Happy New Year?????

The *Chum Line* carries fish reports from enthused club members, sometimes we pass on news of extraordinary successes, and each of you knows of some one involved in doing "good stuff". As a 54-year-old organization we take pride in carrying on these decades old traditions. This *Chum Line* editorial will ask you to look ahead and reflect on the immediate future of our favorite past time and how 2005 will likely affect you.

Our number one priority should be how to deal with the 1999 MLPA—Marine Life Protection Act initiative. Pushed to fast-track status through the efforts of major environmental organizations, it had languished years for want of funding. This initiative, now enhanced through the political and financial support of such groups as the Pew and Packard Foundations, now calls for the creation of a nine-member Blue-Ribbon Commission to facilitate the creation of "reserves" along our coast. A new panel of scientists is to advise the Blue Ribbon Panel. The announced initial focus of their attention will be the Central California Coast with other geography not far behind. Early first hearings are scheduled for January. **Will special interests determine our fishing future?**

Still ranking over the loss of significant fishing acreage around the Channel Islands, a new group has been formed to preclude a similar fiasco. Many of us have felt that our red shirt brigade was doomed to failure three years ago, and that the conclusions then were foregone. The details will not be offered here. The new group is called the California Fisheries Coalition and it includes both recreational and commercial fishing interests. Their purpose is to work together, proactively, on the MLPA initiative to ensure a credible, fair and science based outcome.

The announcement (12/17) by Blue Ribbon Committee Chair, Phil Isenberg that a 19-member SIG—Statewide Interests Group—has been selected as an advisory group sounds positive. It promises to listen to this SIG input.

2004 saw the publication of two major fishery reports. One was the report entitled "Impact of U.S. Recreational Fishing", funded by a \$5.5 million grant from Pew. It was criticized by a NOAA Science Advisor, RFA and also the ASA. The other report was the US Commission on Ocean Policy which the President has now reacted to. Look for a Cabinet Level Committee on Oceans Policy. No other details as yet but both reports urge sweeping fishery reforms.

Can you help? Of course numbers always mean political clout but how many have ever written a letter to a legislator when asked? How many meetings have you attended when fishery issues were discussed? Sure, you belong to a group that charges you a \$3.00 monthly membership to belong, but how much a month do you spend on fishing? Want this type of recreation for your grand-kids? Be creative and proactive in the future.

FISH EATERS

The December Issue of NATIONAL FISHERMAN reports that U.S. Seafood consumption has hit record-setting levels. Imports represent 78% of the seafood eaten by Americans, at the rate of 16.3 lbs. per person. Shrimp tops the list – 4 lbs. per person – followed by tuna – 3.4 lbs. per person – and salmon – 2.219 lbs. per person.

A study by the California Resource Agency showed that \$17.3 billion was contributed to the state economy in 2003 by the recreational fishing sector. This, of course, includes the "ripple" effect which would involve boat sales, tackle sales and transportation and housing. An ASA report noted that each year more than 17 million Americans fish for recreation along our national coasts. This generates more than \$31 000.000 in benefits to our economies and supports 300.000 jobs. They estimate that there are 46 million recreational boaters .■

THAT WINTER SKIFF TRIP by John Ballotti

On Sunday, December 5, the *Qualifier 105* departed for its' inaugural winter skiff trip under the most unusual conditions anyone could remember. Not showers, but a steady continuous rain. No one on board the 7-day calico bass skiff trip could remember ever boarding for a long range trip in a rain-storm. Anything not covered got soaked.

One by one 14 anglers showed their boarding ticket to the attendant at the new security gate required by the Homeland Security Department. Participating in this open party charter were LARRC members **Dave Levinson, Wayne Caywood, Jack Graham, Bob Selvin, and John Ballotti.** Each player of this ultra-light load was convinced that the weather would get better. However, it would get worse before it got better.

Our first morning found the *Q105* at Geronimo Island. Conditions had improved with 59-degree water however, a 10-foot swell limited the skiff fishing to the lee of the island. Dave Levinson landed the first fish of the trip. A nice size calico bass fell for Dave's plastic offering. Due to the large swell, our prime target area, Sacramento Reef, was unfishable. One skiff run for the day yielded only a few calicos. Captain Brian Simms called it a day and pointed the big boat south.

Better conditions greeted the anglers at Benitos Island but the fishing was spotty to slow.

We continued to move



John Ballotti and 5 lb calico.

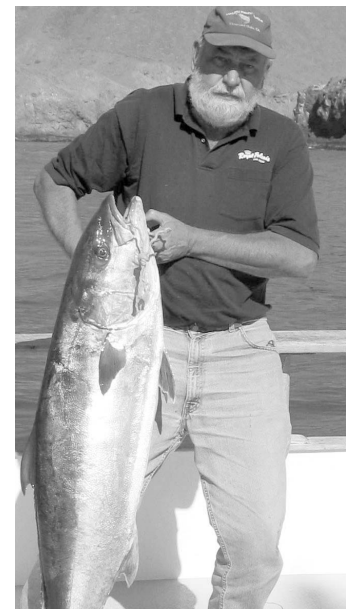
south and the *Q105* pulled into a large cove just north of Turtle Bay about 15 miles south of Pt. Eugenia. Water temperature was a promising 65 degrees and our hopes were high. Due to a lack of current however it was a slow day all around. A few yellowtail were boated on the big boat.

The south end of Cedros Island was the next stop. 63.5 degree water was moving with a slight current and bass fishing turned out to be the best of the trip. Wayne Caywood landed the biggest

fish of the trip, a 51-lb. yellowtail on a surface iron. Not able to find fish on his own Bob Selvin poached a nice 7-lb calico from behind his skiff driver's hooked fish. During the afternoon run the *Q105* became an LARRC 5-pack. With the other anglers out on the skiffs the five managed to keep out of each others way.

The final day of fishing found the *Q105* at Sacramento Reef with fishable conditions. The skiffs managed a few bass up to 7 lbs. The 59-degree water showed little life and current. The largest bass, 8 lbs., was landed on the big boat. At 1:30 the engines announced our departure. Our thanks to the *Q105* crew. The skiff drivers, **Cal, Tommy, and Joe** did their best to find us fish while **Brook and Travis**

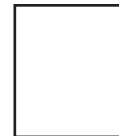
