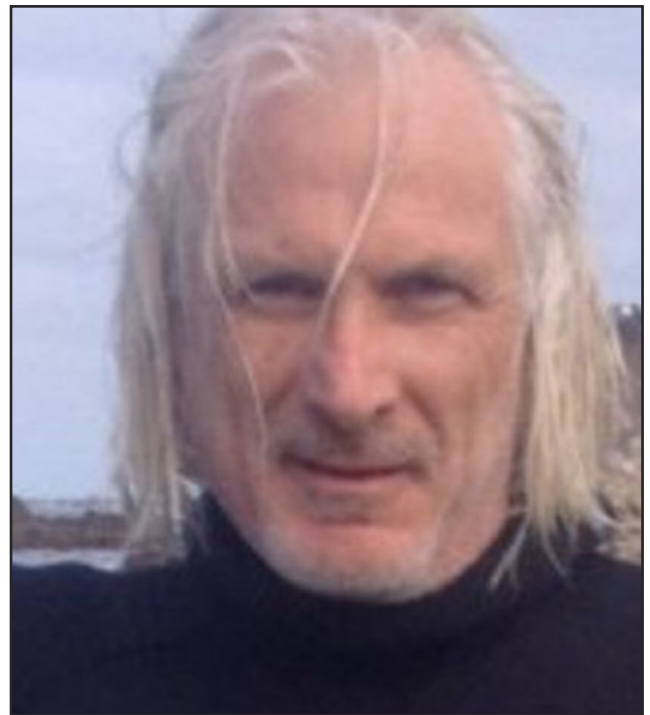

Michael Quill, Marine Programs Director at Los Angeles Waterkeeper (LAW), began his work there as a volunteer scientific diver restoring kelp forests in 2007, joined the LAW staff as Community Programs Manager in 2012, and became the Marine Programs Director in 2016. He now oversees all marine operations at LAW which includes providing up to 70 opportunities a year for volunteers and youth to join him on the water as part of LAW's Boat Based Survey Program, and in our LA watershed's rivers and creeks as part of LAW's experiential learning Creeks to Coast Youth Program. Dive operations currently include maintaining the Scripps water-monitoring sensor located under the Santa Monica Pier and various collaborations with other marine programs. Michael is a founding member of both the CA MPA Watch Network and the Los Angeles MPA Collaborative of which he is currently a co-chair. Michael welcomes ideas and opportunities to connect our diverse communities around water.

A Message from the President

There will be some important announcements and events coming up.

First, the Foundation will be taking over the financial responsibility of Vets trips. The club will need to transfer any donations remaining in our account to the Foundation. That will be a pretty big hit to our account, but we should be able to recover with dues collections coming up over the next sixty days. We will be increasing the dues by just \$20.00 this year to \$120.00.

ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

◆ **ALGAE BLOOMS.** . . One of the sources I have is NATIONAL FISHERMAN. It reports on matters affecting the commercial fishing sector. The current issue has a story about farmed salmon, in Norway, where the increase in water temperatures has caused algae blooms to chemically affect the gills of the farmed salmon. These farmed fish are destroyed due to a lack of oxygen in their pens. Atlantic salmon, to the amount of 25.5 million pounds and valued at more than \$82 million were lost. Obviously these fish stocks could not escape their pens when warmer water – global warming – occurred.

◆ **WILD OCEANS.** . . The LARRC Foundation, currently under the leadership of Joel Steinman, is one of the contributors to the non-profit 501C3 organization Wild Oceans. This group, dedicated to the preservation of our fisheries, was started in 1973 as the National Coalition for Marine Conservation. (NCMC). Their purpose: to preserve not only an important food source but also address the recreational value for millions. I know of no organization more effective in lobbying the powers that be resulting in Magnuson Stevens Act (1976) and more currently the Modern Fish Act (2018) which acknowledges the different needs of recreational fishermen and commercial ones. You can get more details by accessing WILD OCEANS.org.

◆ **BRISTOL BAY - PEBBLE MINE ALASKA . . .** We've touched on this topic a number of times. In 2018 Alaska produced 2.4 billion metric tons of seafood. That year \$3.3 billion in seafood was exported to over 100 countries. Although these exports include many other types of seafood, Bristol Bay has been one of the important sources of salmon. You will recall that a Canadian mining company has been anxious to mine the area for copper and gold but the process encountered objections to their "Pebble Mine". The Obama administration supported this objection fearing contamination of the waters where the salmon spawn. Many local businesses rely on the continued success of these fisheries. The fishery supports 14,000 jobs. The

LA Times has carried several stories on this issue noting in a July article that the EPA had cleared "a path" for the mine. A Times editorial (8/12) notes that the EPA had made a "gift" to the mining industry. It caused such a furor that the EPA administrator, Scott Pruitt, subsequently resigned. The State of Alaska has veto power over this project whether this is exercised remains to be seen. Stay tuned!

◆ **SCRIPPS INSTITUTE OF OCEANOGRAPHY. . .** A recent report tells of large schools of sardines around the Scripps pier possibly drawn there by warmer waters. They attract large predators like yellowtail also known as "hamachi" if you eat sushi. They are fast powerful swimmers adapted for hunting baitfish. Fishing in the Scripps Coastal Conservation area is for pelagic species only. This does not include yellowtail. Another interesting fact from Scripps tells that whales have dialects, like humans, which can identify where they are from. They are studying whale acoustics to find out why whales are migrating to new areas.

CALLING ALL COOKS

Parmesan Crusted Fish Fillets

This one is a standout winner! I made it with fresh halibut I brought back from Homer, AK. Any white fish fillet will work well with this technique.

You will need : Preheated 350° oven

Oven proof skillet to brown the fish

Finely grated parmesean cheese

All purpose flour

A beaten egg

Fish fillets

Season fish with salt and pepper.

Blend cheese and flour together, no lumps. Place Flour and cheese, egg in separate shallow bowls. Dip the fillet in egg and then press into cheese/flour to lightly cover the fillets. Bring the pan up to medium heat and add enough oil to cover the bottom of the pan. Add the fillets and brown on both sides. Put the skillet in the oven and cook for a few minutes till the internal temperature is about 124-135 degrees. Remove immediately and serve with with your favorite sauce and a mildly dressed salad..do not let the flavor of the dressing fight with the sauce for the fish

FRANK POLAK MARINE MENTOR'S TRIP

The Los Angeles Rod and Reel Foundation was formed in 1951. The primary purpose of our Foundation is to take underprivileged children on fishing trips. During each year since the Foundation's inception, we have had our annual underprivileged children's fishing trip. Typically, we would charter two or more boats out of Long Beach or San Pedro. Many times, we have taken several hundred children on our annual trip. On the 50th anniversary of our Foundation, we took more than 500 underprivileged children on that one-day event.

Several years ago, the late Frank Polak and others came up with the idea of a marine mentor's trip. The "Frank Polak Marine Mentor's Trip" is geared to have a much more personalized one-on-one experience with the children - whereas, the underprivileged children's fishing trip is geared for taking many more children. Each of these trips are clearly different - and each have its advantages and disadvantages - but there is no denying that each of these trips are clearly wonderful events.

On August 12, 2019, our Foundation hosted underprivileged children from New Directions for Youth (NDY) on our Frank Polak Marine Mentor's Trip aboard the Aloha Spirit out of Channel Islands Sportfishing. NDY was established in 1975 and is a youth development agency that provides direct services and programs to at-risk youth and their families. All of the services provided by NDY are free of charge. NDY has made a tremendous difference in the lives of thousands of underprivileged children over the many years of its existence.

The August 12th trip was a very memorable trip for all onboard. The children screamed and were in awe by the hundreds of dolphin swimming right to the boat and bald eagles that grabbed fish very close to our boat. We had the best fishing that I have ever experienced on any of our underprivileged children's fishing trips. We caught lots of whitefish, rockfish, sheepshead, calico bass and barracuda.

It was so very special to see the children (many of whom were seasick on the way to the fishing grounds and then were fine once we started to fish) have enormous smiles and enthusiasm throughout the day. It

was so very obvious that they had a day that they will never forget. It was also so very special to see some of the children, who were mentored by some of the experts in our club, learn how to bait their own hook, cast out their line, hook their own fish and bring in their own fish.

Many thanks to Rob Baldwin, Allen Brodetsky, Steve Digiuseppe, Michael Godfrey, Joe Mahfet, Steve Simon, Joel Steinman, Jaime Smith, Paul Varenchik who volunteered to help out on this very special trip.

Our annual underprivileged children's fishing trip was recently named the "Earl Warren Memorial Kids' Fishing Trip" after Earl Warren passed away last year. Earl loved to fish and he loved to take underprivileged children on fishing trips. Thank you, Earl for looking down on us and giving these children an unforgettable experience.

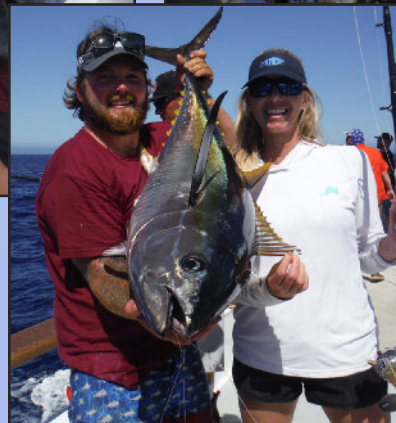

beating his just achieved personal best with another huge Guadalupe YFT. Another hour goes by and Shelly scores his personal best yellowtail with a home guard Guadalupe Giant. Congrats Shelli; nice day! There were 12 other personal bests and firsts on this trip.

This was my first solo trip, which made it very intimidating. As soon as I arrived at the landing, I was welcomed by Larry and fellow passengers. Captain Andy, and his second, Art, and crew Jason, Justin, and Tony definitely raised the bar on hospitality and professionalism. Mike and Fernando in the galley put out some amazing dishes. I landed 13 YFT, and 3 large YT. Let me tell you the YT put up a fight. Guadalupe fish are nothing to mess with. I was also able to make someone's day by handing off my last fish of the trip to Fred, who hadn't had a chance to fight the larger 80# range tuna. The smile on his face when he landed his fish was a great close to an amazing trip. I can't wait to go out on another trip with the Red Rooster III in the future.

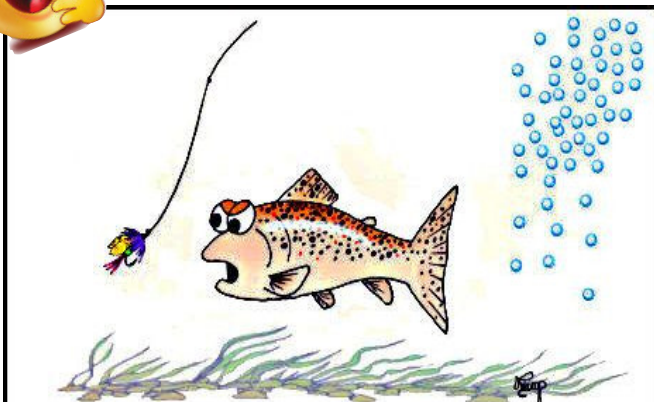

RED ROOSTER CROWS ON LARRC 5 DAY CHARTER

9/3 TO 9/8

Personal bests for Bluefin and Yellowfin tuna were the prevailing experiences on the Larry Brown/LARRC 5 day fishing adventure aboard the Red Rooster III. LARRC participants included Mike Hartt, Andy Ratzky, Jack Massachi, Mike Godfrey, and Fisherman Phil Bell. Eight anglers caught their biggest yellowfin and 9 anglers caught their biggest bluefin at Guadalupe Island and an area close to the Coronado Islands, respectively.



Larry's raffles which always include great fishing gear and accessories, raised \$2,065 and 100% of it was given to LARRC President Mike Hartt for the Foundation. All but \$40 was designated for Veterans Fishing trips.

Captain Andy decided to go to Guadalupe Island first for the larger, trophy yellowfin tuna. We arrived at noon on the second day. We caught yellowfin from 40 to 127 lbs. Great White sharks grabbed at least half the fish we hooked and many more were lost from hook pulls, hooks breaking, and knots and connection failures. These are really mean, tough fish. Captain Andy called it extreme technical fishing. Without the expert help of the crew few fish would have been landed.

After catching approximately 50 gorgeous trophy Guadalupe YFT we headed north overnight to an area south of the Coronado Islands with the intention of catching smaller school sized tuna in greater numbers. We were surprised to find the larger sized bluefin tuna with very few smaller grade fish. Using 25 and 30 lb. test and small hooks made for some epic battles with emotions of agony and ecstasy. Many big tuna were lost because of the light line and small hooks, but the tuna landed were a real accomplishment for the lucky anglers. The bluefin really lit up at dusk and



rewarded anglers using the Nomad Buffalo and Flat Fall style jigs and heavier line. Mike Hartt got a trophy on a Slasher.

The weather was drop dead gorgeous and the seas were calm. Every day we enjoyed gourmet meals prepared by Chefs Mike and Danielle. Danielle caught her first ever 70 lb. tuna on a new Phenix rod she won in the raffle. Thanks to the entire crew: Captain Andy Cates, Ethan, Jason, Tony and Fernando were very professional and indispensable on deck and Chef's Mike and Danielle worked miracles in the galley.

First Time Fly-Fishing

About a month ago, Kevin and I went to Mammoth to visit some friends and we went hopping around the rivers to try and catch trout. Well, I am not very well versed in freshwater fishing much less for trout. So after an afternoon of walking through cow feces to the Owens River trying to hook a fish; I felt I needed a professional. Also, we saw flyfishermen in the same cow related area and they were having much better luck. SO its reasonable to assume fly-fishing = more fish bites. Ha ha ha!!! Also, certain areas are open to only fly-fishing.

A friend of ours recommended Doug Rodricks of Sierra Drifters Guide Service. I spoke to Doug and booked him for 2 days of fishing (9/7 & 9/8). We met Doug at 7:30am at the boat launch at Crowley Lake and so began our new adventure with our friend Jon, Kevin and myself. None of us had ever been on Crowley before and have only seen glimpses of it from the highway. I'll be honest; the highway view doesn't do the lake any justice. It is beautiful and the colors of the rocks and grasses are just wonderful.

Doug took us to an area to start fishing; got us all rigged up and gave us a beginner lesson to fly-fishing. We learned how to D-cast, what to do when we get bit (set the hook by raising our arm like the Statue of Liberty) and to let go of the reel when the fish is running. Seemed pretty easy and simple, so far from it!!

We all had a couple of bites and all proceeded to bend our arms when we set the hook, so no hook sets. After a

few reminders Jon and I figured it out and hooked some fish. My first fish was a Sacramento Perch and I landed some smaller Cutthroat Trout. Jon landed a few Rainbow and Brown Trout. Both of us were so happy!! Kevin on the other hand was snakebit. He had one nibble and that was all. Made for a long day. We ended our day in an area with larger fish. We had nibbles and some hooksets, but where we had issues was letting go of the reel when



the fish ran. Lets just say it was the fish's turn! I think we lost 4 or 5 bigger model trout. Overall, I think we did great for our first time and honestly I just wanted to catch something!

The next day we decided to cement our new found skills and go back to Crowley versus trying our luck in the rivers.

The day was cooler and the wind kept switching directions. So our lines kept getting wiggly and we tried to recast on our own. Bless Doug for his constant help and recasting. He stepped in and said we were making up



our own casts and it was not what he taught us!!! It was pretty funny! I caught a Kamloop Trout, a gorgeous rainbow trout and several smaller trout. Kevin caught his first fish, a Sacramento Perch!! He was stoked and also it helped solidify the hooksetting, reeling and fighting the fish lessons. It's easy to listen and practice with a person holding the line but when it's a real fish that's where it makes a difference in learning. Jon did great again and was on fire. We ended the



day in the area we finished the day before. Doug reregged Jon and got him fishing. Well, Jon decided to catch 4 big brown trout, one after another. Doug didn't have a chance to get

Kevin or I set up. It was pretty awesome! It slowed down once we got our lines in the water, of course. Then 20 minutes before we had to leave, Kevin hooks up on a big one! He lands a beautiful rainbow trout!!! Leave it to Kevin to wait until the end.

Overall, we had a great time with Doug and learning how to fly-fish. It's definitely something I would like to get more proficient in. Kevin and I both would like to hike along a river and be able to fish or have the challenge of catching fish on the lighter line. Until next time!
