## ENVIRONMENTAL NEWS

### FISH & WILDLIFE COMMISSION

Last month we called your attention to changes in the California Fish & Wildlife Commission, the people who set the rules along our beautiful coast. We now have news from various sources that Russell Burns, of Napa, and Peter Silva of Chula Vista have been appointed. This follows the earlier appointment of Erik Sklar of St. Helena and Anthony Williams of Huntington Beach. They join Jacque Hostler-Carmesin to complete the fully seated Commission. The new appointees need to pass a state senate confirmation.

The commission also has a new Executive Director, Valerie Termini. Her background is said to include marine policy experience. How much these new faces will identify with the needs of the fishing public remains to be seen.

### SALMON ON THE PACIFIC COAST

National Fisherman reports that commercials in Washington, Oregon and California might be in for a tough summer. This due to small runs and restricted time on the water. It was estimated that there are 300,000 Sacramento River kings in the ocean and 150,000 from the Klamath. This is far below recent averages. The PFMC is considering a complete shutdown of chinook and coho fishing. Warmer than normal waters are to blame as well as our drought. Also smaller populations of plankton, the bottom of the food chain, have not been in sufficient abundance to feed the forage fish on which the salmon depend.

### MORE ON MPA's

Salt Water Sportsman, in their June issue, notes that the Commissioners voted at their June meeting that recreational fishing may not return to the 800 acres of marine preserves. You will recall that when these restricted areas were created

it was done with the understanding that a re-evaluation would take place after 5 years. The commission moved to adopt a plan whereby such an evaluation would come about after 10 years.

### FORAGE FISH GET A HELPING HAND

A report from Wild Oceans tells of a NOAA ruling which bars fishing on a number of forage fish not commercially targeted at this point. Prey species like lance, saury, smelt, herring and squid may now not be targeted. The idea is protect valuable commercial and recreational species that feed on these little fish. The growing needs of aquaculture competes with the food needs of predatory fish. Pacific Coast Magazine reports that the West Coast sardine fishery has now been closed for a second year by the PFMC.

### THE BROADER PICTURE

IUU is a term I just learned by reading a report from the Pew Foundation. Yes, they do some good! They have an illegal fishing project and an IUU is an illegal, unreported and unregulated fishery. IUU fishing is a problem throughout the world and is estimated to account for \$23.5 billion in fish caught every year. They say this represents 1 of every 5 marine fish caught.

A United Nations treaty will now take effect after sufficient support by about 30 governments. It is called the Port State Measures Agreement (PSMA) as a result of which the signed on governments require boat captains to notify their arrival and document their catches. Many tons of illegally caught fish would be unable to be unloaded. Crews would be detained and/or sanctioned.

## CALLING ALL COOKS

### TUNA BURGERS ROLLED IN BBQ CHIPS

The best fish I ever ate was a fresh caught trout cooked in a skillet at 11,000 feet. What made it out standing was the crushed potato chips I rolled it in before cooking it in a skillet.

I had some yellow fin defrosted in the fridge and decided to try a recipe given to me by a deckhand. I thought back to that trout when I saw a few bbq chips. The result was terrific. These burgers do not need frying. They are best in a 400 degree oven on a well oiled rack.

About a pound or more of tuna diced real small  
A cup of panko or bread crumbs  
1 half cup of grated parmesan cheese  
Half of a medium sweet onion diced  
2 Tbs capers, drained  
2 Tbs Teryaki Sauce  
Egg

It needs some egg to bind it. I used egg whites from Trader Joes. Whole eggs do the job too. If you use egg whites, add a couple of Tbs. of olive oil.

Mix well in a bowl, refrigerate for about half an hour. Create patties. I like them thick. I had about a pound and a half and made 4 patties.

Crush your favorite chips and coat the patties. Place on an oiled rack over a pan and place in a preheated 400 degree oven for 10-15 minutes.

Here is how I was taught to test for done on fish. Insert a metal skewer into the CENTER of the fish/burger, touch it to your upper lip. If it feels WARM, it is done!..

I like these burgers on lettuce with ranch dressing. Try any sauce you like. Try it with different fish and report the result to me. I am thinking yellow tail and blue fin.

## Lundy Lake 19" Rainbow Trout

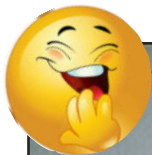

I played hooky from work and left for the Sierras on Tuesday, the 17th of May with 5 other anglers. We drove up to Bridgeport CA. Fished late afternoon to evening at Bridgeport Reservoir and other lakes in the area with very limited results, 4 trout, all 12" or under. The next two days we tried many other lakes in the area, Twin Lakes, Convict Lake, and others. The wind was blowing so hard they many areas were unfishable. Virginia Lake was unfishable because it was still frozen over.



We finally found a fishable area at Lundy Lake. I was fishing with 2 poles. I was throwing many different lures with one pole. The other was set up with a Berkley Mouse Tail, red color. I left this bait soak, at the bottom of Lundy Lake, for over 2½ hours, when my strike indicator flew off the line. I grabbed the pole, set the hook, and carefully played him to the bank where one of my buddies scooped him up in the net. I was using a Diawa rod and Diawa spinning reel with 6lb test line. It was the only fish I caught in 4 long days of fishing but it the biggest one of the trip.

In 4 days, the 6 of us landed less than a dozen fish. Despite the cold and windy weather and poor overall fishing, the trip was worthwhile. The Sierras were beautiful, the camaraderie among the anglers was great, the past fishing stories were outstanding. The old saying "Even a bad day of fishing is better than a good day at work" is definitely true! ☺

# VENICE, LOUISIANA MAY 22 - 26, 2016

**DAY 1** - Upon arrival to New Orleans, we rented a SUV and headed 140 miles to the southernmost end of the state where the Mighty Mississippi meets the



Gulf of Mexico. A fishing lodge was procured called Rivers End Outfitters (REO) where we were to fish, sleep, eat, play

Chinese Poker, laugh, and repeat. At check-in we were greeted by Dena's Mom, Eva who kept us fed with her incredible homemade meals which included: gumbo and rice, red fish, beans and rice, cornbread, potato salad and the



best bread pudding, shrimp boil, apple pie with ice cream, wahoo seared appetizer with incredible sweet / spicy dipping sauce, our own shrimp boil-ball. She also packed our lunches with sandwiches, chips, and drinks along with homemade biscuits for breakfast with eggs, bacon, sausage, cheese and the final day was blueberry pancakes with mounds of bacon.



The lodging was 1st class - state of the art appliances, flat screen tv,



leather sofas, large dining room table, vaulted ceilings with original artwork of the area and wall mounted big

game trophy heads of local deer with antlers, granite counter tops and each one of us had our own private large room with bathroom attached, hard wood floors, it was awesome!

**DAY 2** - Captain Chris took group 1 (Steve Simon, Joel Steinman, Joe Mahfet) out for in-shore fishing and caught some nice speckled trout and red fish while group 2 (Randy Sharon, Stephen DiGiuseppe,



Jamie Smith and Gabe Martinez) opted for a day of Tuna fishing on the gulf off shore on an open fisherman where we were cruising at 40 knots and got airborne a number of times on the 80 mile one way journey. It was a little bumpy but captain Travis got us on 60 lb Yellow fin and Stephen caught a 40 lb wahoo which we later had for appetizers that afternoon. We fished around these giant oil rigs mainly trolling for most of the day. One of the tuna got eaten by a shark so we used its remnants to chunk tuna and each of us were successful getting a nice 60lb class yellow fin. We each got 2 on the troll and one on the chunk.



**DAY 3** - Captain Chris took group 1 and Randy opted to join them for inshore fishing and got speckled sea trout and red fish. Group 2, went with the original skipper with 40 years experience, Captain Steve. Steve got a giant black drum that weighed 70 pounds, and Gabe got a giant red fish, weighed about 60 pounds, both were released. We fished these small oil wells that were about 12 X 12 feet that the fish liked to hang out and hide from the ripping Mississippi current. We caught and kept about 30 sea trout and 5 red fish while using live shrimp on spinning gear provided by the skipper.

**DAY 4** - Group 1 fished with Captain Chris and Group 2 fished with Captain Steve. Both groups fished with a floater on top with the hook and bait of dead shrimp hanging below in 3-5 feet of Mississippi River water. We were successful with sea trout as we rolled up on a jetty where it was a wide open bite casting our floaters 40-50 feet and jiggling them rapidly then winding a couple times then jiggle-wiggle, then wind, and repeating this due process until BAM the red floater disappears into the water and WIND the little bugger in for a date with the ice cooler.

**DAY 5** - Checkout, Eva prepared us blueberry pancakes and bacon (reminiscent of our previous Alaskan trips where we routinely eat 10 pounds of bacon per day). Then we made the 90 minute drive back to the airport but stopped to have some New Orleans food (again) but this time at a restaurant, while it was ok, didn't compare to the wonderful cooking we had at the lodge. I gained 7 pounds and learned a different way to fish but more importantly had great fun with my fishing brothers in the LARRC.

Along with da fishing we learned to talk like dis: "dinna gonna be ready by fo tirty" and "we gonna head down da riva git us sum reds and sum sea trouts, black druuummm and maybe see us a gater'r 2" "be in da boat by no lata dan 5 fordy five, don fo'get ya'lls lunch bucket prepared by Eva,

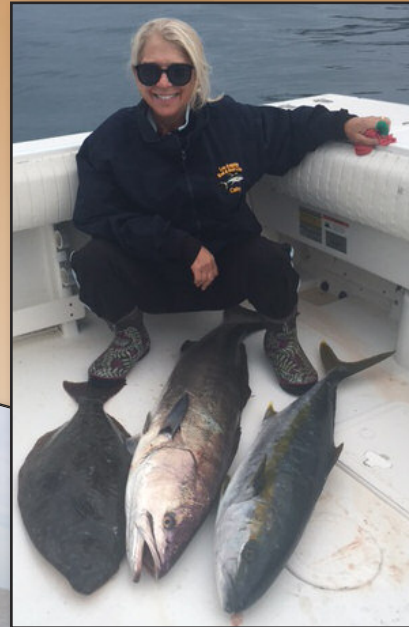

Western Outdoor News had a charter aboard the Options, running from Pierpoint Landing in Long Beach. At the helm was Capt. Wes Flesh and John, deckhand Jiro Spagnolini was organizing the gear. That evening we were headed for Catalina Island and squidding. By early morning the crew had filled both tanks with the juice. We were set.

A little nighttime dropper looping was uneventful. A move or two later brought us to a beautiful cove, a few calicos caught and released on lead-head and squid and our first big game hookup.

Wendy Tochihara's Phenix-Avet combo was bowed at the island, bit nearly straight up and down, the big fish headed shoreward. But she would never see it. Later we would see why.

Then it was skipper Wes who was bit big, resulting in some quiet excitement as we tried to keep hooting and hollering down so as not to alert any nearby marine mammals who would come ruin our action and steal fish off our lines. It was a beautiful mid-30s seabass.

Meanwhile Tochihara was bit again. Her fish headed for the horizon, then settled down, worked her up the starboard rail, around the bow and settled in on the port bow. Some minutes later the first gaff was in and a second called for.

Wes and Jiro drug the big fish down the port side and

loaded over the rail. It was a tanker, and would end up weighing in at 42 pounds, likely around 44 when first boated. Wendy was stoked, her biggest croaker ever. It's just amazing how big some of the croakers caught have gotten in recent years.
