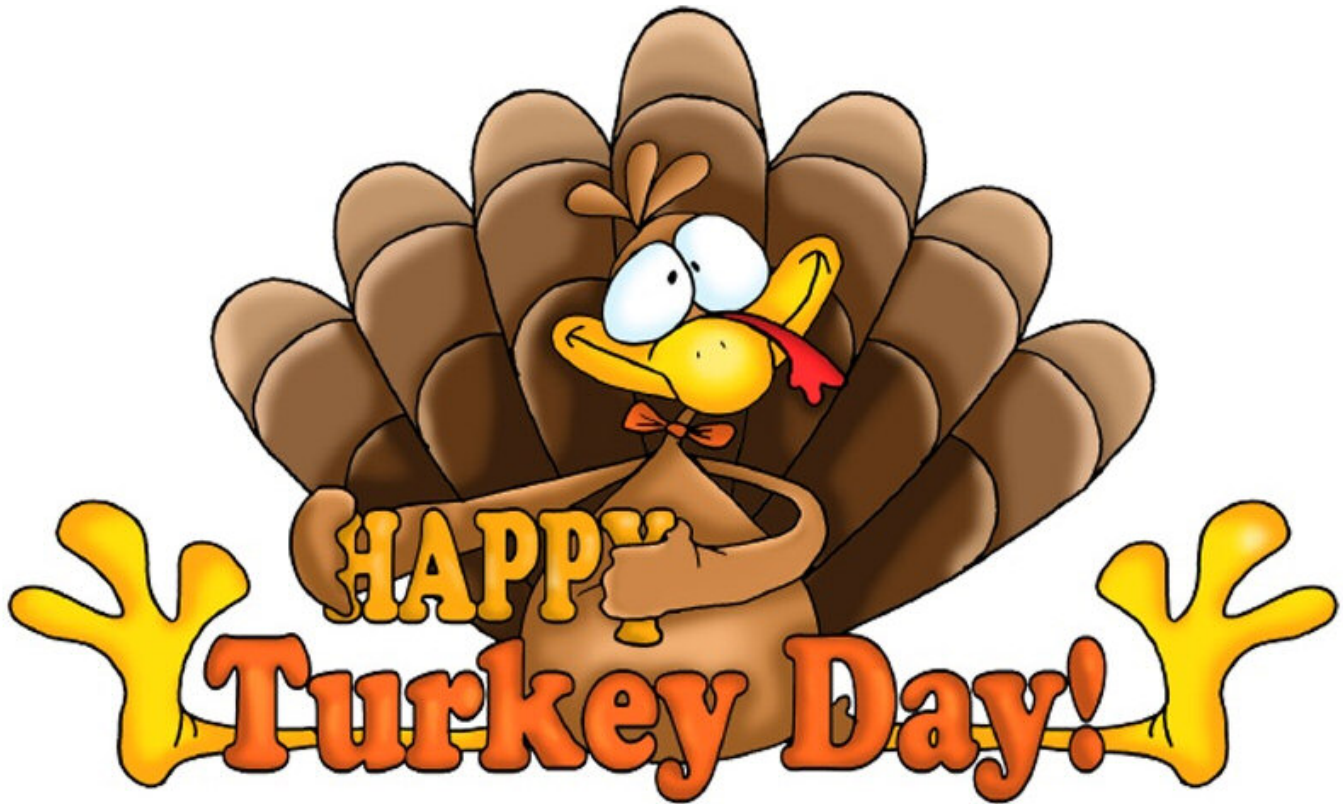

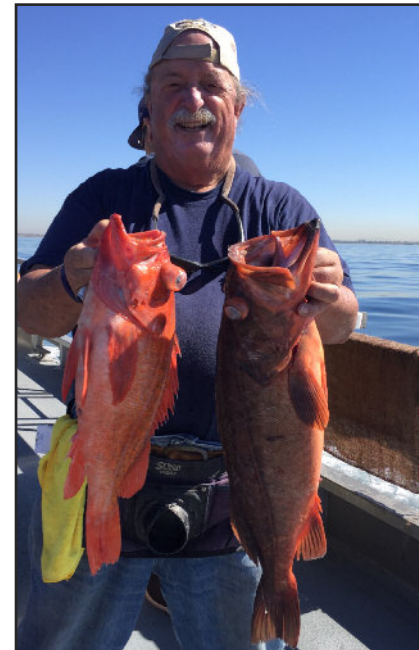

# Kids' Trip

Dear trustees, friends of the Foundation and active participants:  
The October 14 kids trip at 22nd St. landing on the Monte Carlo was a success. Pastor Martin put together participants from several church groups. There were 16 club/foundation volunteers for the 40 participants. This trip was sponsored by the National Hispanic Alliance in Washington D.C. We were recommended to this group by NOAA.

The trip was used as a dry run for our proposed move from Pierpoint to 22nd St. The Monte Carlo, which is used on other mentors trips, is an excellent boat for a kids outing.

An alternative to fully provisioning and staffing the galley was tried on this trip. Muffins, juice, and water were provided for breakfast. Participants were given a ticket, which could be exchanged for a hamburger or what-ever. The galley was open for other cash purchases such as candy bars or soda. The regular boat galley crew handled the galley.

All involved thought everything went well. There is ample free parking at 22nd St. landing. Instead of having to hire a truck, make a Costco run, load everything onto the truck and then schlep it to the landing, Steve Simon was able to transport all necessary rods, reels and other paraphernalia in an SUV.

In accordance with our prior decision, the July kids trip will be moved from Pierpoint to 22nd St. landing. Scott Schiffman is handling the details with the new landing. Paul Varenchik will be speaking to Pierpoint.

The current plan is to ease into the new transition. We are planning on using the Monte Carlo and the Native Sun for a morning run only. Under this scenario we will be able to accommodate 100 kids, 50 per boat.

If all works out, for the following years, we can add another boat for the morning run or do an afternoon run on the Monte Carlo. Under 22nd St. is enthusiastic about working with us and is trying to make all the accommodations that they reasonably can.

Under our new system, Club members would not be staffing the galley. We anticipate using the ticket system that worked so well for the October 14 trip.

# ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

## ◆ ALASKA...

Last month we published some news regarding a trip to Alaska. I'm not going over the details again but we have now filled one boat for the last week of June. Details can be had by getting on line for Wild Strawberry Lodge or getting in touch with me: [wstridge@aol.com](mailto:wstridge@aol.com).

Speaking of Alaska, there is so much news floating around regarding salmon fishing, in particular results of the current season. Since the benefits of the California Current are now on the decline for 2017 allow me to dwell on the salmon resource.

A recent report by the Alaska Seafood Marketing Institute noted that seafood created an estimated 99,000 full time equivalent jobs valued at \$5.2Billion dollars. The state produces 5-6Billion pounds of seafood per year. (Not all of it salmon)

National Fisherman reports on what is probably the most productive salmon are in Alaska. This would be Bristol Bay. (Pebble Mine) 2017 saw a commerical fishing season with more than 37 million salmon harvested. This area produces more than 40% of the world's sockeye salmon. The pristine land areas surrounding this body of water have now been eyed, by a Canadian Mining Company, as a good source for certain minerals. (Gold and Cop-

per etc) Extraction would cause pollution which could not be compatible with the salmon fishery. During Obama's presidency a four year study of this problem was studied by the EPA. It proposed restrictions to mining which the current EPA head, Scott Pruitt, has reversed. Stay tuned!

The State of Oregon (ODFW) has addressed steelhead salmon threats. They recently reported that 25% of the Steelhead run was consumed by sea lions on the Willamette River. CCA is working with Congress to stop this predation before the species goes extinct. There has been some success to restrict use of gill nets. A bill HR 2083 needs your help contacting your representatives to indicate your support.

A late July article in Salt Water Sportfishing notes that the governors of California and Oregon have urged the US Secretary of Commerce to declare salmon fisheries in their states a catastrophic regional fishery disaster.

Gov. Bill Walker, of Alaska declared Oct. to be Alaska Seafood Month. President Xi Jinping of China made a quick stop in Alaska earlier in the year. He was hoping to increase Alaska Seafood exports to China. Alaska exported \$1.2 Billion worth of goods to China in 2016 with 58% of that being seafood.

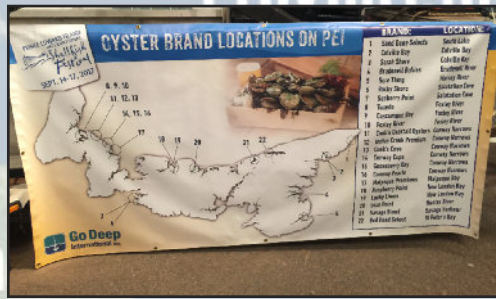
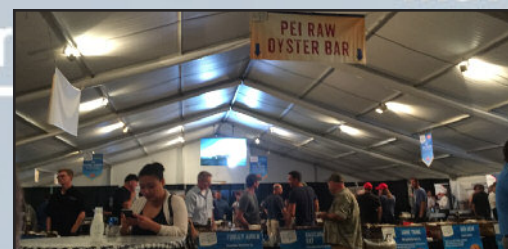
# Hyannis and Prince Edward Island

As Kevin and I were planning our return trip to Prince Edward Island for 2017, our friend Gary Quon from Tady Lures was trying to coordinate his striped bass trip to Hyannis with our trip back east. The past couple of years it never lined up right,



but this year it all worked out. Gary and his friend AD (who works at the tackle shop at Point Loma) would be flying in on the 10th and 9th of September, respectively. Kevin and I would fly in on the 9th to get acclimated to the time change. Gary recommended taking the ferry to Martha's Vineyard or Nantucket on Sunday the 10th to spend the day. One of my best friends, Rachel Haigh, moved to Massachusetts and as luck would have it she would be on Cape Cod that same weekend. So, she joined us on our Martha's Vineyard adventure. We had a fun day walking around the Gingerbread cottages, which originally was a Methodist settlement from the late 1860-70's. The cottages were so cute and each was decorated to the owner's tastes, all very whimsical and colorful. The homes were narrow but long, the front porch was about 20ft wide and some had a second story. They were straight out of a story-book. We took the bus to another town



to have lunch and walk around. It was very scenic and quaint. There are lots of shops and restaurants to browse through, oh and lots of ice cream shops!! Rachel told me New Englanders love their ice cream. It was nice to visit the island but we had an early next day so we took the 4pm ferry back to Hyannis and got ready for our striped bass fishing trip.

Gary and AD were staying at the same hotel as us, which made travel logistics much smoother. If you ever go there, stay at the Best Western. It was clean and quiet, close to "downtown" Hyannis and had a pretty darn good breakfast spread in the



morning for all the guests. Monday morning, the four of us met in the lobby and grabbed some food before we headed down to the landing. Kevin and I brought some of our own gear (8ft Seeker Rods and Avet sx reels) for the stripers and Gary shipped some gear for them ahead of time. We got to the landing and met Gary's friend Pat Conklin, Dave and the infamous Captain Les Shwom and his boat the "Rosey-S" The two days of fishing would be targeting striped bass for science. We had 2 representatives from the Division of Marine Fisheries: John Board-

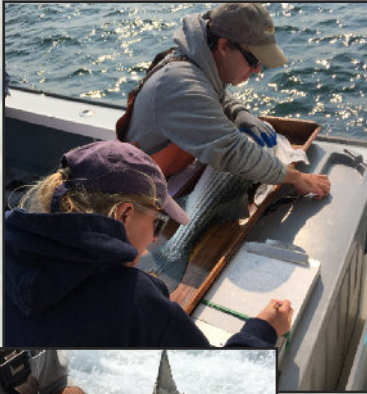
man and Devon Robinson. We would be fishing a n d hopefully catching striped



bass and the Fisheries Reps would then measure the length (fork and tail) of the fish, take a scale sample to determine the age, and place an identification tag on the fish, and then release them. The fish scales are similar to the trunk of a tree, where you add dye to the scale and count the rings on the scale to see how old the fish is. We caught stripers on Tady jigs (4/0, AA, and A2) and Captain Les' tried and true slow trolling method. This was completely different than anything we have ever done. Captain Les has a reel with a dacron backing then a haywire twist to a 100 yards of heavy gauge wire to a swivel with 60lb leader and a heavy bucktail type jig. The process is the wire keeps the line deep to the bottom and the jig will bounce as someone holds one rod at each corner and jerks the rod to give the jig action. The stripers are on the bottom rooting around and it's a reaction bite when the jig comes by. It was a lot of fun and a bit more physically demanding than regular trolling, since you are holding the rod and constantly



working the jig. The down-side is you are actually fishing wire so any kink in the wire is bad. If a fish bites



and there is a kink, the whole rig is gone since the weak point is where the kink is. Also, if the boat isn't moving don't leave the wire out, you will get kinked up (from experience). On the second day we also caught some blue fish on the jig and wire and I caught a legal fluke on the jig. Les said I must have really been on the bottom to catch one. Well, I was and hey new species for me!! The Fisheries Reps were excited on the blue fish because they could get age data from them by cutting off the top of the head and pulling out the stones. Again, the stones are like the scales and the age can be determined by counting the "rings." We were so happy to fish, help fish research and meet lots of nice people.



Wednesday, we headed back to Logan

Airport to catch our early morning flight to Charlottetown, PEI. We landed there in the early afternoon and took the opportunity to walk around downtown Charlottetown. Nicole and Keith Denette, owners of Constitution Sportfishing, were flying in late Wednesday night to join us on this part of our trip.

Last year at the Charlottetown airport, Kevin and I saw ads for the PEI Shellfish Festival. Unfortunately, it was the same dates of our fishing trip so for 2017 I planned to come early and go to the festi-



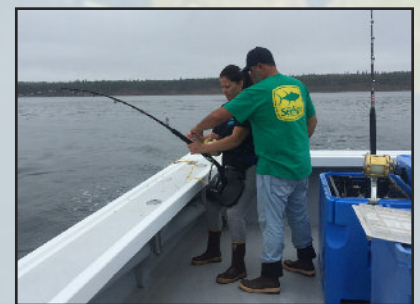
val!! Thursday night was the big Feast and Frolic dinner to kick off the PEI Shellfish Festival and I was so excited. The event starts with roaming around to different booths offering clam chowder, mussels, beverages and the best part 22 different purveyors oysters from PEI!! They set it up in a circle and they shucked oysters for an hour and you could eat as many as you wanted! It was interesting because you could actually taste the difference of the same type of oyster but grown in different regions on the island. The sit down dinner included a slice of steak, a beet, a carrot and a PEI potato with a crate of 6 lobsters for the four of us to share! OMG! It was awesome! I will never miss this event, for 2018 I hope we can go to one of the other 3 days of the festival. It is similar to the Fred Hall Show with vendors in booths but all relating to seafood and eating!

Back to fishing, we booked 4 days of fishing starting on Sunday with Tightline Tours and Captain Spencer Norton and his mate Kieran Larkin. As Jim Carlisle described in his article last month, we also tagged our fish but all of our were re-



leased. This year we fished out of Montague and planned to go in the same area we fished the year before. The only thing was the herring hadn't come in yet and the tuna were being shy. Kil Song, Mel Shimizu, Dr Thomas and Jon Kim were fishing the same dates as us but with Spencer's Dad, Greg Norton. We all headed out on the first morning but Greg's group made the decision to move north and fish out of Tingnish, which is a 7 hr boat ride from where we were. They ended up fishing the rest of their trip up there and had a great time.

We decided to stay and try and bring up the few tuna that were marking on the screen. It turned out to be a good decision for us. Nicole was up first and did great on her first giant tuna of about 600lbs, I went next and landed a fish of similar size. Keith was third and last for the first day and landed a beautiful 800lb tuna and we were all stoked with our day!! No matter what our friends landed one and we had 3 days to get Kevin one and hopefully go through the rotation again. On Tuesday, Kevin was up first and he got the first fish to leader in 7 minutes and pulled the hook from bumping the drag up. It technically didn't count as a landed fish since it was under the 10 minutes so he went again. He landed a beautiful 700lb tuna that we tagged and got dna for. Nicole went next and she had a definite grander!! It took her about an hour and 15 min to bring it to the boat. We took pictures, tagged it, and



got the dna sample then sent it on it's way! She did a great job with Keith coaching her and of course Spencer and Kieran.

I was up next and I wasn't prepared for what it turned in to. 1.5hr and at least 10 feet long.

I'm not going to lie. My fish was a beast. I almost gave up and had Kevin get suited up to take over. I had it to leader in 35 min but then it ran and sat at at 30 ft for 45 minutes. It was still super hot when we finally dragged it up to the swivel. I mean literally, the captain was pulling the line by hand so I could wind and take back the precious 3 feet. Spencer had it at the leader and he had to pull and step back from the rail to not let the fish take any line at a certain point because I was at the swivel and couldn't reel anymore. Usually Spencer will hand line the fish up to the surface so he can take the hook out. This fish wouldn't turn his head up. Until finally



he slowly came to the surface, reluctantly. Then the fish just kept digging down when Kieran would try to tail gaff him. When we finally got him along the boat, it was at least 10ft long and had to be over 1000lbs. Spencer tagged him, but it was still too feisty to get a DNA sample. I couldn't get a pic with it cause it kept smacking its tail on the surface soaking everyone and then came off the release hook and swam away. We looked at the release



hook at saw that my fish had bent open the stainless steel hook.

It was best for his health. So I don't mind. But part of me wanted it to die because I was so dead myself and I wanted to see what it was that challenged me to my breaking point. My knees were hyperextending and I had Kevin and Nicole holding me back to counter the pressure the fish was giving. I was almost to tears. These fish can be mellow, tough and just plain mean. Spencer said it was the hardest fighting fish they have ever had. Thank goodness The next day was my off day, a nice day of rest.

The third day was slow Keith landed another beauty at about 800 lbs and Kevin landed his as well. We waited for the third fish for Nicole but it never happened. They would come up and take off over and over. So we called it a day.

The fourth day Nicole was up first and she landed herself another grander. This one made her work for it. It wasn't as bad as mine but Nicole definitely worked hard! Keith had to hold her back as well when the fish would turn the corner but she kicked butt! The rest of the day we tried for our last two fish but it wasn't in the cards. So we had a delicious lobster lunch and beers. It isn't all about the catching, it's more about the time and enjoying the adventure!! We booked our dates for next year and can't wait to see how it goes!

After a long van ride from Loreto airport to La Bocana, Los Pinochos Ochos, (The Pinocchio Eight, AKA LOPOS) were rewarded with a delicious and decadent feast of fresh lobster, scampi diablo, abalone, and scallops by the great staff of La Bocana Sportfishing. The wonderful ambience, warm and friendly hospitality and service continued for the remainder of the trip.

Lucky Fisherman Phil was blessed to win an Avet HX 2-speed Raptor Reel in Larry Brown's raffle, which raised \$600 for LARRC Veterans fishing trips. This was in addition to the 20% rebate/donation Larry negotiated with Baja Fishing Convoys for the trip which totaled \$3,231 made out to LARRC Veterans Fishing. A fun fishing adventure plus a \$3,831 for the club. Not too bad. Thanks Larry and Orchid.

Los Pinochos Ochos (LOPOS) included LARRC members Richard Stone, David Morgan, Marc Monforte, Fisherman Phil Bell, Larry Brown, and Deiter Kruger. Non-members were Mark Libreht, and Bob Gorbuz.

The LOPOS anglers fished for 3 days in groups of 2 or 3 on 3 nice pangas. Each group had the daily choice of inshore or offshore fishing from 7 AM to 3 PM. Inshore fishing yielded some nice grouper, yellowtail, Sierra mackerel, sheepshead and world class trophy calico bass fishing. Offshore produced small to medium yellowtail and skipjack tuna. Rappalas, jigs, and plastics were the tackle that produced the best results. Amazingly, Larry's group won the daily jackpot every day with the largest groupers and a yellowtail. 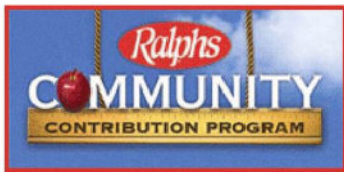

## Judge Peter E. Giannini ~ 1921-2017

June 8, 1921 - October 12, 2017 Judge Peter E. Giannini, Founder of CASA, dies at 96. Judge Peter E. Giannini (Pete), Founder of the Court Appointed Special Advocates program, died peacefully in his sleep, in his home in Rancho Mirage, CA. He was 96. Judge Giannini was born in Kingsburg, CA, on June 8, 1921, and attended the Clay Elementary School. He was First Violinist and Senior Class President of Kingsburg High School, as well as an Eagle Scout. He was a graduate of Santa Clara University as well as the Boalt Hall Law School at U.C. Berkeley, where he met his lovely wife, Mercedes. They were happily married for 67 years, until her passing in 2011 at age 89. Judge Giannini graduated second in his class from Boalt and clerked for Justice Roger Traynor of the California Supreme Court. He then entered private practice, meanwhile engaging in successful real estate development ventures with his longtime partner, Mike Falabrino. In 1970, he was appointed to the California Municipal Court, and soon elevated to the Superior Court, by then-Governor Ronald Reagan and served 20 years on the bench.

During this time, he became the Chief Judge of the Dependency Section of the Juvenile Court System. His heart was broken to see the trauma of the young victims of child abuse, and to see that they had no one to advocate for their interests. He applied for a federal grant to establish the Guardian Ad Litem program, which was so successful that it has been replicated nationally and is now called CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates). Now, CASA volunteers have watched over and advocated for more than 250,000 abused and neglected children. Donations to CASA in his honor can be made here. In his spare time, Judge Giannini was an avid hunter, fisherman and outdoorsman. He and his wife, Mercedes, won numerous fishing trophies at the Los Angeles Rod and Reel Club. He was also a member of the California Yacht Club. He was a fitness enthusiast and enjoyed tennis, bicycling and swimming. He remained a classical violinist and vocalist all his life. He is survived by his six children and their families.
