaints. They wanted to keep fishing! What the heck, we let them stay an extra hour, finishing off their limits. At the end of the day, nobody wanted to leave the boat. Happy Campers all around!.

Our next trip was August 22nd with a group from the Pacific Lodge Boys Home.
