As fishermen, we are always interested in the numbers. How many fish were caught? How large were they? Where were they caught (latitude & longitude)? What line test was used, etc.?

Numbers are also important with respect to the Los Angeles Rod and Reel Club. Obviously, the longevity of our club is a result of our members providing both volunteer efforts to maintain the organizational infrastructure, and the financial support towards its operating costs.

Our recent annual, membership renewal provided a portion of the funds needed for the 2004 operating budget and a volunteer base for future events. However, membership renewal dues alone are not enough to support the club's financial and volunteer requirements.

Additional funds are derived by designating a small portion of some of the charges incurred by club members. Specifically, when taking club charters, and attending monthly dinner meet-

ings. These overrides are necessary to help cover the costs of potential losses on charter trips if we were unable to fill the boats, raffle prizes, printing costs, storage fees, etc.

Volunteer activity is just as important as financial support. There are 11 board-of-director positions, and more than 24 committee chair positions to be filled each year. This is in addition to the volunteers required at club sponsored events throughout the year. Due to a lack of volunteers, some of our members have to take on the responsibility for multiple committee positions.

It should be apparent that active participation in the club is vital to our success. Attending dinner meetings, participating in club charters and volunteering to hold committee chair positions, and help at club-sponsored events will help perpetuate the longevity and success of the Los Angeles Rod and Reel Club. **Your membership and support is truly appreciated.** ■

LARRC Members Come Up with the Ultimate Good Cause!

Last year, **Steve Simon** and **Seymour Rimland** were talking to each other about new events for the Club and the Foundation. They concluded



that we needed a new event for underprivileged children, and they came up with the idea of having a trout fishing derby at Hansen Dam.

Steve presented the idea to the Foundation, and the Foundation agreed to sponsor the event. He agreed to be in charge of the derby which was held on April 2nd. We invited approximately 50 children from Fred S. Lull Special Education Center and Lokrantz School Education Center. Each of the children had various degrees of physical and mental disabilities. We had over 50 volunteers from our club, as well as San Fernando Salt Water Fishermen, Sierra Pacific Fly Fishers and Mattel

employees, who helped out.

Unlike our annual trip (where we can get along with one volunteer for three or four children), each of these kids required one-on-one attention. In fact, due to their disabilities, many of



these children required the assistance of a counselor plus one of our volunteers. Hansen Dam was a perfect location to take these children—we did not have to worry about seasickness and where we were able to keep a closer eye on the special needs of the children.

The lake was closed to the public and was stocked with trout the day before and again shortly prior to the derby.

We could see large schools of trout ranging in size from about 1/2 pound to seven pounds. Quite a sight! But the best sight was seeing each of these children fishing—and catching—and having a terrific day. Most of these children have never had an opportunity to go fishing. I have no doubt that each of them felt the same excitement that our club members

have had over the years.

The derby was a huge success. I am certain that our founders would be very proud of the money spent on this wonderful event. It is my hope that this year's derby marks the first of similar events to come.

On behalf of the Foundation, I wish to extend a tremendous thanks to Steve and Seymour for coming up with the idea, planning and supervising.

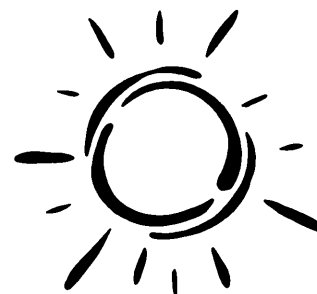

Meet Your New Membership Chairman

Tom Carlisle has recently taken over the post of club membership chairman from **Dan Felger**. Tom is also a director of the LARRC having been appointed in 2002 by then President **Al Scow** and elected by the members later that year. He has been a club member since 2001.

Tom has been passionate about fishing since 1950 when his father took him at age three to Lake Merced in San Francisco to fish for trout. During the 1950s and 1960s he spent summer vacations catching large-mouth bass, catfish and blue gills at Clear Lake in Northern California. His first "trophy fish" was a three-pound catfish caught at the ripe old age of four.

Tom made his first adult water trip on a boat from Redondo pier in 1959, and fished regularly on half-day trips from Santa Monica pier and on overnight trips from the old Pierpont Landing during the early 1960s.

After graduating from UCLA with a degree in physics in 1969, Tom went to work for the Hughes Aircraft Company as an engineer. He worked on microwave tubes in Torrance, Ca. For 34 years before retiring from the same organization, now part of Boeing.

He enjoys all types of fishing particularly long-range fishing for big tuna and fly fishing for trout. His first long-range trip was a 5-dayer to Guadeloupe Island in 1973 and has since made more than thirty long-range trips ranging from 3-17 days. On his most recent trip, a 17-day one, on the *Excel*, he caught yellowfin tuna

weighing 209 and 220 lbs. His personal best yellowfin is a 249-pounder caught at Clarion Island in 1995.

He does most of his fly-fishing for trout in the Eastern Sierra's. Tom and his wife Cinda, make several trips a year to June Lake, CA to fish and ski.

They have also had numerous fly-fishing adventures in locations including Alaska, Idaho, Arizona, British Columbia and Yukon Territory, Canada and New Zealand. Their next international trip will be this June to Wellsley Lake in Yukon Territory, Canada, where they will be fly-fishing for lake trout and northern pike.

LARRC CHARTER TRIP ABOARD THE *PACIFIC DAWN* APRIL 10, 2004

It was 10 p.m. on April 9th, a Friday night, and the harbor waters were calm as 16 passengers listened to Captain **Pat Cavanaugh's** "Welcome" speech—"Depending on weather, we will make squid at Santa Rosa Island and fish Santa Cruz Island". The target was rockfish and possibly barracuda or calico bass. "Tie on a squid jig before you go to bed", was the Captain's directive.

The bait making "wake up" call came at 11:30 p.m. After two more attempts to wake the passengers, Pat settled for 5 of us—3 passengers plus Pat, and Chas. (Pat's capable deck hand). One of the three passengers gave up after 30 minutes. Four of us stuck it out until 1:15 a.m. when Pat decided it was time to travel. We had one tank of squid. Just think of what kind of commotion might greet the non-bait making angler when he reached for a squid if the angler wasn't on a club trip. Oh we did get our teasing in, which produced great protestations of "not hearing the wake-up call".

A couple of hours later, I found myself back on deck warming my hands on a hot cup of coffee while **Dan Felger** and **Al Scow** were fishing my squid on a dropper loop. It was barely "grey light" and Ryan (the second Captain) said he didn't see anything on the meter. Suddenly, Dan was pulling on something. I figured he was stuck on the bottom until Al

started pulling on something too. I don't know what happened to that cup of coffee but the next thing I remember is holding my rod while my white lead head, baited with a squid, fluttered to the bottom. It was inhaled. Instant hook-up! There were only 3 passengers on deck and all 3 of us were pulling on fish. Amazing how everyone heard Pat's wake-up call this time.

Al's white seabass hit the deck first and weighed in at 21 lbs. Dan's

fish was next and turned out to be the largest of the trip at 30 lbs. My fish was next on deck and pushed the scale to 22 lbs. We continued to fish the same spot for another hour or so and **Joel**

Zide pulled another white seabass out of that spot. Pat moved the boat a few times and we pushed the count to 10 white seabass in all before moving to the rock cod grounds. Our youngest angler, **Sofia Perriseau**, got one of the white seabass that morning.

The rest of the day was spent

catching reds and rock fish. The rock cod fishing was slow until it was time to leave for home then it was wide open and mostly reds. Pat kept us fishing another hour until nearly everyone had limits.

Thanks to Pat and his crew. As always on the *Pacific Dawn*, the crew was superb and the food was great. Pat's Galley Chef, Chuck, is one of the best charter boat chefs I've experienced. Chuck prefers to accommodate passenger's requests, so he doesn't have a set menu that must be ordered from. Anyone with a special diet and finicky eaters are gladly accommodated. No special request? Just let Chuck create something for you.

A California Department of Fish & Game

press release (dated 3/23/04) noted that the Fish & Game Commission changed State Regulations governing the take of Lingcod. Minimum size is now 30" with a limit of one fish. No take periods are in effect for November and December.

The regulation changes, which became effective April 1st, may be the result of lobbying the PFMC by Oregon and Washington for more recreational precautions in California.

MEXICAN FISHERY MANAGER GETS TOUGH— Will it happen?

Mexico will prohibit all drift gillnets, as well as the use of longlines, on vessels longer than 27' within 50 miles of the coast, refuse to license any factory vessels applying to fish in the country's national waters, according to Ramon Corral, the new commissioner of CONAPESCA, the national fisheries agency of Mexico. Corral made these proclamations after a series of meetings with fishery scientists. A month later, Director of Fisheries Priscilliano Melendrez Barrios wrote a letter saying gillnets would remain until further study, according to the environmental website www.seawatch.org

National Fisherman reports (5/04) that the U.S. is carrying a \$7 billion seafood deficit. The article also notes that the Food and Agricultural Organization of the UN (FAO) claims that wild capture fisheries have reached their maximum. Productions and "there may be a marked decrease in global capture production."

National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Department

(NOAA) which is responsible for our fisheries, announced the lifting of restrictions for the longline swordfish fleet. The restrictions have been in effect since 2001 to help reduce turtle mortality.

New research has shown that circle

hooks reduced leatherback turtle by-catch by 67%. the effect on logger head turtles was even better at 92% reduction of by-catch.

The Wallop Breaux Act

(S1072) was recently passed in the Senate extending it another six years. Included are Sport Fish Restoration Programs funded through the recovery of tens of millions of dollars from excise taxes.

Wallop-Breaux monies and fishing licenses provide approximately \$450 million per year for fishery research and management.

White Seabass on a Cedar Plank by Jan Howard

White Seabass on a Cedar Plank

4 white seabass filets 3/4" thick
 fresh chopped dill
 sea sal
 olive oil

Brush filets with olive oil and sprinkle with salt and fress chooped dill on both sides.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Oil cedar plank with olive oil before using the first time. After that, only oil as necessary. Place plank in preheated over for 15 minutes.

Remove plank from oven and place filets on plank. Return plank to over and cook for 7 minutes at 350 degrees. Turn fish fillets over and cook and additional 7 minutes. Remove and serve with Lemon-Dill Beurre Blanc. (Lemon-Dill Butter Sauce).

Lemon-Dill Butter

Sauce
 1/4 cup lemon juice
 1/2 cup white vinegar
 3 tablespoons shallots
 1 tablespoon fresh dill
 1 lb butter
 salt and white pepper.

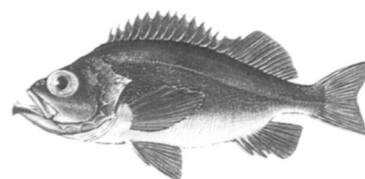
Put lemon juice, vinegar, and shallots in small saucepan and cook over medium heat until liquid reduced to 3 table-
 spoons. Turn heat to low and whisking constantly add butter one
 tablespoon as a time until incorpo-
 rated in the sauce.

Once all the butter is incorporated and the sauce is warm, remove from heat.

Add chopped dill and salt and pepper to taste. Serve on freshly cooked white seabass (or salmon)

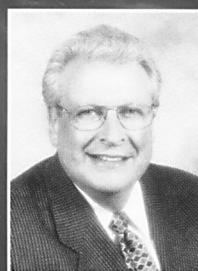

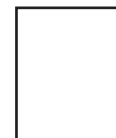
