I can also give insight on how I would attack these fish by using conventional gear if this is something you think your club would like to hear.

HERE'S JUST A SNIPPET FROM A TRIP

n long-range trips, it's about timing and opportunity. I'm one of 6 anglers who get picked up by a "swim by" of tuna. We're on our 16-day Intrepid trip. They are obviously big fish and 6 reels are screaming. They are still taking out line. A loud shotgun bang as one guy's drag gets too tight. Screams of help and "back up" by a couple of guys seeing their line melt off their reels. My fish comes unbuttoned. Shit. I run to get back in the water but grab my Avet 50 3-speed on a Phenix X4H and retire my 30 wide. These are big fish and I want the extra horsepower. I pin on a beautiful tube mackerel, sprint to the bow, toss it in and pray it rushes to the zone. Five agonizing minutes pass as my logic says these fish have left the area but my heart says I'm about to get pounded. Another long minute. Another one and it happens. My bait is inhaled and I feel the weight of a steer. Happy but not yet time to celebrate. Steve Abel, (Abel Fly Reels) is on my right and can't budge his tuna with his lighter stick and an Avet HXW Raptor. Greg Stump (Robo Worms) is on my left, with an Avet 50 and arms like a linebacker is straining every muscle against his giant. Far to the left is my buddy Miles Callison also with an Avet 50 yelling something incomprehensible. Another calamity and fish lost by an angler on the other side. Four of us are still waging war against beasts fighting for their lives. Stumpy and I are making progress. A school of smaller tuna come through causing chaos. One angler is unceremoniously cut off in an instant. Another casualty down the rail. Stumpy and I both get wrapped by smaller tuna. I have a three way tangle. Stay positive. The crew works expertly to free both of us, only for another small 40# tuna to tangle with me again. But we get cleared and continue the battle. Both of our fish are doing huge death circles requiring us to go over and under each other a dozen times. I have deep color and work to keep his nose pointed up so every circle I get closer. Fifty feet, 40, 30 20, 15 and I turn the handle as he finishes his outside circle right into the waiting gaffs. Four gaffs and brute strength bring him over the rail. Last fish hooked, first landed, thanks to the Avet 3 speed reel. I'm guessing 250# as I put my gear away and grab another 50 model

and get back in the water a.s.a.p. Greed is a terrible thing, but there are only so many opportunities for big fish. My bait is getting out to about where these bigger fish hit and my adrenaline is still pumping. I visualize another giant tuna swimming near my bait. Nothing. Greg lands his cow, which looks well over 200#s. Yes!, my bait gets picked up and I feel an amazing joy until I realize it's one of those 50# teenagers. I land it but stay out of the water to assure I'm not the guy that gets bit by another smaller tuna and cuts one of these big fish off. Miles finally has his fish at gaff. I see it and it is huge but it goes ballistic at the thought of getting poked. The sound of 150# spectra breaking is loud, like a gunshot and sickening. Miles loses one estimated at well over 300#s. Steve Abel's fish is still on the horizon and we hear another gun shot sound of agony and defeat. OK, it's time to celebrate the two fish that were landed and commiserate over the losses. Beers all around. Greg and I temper our celebration while our buddies plot their revenge. For the record mine was 253#, which tied my personal best, and there is no photo because I selected shooting for another fish versus shooting a photo. Darn it.



FROM THE ENVIRONMENTAL COMMITTEE:

Club Members urged to sign petitions STAT -

We should all be aware that the Pacific Fishery Management Council has a meeting scheduled on

March 11th. One of the items up for discussion will be the use of Drift Gillnets by California Commercial fishers. The by-catch of this procedure is reported at 60% of the catch. Most of this is discarded dead.

Your participation is urgently required! Please sign a petition and send it off ASAP.. Although we may not impact this meeting there is an environmental review that takes place and which will allow petitions to be read prior to final decisions being made.

CSL (the California Sportfishing League) has a petition on line. Visit www.SportfishingConservation.org Similarly Wild Oceans (formerly NRDC) has a petition for the recreational community to help keep longlines out of the Pacific. The PFMC is considering allowing industrial scale longliners in eastern

Surf Fishing Report from Nick Ekdahl

Here is a brief report of my Last Surf fishing outing:

I fished on President's Day Monday 2-16-15 with club member Ross Lombard at Santa Monica Beach. High tide was approximately 1:30 so we started at about 9:00 AM, which is later than usual for me. It was overcast with a very slight wind out of the North, a pretty impressive shore break was receding but had obviously created a nice deep trough; good structure we thought. The water was relatively clear with almost no kelp and with the incoming tide it seemed we had great conditions.

My first three casts were met with hard bites and I actually came away with a scale on my hook the second time. I failed to hook whatever it was. I changed out the #2 hook leftover from my recent Pismo Beach trip to a #4 in hopes that a smaller hook might make the difference. Not long after that I caught a medium sized Walleye Perch and the skunk was off.

Much real estate and many casts later I finally got another hard hit and this time I hooked up to a drag burner. After a careful fight I landed a foot long Yellow

Fin Croaker, my first of 2015. "At last" I thought, now I know what had been hitting the bait when we first started. I was excited because Yellow Fin Croaker are a schooling fish and when you catch one you often catch multiple fish. It was not to be. I felt bad because the hits were becoming fewer and fewer and Ross had yet to connect to a fish.

According to the Solunar charts and my fishing watch, which sounded the alarm with 4 out of 5 fish, the fish should have been jumping on our hooks at around 10:30 AM.

Final score: Nick 2, Ross 0 and the fish had the last laugh. Never have I seen such great conditions and such poor results. So, from my personal experience and the few posted reports I have read online, it seems that the warm weather has pushed the ubiquitous Barred Surf Perch into deeper waters and delayed their spawn.

I hope with colder weather coming and spring still a ways off that we may yet see the phenomenal perch fishing that we usually enjoy this time of year at Santa Monica State Beach.

Larry Brown's Gravlax Recipe For Pickled or Cured Salmon or White Seabass

Ingredients for 12 Servings

One 4 pound filet of boneless fish with skin on – one large filet

6 tablespoons (tbsp) of kosher salt

3 tbsp sugar

1.5 teaspoons (tsp) cracked pepper

0.5 tsp ground allspice

1/4 cup cider vinegar

2 bunches fresh dill or spice island dried dill

Directions

Remove scales but keep skin on one large filet Rinse in cold water and pat very dry Mix all dry ingredients and spread over the flesh (meaty) side of the filet and gently rub into fish Cut up the dill and put half into a large chafing dish that will hold the filet

Place filet onto the bed of dill, skin side down, and gently drizzle the vinegar over the fish, carefully not to remove any of the dry spices

Top fish with the remaining dill

Seal and wrap the fish tightly with a cling plastic wrap

Place a heavy weight on top of the filet, like a brick or piece of marble

Refrigerate for 2 to 3 days depending on thickness of filet

Remove filet, rinse with cold water and pat dry

Serving

Slice thinly on a diagonal Serve with any or all of the following:

Rye or pumpernickel toast or bagels

Cream cheese

Dill or lemon/mustard/mayo sauce

Thinly sliced red onions

Asparagus

Serve a crisp white wine and go to heaven!

Celebrate the Ancient Persian Spring Festival of Nowruz with Rice with Fresh Herbs and Fish (Sabzi Polow Ba Mahi)*

The ancient Persian spring festival of Nowruz, Persian for "new day," is considered the beginning of the New Year not only in Iran, but throughout Central Asia. The holiday falls on the first day of spring, usually March 21st, and celebrations continue for 13 days.

The history of Nowruz stretches back more than 2,600 years to the time of Zoroaster and the ancient Persian kings. While initially a religious festival, Nowruz is now mostly

secular, though it is steeped in symbolism and rich traditions. March begins with spring cleaning. Families plant small pots of wheat, barley or lentils that quickly germinate into lush green sprouts. One of the traditional dishes is herbed rice with fish. The symbolism is that of herb representing a spring harvest and fish that represent new beginning or new life.

Rice with Fresh Herbs and Fish (Sabzi polow ba mahi)*

*From (New Food of Life Ancient Persian and Modern Iranian Cooking and Ceremonies by Najmieh Batmanglij)

- 3 cups long-grain basmati rice
- ½ cup chopped fresh chives or scallions
- 2 cups coarsely chopped fresh dill
- 2 ½ cups coarsely chopped fresh parsley
- 2 cups chopped fresh coriander
- 3 cloves garlic, peeled and crushed
- 3/4 cup clarified butter
- 2 tablespoons plain yogurt
- 1 teaspoon ground saffron dissolved in 4 tablespoon hot water
- 2 cloves whole green garlic, washed thoroughly and trimmed
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 large white-fleshed fish(striped bass, sea bass, cod, halibut) scaled and cleaned, about 3 pounds, or whole smoked white fish
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup flour combined with $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt and $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon ground cinnamon for dredging the fish
- 4 tablespoon olive oil
- Juice of 2 Seville oranges, if available or juice of 2 limes
- 1. Clean and wash 2 cups of rice 5 times in warm water. It is then desirable but not essential to soak the rice in 8 cups water with 2 tablespoon of salt for at least 2 hours.
- 2. Bring 8 cups of water and 2 tablespoon of salt to boil in a large non-stick pot. Pour the washed and drained rice into the pot. Boil briskly for 6-10 minutes, gently stirring twice to loosen any grins that may have stuck to the bottom. Bite a few grains. If the rice feels soft it is ready to be drained. Drain rice in a large, fine-mesh colander and rinse in 2-3 cups lukewarm



- 3. In a bowl, mix cleaned, washed, chopped herbs and crushed garlic.
- 4. In the same pot, heat ½ cup butter and 2 tablespoon water.
- 5. In a bowl, combine 2 spatulas full of rice, yogurt,

- and 1 drop of saffron water and spread the mixture evenly over the bottom of the pot to create a golden crust (tah-dig).
- 6. Place 2 spatulas full of rice in a pot, then add one spatula full of herbs and the whole green garlic cloves. Repeat, alternating layers of rice and herbs in a shape of a pyramid, and sprinkle the cinnamon between the layers. This shape allows room for the rice to expand and enlarge. Cover and cook for 10 minutes over medium heat.
- 7. Pour the remaining butter and saffron water and $1\!\!\!/\!\!\!2$ cup hot water over this pyramid.
- 8. Place a clean dish towel or 2 layers of paper towel over the post and cover firmly with the lid to prevent steam from escaping. Cook 50 minutes longer over low heat.
- 9. While the rice is cooking, cut the fresh fish down the center lengthwise without removing the backbone. Slice across into 6 pieces.
- 10. Wash and pat fish pieces dry. Dust them in the seasoned flour.
- 11. Just before serving, brown fish pieces on both sides, in 4 tablespoons oil in a skillet over medium heat. Add more oil if necessary. Sprinkle the fish with Seville orange or lime juice.
- 12. Remove rice pot from heat and allow to cool for 5 minutes on a damp surface without uncovering it. This frees the crust from the bottom of the pot.
- 13. Remove 2 tablespoon of saffron-flavored rice and set aside for garnish. Gently taking 1 spatula full of rice at a time, place it on a serving platter without disturbing the crust. Mound the rice in the shape of a cone. Decorate with saffron-flavored rice.
- 14. Detach the crust from the bottom of the pot using a wooden spatula. Unmold onto a small platter and serve on the side.
- 15. Arrange fish on a serving platter and pour the remaining saffron water over it. Serve hot with fresh herbs.

Variation: One can use salmon instead; no flour needed just pan fried pieces. Other variation is to use smoked fish-again no flour needed. One can also use a whole fish-baked or fried whole to your liking.



CAPTAIN MARVIN C. SMITH

Captain Marvin C. Smith was born in Detroit, MI on September 25, 1940, the second of four children to Muriel and George Smith.

He grew up in the Detroit suburb of Farmington Hills. He attended Redford High School and was an all-star athlete, excelling in football, baseball and skiing.

They honeymooned along the Central Coast in Carmel and Monterey before heading back to Marv's base at Camp Lejeune in Jacksonville, NC to settled in to their first home together.

On December 20, 1965 in Jacksonville, Marv and Joyce proudly welcomed their first-born daughter, Debra Leigh, into the world.

On July 17, 1970, they welcomed their second baby girl, Sheryl Lynne, who they brought home from the hospital to their current home on Cozycroft Avenue in Chatsworth, CA.

Marv and Joyce saw the world together, traveling to Fiji, Asia, Hawaii and on safari in Africa. And Marv took all of his girls with him around the world – touring the nation seeing all four corners and much in between. They travelled



to most of our nation's big cities and too-many-too-count of its smaller ones. The four of them journeyed throughout Western Europe, Israel, Egypt and the Greek Islands.

The family, together with their German Sheppards, King and Duke, built priceless memories together boating, waterskiing, fishing, camping and enjoying their Cobalt locally at Lakes Castaic, Pyramid, Naciamento, and on the Colorado River on Lakes Havasu, Powell and Mead.

On April 19, 1997, Marv and Joyce welcomed their first son-in-law when Debbie married Craig Cannold, and on February 26, 1999, Marv and Joyce were overjoyed with the birth of their first grandchild, Alec Ian Cannold.

On May 19, 2012, Marv and Joyce welcomed the addition of a second son-in-law when Sheryl married Jacques Fox, and on November 18, 2012, Marv and Joyce were blessed with another grandchild with the birth of Sofia Shalom Fox.

On August 9, 2014, Marv and Joyce celebrated 50 years of marriage and adventures together. Their enduring love for each other is surpassed only by their love for their children and grandchildren.

Marv has been blessed by good friends and loving neighbors throughout his lifetime. He was an avid golfer, fisherman, outdoorsman and has been a good friend and neighbor to many people of Chatsworth, Dana Point and the community.


