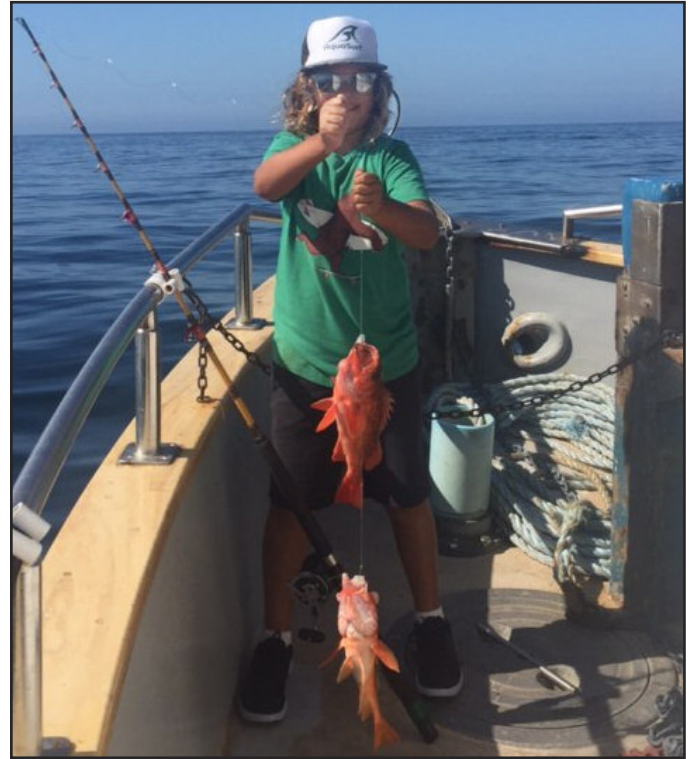

We were fortunate to buy 20 caballitos, a sturdy 7-inch bait fish dockside. We slowly trolled these morsels along a sandy bottom 100 – 200 feet out from the beach and picturesque rock formations. The action was steady once the gamecocks decided to play. I boated five roosterfish, released three, and gave two to the crew for dinner. The fish were in the 5 – 8 pound size range. The pesky needlefish also chewed on the caballitos and took a chunk of our bait supply. It was a memorable day of fishing. I will now add catching a big roosterfish to my bucket list.

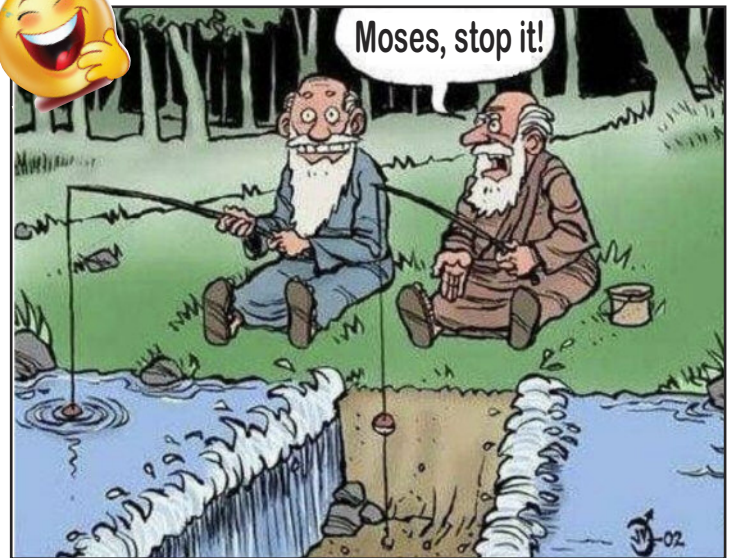
◆ **FISHING LICENSE.** . . You've all known that the purchase of a fishing license gives you the right to fish for one year from date of purchase. There is one proviso here: buy your license in January and it will be valid for a year. Legislation is being considered to give you a year no matter when you buy it.(No final word on this yet) The CDFW reminds us that we have more than 1100 miles of coastline and more than 30,000 miles of rivers and streams. Licenses may be purchased from any license agent or online 24 hrs. a day. (California Department of Fish and Wildlife)

◆ **WIKIPEDIA.** . .has compiled a list of Los Angeles elected officials. This includes members of the State Senate and California Assembly. If you are aware of your district number and want to communicate with your representative let me know and I will send you the name.

◆ **THE CDFW.** . also has available an California Ocean Sport Fishing Regulation Map. Click on the regulation maps as follows: Groundfish Regs – (831) 649-2801 Salmon Regs (707) 576-3429 Shellfish Regs (831) 649-2883 For summary ocean fishings regulations access California Ocean Sport Fishing Regulations Map.

◆ **CHRIS OLIVER.** . .who is the Director of National Marine Fisheries Service, published an interesting statistic in the current issue of National Fisherman. He cites a report that U.S. Fisheries landed 9.9 billion (yes, with a B) pounds of fish and shellfish in 2017. Guess things can't be all bad!

NEW TACKLE, TECHNIQUES TO ENHANCE SUCCESS IN BLUE WATER

Your editor asked me if there was any new tackle or techniques to enhance success in blue water angling I'd like to share with members.

Rods - I am converting to 8 ft rods for nearly all applications. The longer rods are allowing me to cast my baits much further and hook up much more quickly and frequently, especially with the offshore bluefin and yellowfin tuna. You have to cast your lively sardine exactly into the spot where the crew member is tossing the chum. The damn fish seemed to almost ignore baits dropped over the rail or even those cast 10 feet shy of the spot even when the baits swam out. On the cow fishing I'm also using 8 ft rail rods. Phenix has a new line of Axis 800 x2h, x3h and x4h which are perfect. The Red Rooster is using these 100% for their kite rods. We are losing fewer fish from entanglement on the rudders and props, less abrasion on the chine, fewer losses from hooks pulling, and knots and connections breaking due to the longer more forgiving tip action of the rod. The totally indestructible hypolon extends from the reel seat all the way to the first guide so you can push out or pull back on the rail, giving and taking back leverage, making it the perfect rail rod. Learn the most efficient technique for fishing a rail rod and an 8 ft rod will be comfortable and not stress your back or arms and you will land more fish.

Jigs - Nomad has two types of jigs which are outperforming the competition so much it is incredible, except I have seen and experienced it myself. The Nomad Buffalo and Gypsy jigs are flatfall style jigs but they are hooking way more fish when side-by-side with the competition. On each of my last 3 charters on the Royal Star and Intrepid, respectively, we targeted bluefin tuna for the last 1 – 2 days of the trips. The Buffalo and Gypsy were used by a small mi-

nority of anglers but these jigs and anglers caught nearly all the tuna. On my very last charter on the Intrepid there were only 10 large BFT caught on jigs at night, of which 8 were caught on the Nomads. My roommate and I caught 7 of them all on Buffalos and Gypsies. Mine were 275, 177, 90, 85 and 60#s. Floyd's were 250 and 90. All on my Nomads. On my last Royal Star charter I heard Captain Brian Simms say the Buffalos are "best free falling jig on the market." If you fish for wahoo please don't go without taking several Nomad DTX 220 Minnows. We introduced these on a Red Rooster trip in February 2018. They were brand new so of course everybody wanted to use the old stand by Marauders with lots of teeth marks or the Catchy spinner or cow bell trolling jigs. We started trolling one Nomad DTX 200 and 3 Marauders and the DTX 200 got bit the first 7 times. Soon nobody wanted to use anything but the Nomad. It was truly incredulous. I would not believe this story if I did not see it myself!

Hooks - I was surprised by how much more effective using smaller bait hooks was for hooking and landing offshore bluefin tuna. Many of the captains were suggesting a tiny 1, 1/0 or 2/0 Owner offshore or flyliner hook on even the 80 - 100# tuna. If you were lucky and the hook lodged in the corner just like a circle hook you likely landed the fish. But if he swallowed the hook, the big fish eventually bit through the line and the losses were staggering. I stayed with a small circle hook, like the Owner ringed Mutu 1/0 or even dropped down to a size 1 non ringed Circle Mutu, got bit just fine and landed nearly all my fish. So I suggest using the smaller circle hooks but a strong gauge wire as we also saw many losses from hooks bending.

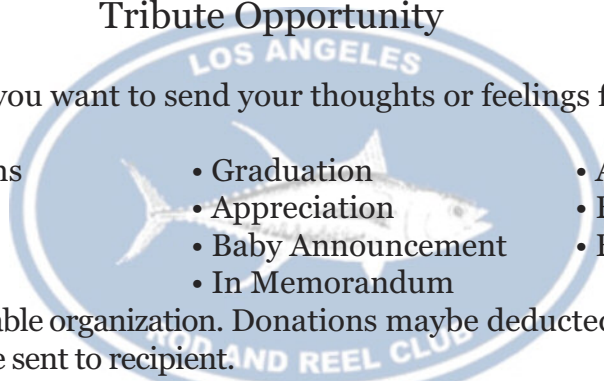

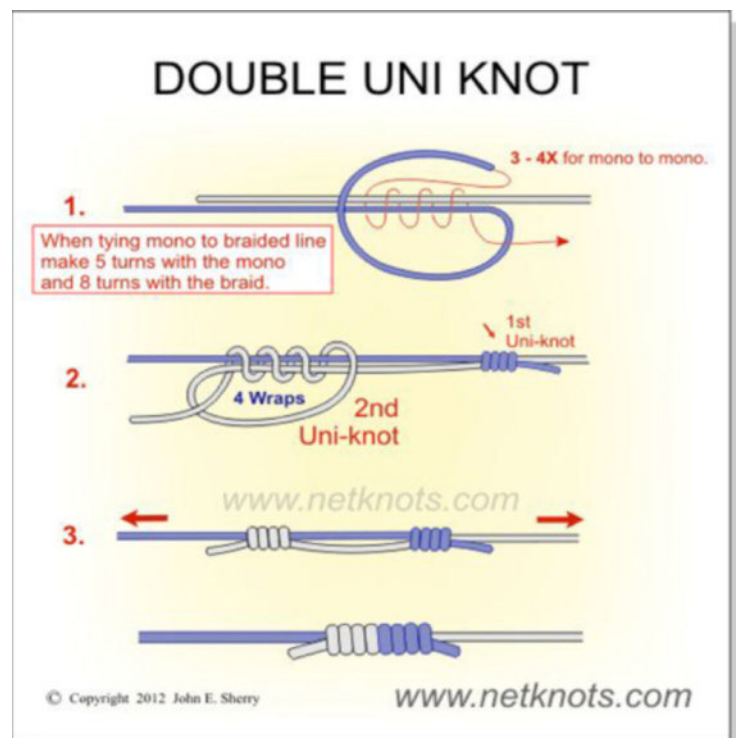

Double Uni Knot Mono to Braid

1. Overlap the ends of lines to be joined. Take the end of the line from the left and double back and make 3 to 4 wraps around both lines and through the loop that was formed. Pull tag end to tighten.
2. Repeat with the end of the line on the left making the same number of wraps unless tying with braided line in which you should double the number of wraps.
3. You have now tied two Uni knots. Pull the standing lines in opposite direction to slide the two knots together.
4. Clip ends close to the knot.
