A Message from the President

In honor of July 4th, I thought I would write a column on past American presidents and fishing. There is no dearth of material to write about since many U.S. presidents were avid recreational fishermen.

The first president to start with is number one – George Washington. The Potomac River that fronts Mount Vernon teemed with fish during colonial times. Smallmouth bass, perch, carp, and sturgeon were abundant and George Washington liked to catch them all. During their spring spawning runs, the constant thrashing of shad and blueback herring made the surface of the river foamy white. The colonial fishing kit consisted of horse hair line, a wooden stave reel, eyeless hooks, a silk twist leader rubbed with beeswax, and a cane pole. The hook was attached to the leader using the same snell knot used to today to tie a sliding two hook live bait rig. The beeswax prevented the snell knot from slipping. The horsehair line was attached to the end of the cane pole. This set-up was similar to Tenkara fly fishing, except that earthworms or bloodworms were used as bait. Washington generally fished with his brothers and friends walking along the banks of the river. When he was president, he used a saltwater fishing trip in a boat off Sandy Hook, New Jersey to bring together his two cabinet political rivals – Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton.

On a darker note, George Washington also ran a large scale commercial fishing operation. In fact, his commercial fishing was more profitable than the crops farmed on his 8000-acre estate. The shad and herring were harvested during their runs, dried, and salted. The work was done by the slaves on his plantation. The salted fish were shipped to the Caribbean, where they provided a cheap source of food for slaves working the English sugar plantations.

Grover Cleveland is the only president to serve in two non-consecutive terms. He was elected in 1885 and 1893, so he was both #22 and #24. An enthusiastic fisherman all his life, he was the first - but not the only - American president to write a book about fishing. His book "Fishing and Hunting Sketches"

proclaimed the American angler "the virtuous backbone of the country." That's high praise! Even more unique,



he got married while he was president and took his newly-wed wife fishing at their honeymoon cottage in August, 1886 at Deer Park, Maryland, accompanied by members of the press. Below is a drawing commemorating the scene. Note that Cupid is standing taking notes between the Press and the couple.

After he retired, he divided his time between fishing in upstate New York during the summer and along the Florida Treasure Coast in the winter.

Herbert Hoover was the first American president to be born west of the Mississippi. As head of the American Relief Administration after World War I, he earned worldwide acclaim for his efforts and became known as "the Great Humanitarian." He became controversial during his presidency because of his laissez-faire approach to dealing with the Great Depression. A devout trout fly fisherman, Hoover was known as the "Fishing President." One of his memorable quotes is: "Presidents have only two moments of personal seclusion. One is prayer; the other is fishing – and they cannot pray all the time." Another Hoover aphorism makes a great addendum to the Declaration of Independence: "All men are equal before fish." Below is a picture of President Hoover with his day's catch of trout.

Hoover was the second American president to write a book about fishing. "Fishing for Fun and To Wash Your Soul" was published in 1963, a year before his death. The book is a compilation of remarks and short stories on his love of fishing. Still available on line (though pricey), the book has a 4.6 rating on Amazon. Chief Justice William O. Douglas re-



viewed the book when it was published and remarked that it combined "a touch of Thoreau" with "a touch of Isaac Walton."

Franklin Delano Roosevelt ("FDR") was a passionate, life-long fisherman. After his mobility became limited when he contracted polio in 1921, his personal physician Dr. Ross McIntyre advised him to go on as many vacations as possible to improve his health. McIntyre later recounted, "Despite our bargain about regular vacations, I doubt, however, if he would have kept his agreement except for his love of

the water and fishing." FDR had a love for deep sea fishing. Prior to World War II, he made regular trips to the Bahamas to fish. He also caught a 235-lb. shark in Costa Rica after a 90-minute battle. In 1937, President Roosevelt went with his son Elliott to Port Aransas, Texas to fish for tarpon. 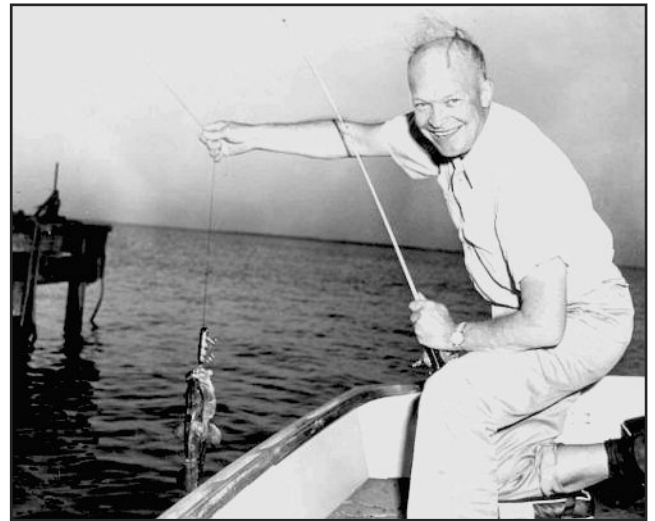
During the dark days of World War II, FDR went fishing with Winston Churchill at Camp David.



Harry Truman liked to fish but his wife Bess was more enthusiastic than him. Often Harry would bait the hook and sit back and read a book while his wife fished. They went on fishing excursions together before they were married in Springfield, Missouri. When he was president, he vacationed in Bermuda for a week of fishing, swimming, and poker playing. The picture below was taken August 30, 1946.



Dwight Eisenhower, the 34th president and the supreme allied commander in the European theater during World War II, grew up fishing with his five brothers on Mud Creek, near Abilene, Kansas. Using improvised rods, 5 cent hooks, and worms, they targeted sunfish, bullheads, and carp. As an adult, he became an ardent fly fisherman. One of his favorite places to fish was the streams and lakes in the high Rockies in Colorado. During his 8 years as president, he went on over 40 fishing excursions – many of these to Colorado streams. Eisenhower invited Herbert Hoover to go with him on one of these trips to a remote mountain cabin where he would have to eat the President's cooking for four days. Hoover was reluctant to go at first, but he eventually submitted to Eisenhower's charm, and the two presidents ended up having a great time! 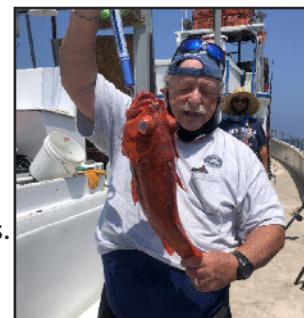
Fisherman Phil Catches Personal Best SM Bay Red in Malibu Area Aboard the Betty O

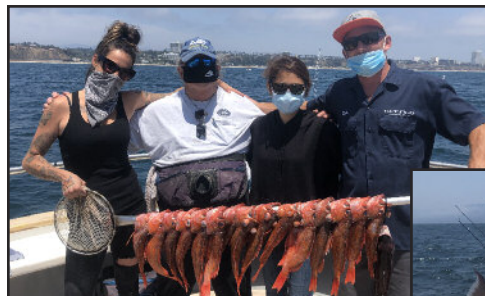

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT AB3030

AB3030 is California legislation now racing through our legislature. You need to be concerned as it has the very real potential to drastically change our fishing lives for the worse. What started as an international environmental community plan/goal to restrict the use of 30% of all land and water on earth to protect biodiversity is now being driven to the extreme here in California with an ocean focus on additional marine protected areas. Protecting biodiversity is a shared value of all conservationists including anglers. As the true ocean conservationists, saltwater anglers support healthy oceans and fish populations. As the primary users of the public ocean resource we also understand that biodiversity protection does not require “no take” policies for success, a fact that is lost on the supporters of **AB3030**.

Aside from pushing protected areas, AB3030 has several other problems. Some are, misleading statements, or lack of clarity and definition, or misrepresentation of the actual current level of ocean protection. California oceans are some of the best protected waters in the world. That is the result of effective management including seasons, size limits, gear restrictions, the only saltwater fish hatchery on the west coast, and more. And let’s not forget that added to this protection is 16% of our ocean waters are locked up in “no take” protected areas as well as other restricted fishing areas and marine sanctuaries. While protecting 30% of the land and water in many areas around the world is needed that is not the case in California. When all of our protections are considered, way more than 30% of California’s ocean waters are already protected.

To sell their misguided effort, the supporters of **AB3030**

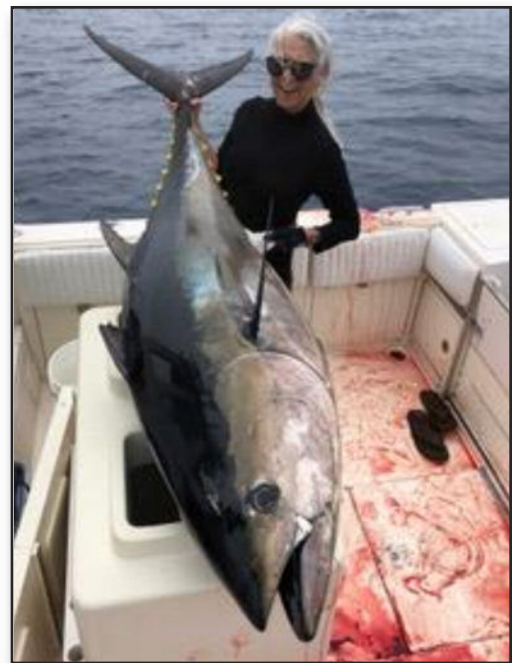
claim that legislation is needed to protect California’s ocean biodiversity. They say that problems such as climate change, sea level rise, freshwater runoff, ocean acidification and red tides are all evidence of needed additional protection. While these are all real concerns, **AB3030** with its protected areas will do nothing to help with these issues but will rather simply further restrict the fishing public’s access to public waters.

CCA CAL, and other recreational fishing organizations have offered the author and sponsors of **AB3030** amendments to remove the push for protected areas, to correct misleading wording, to define “protection” and to be more honest about the actual state of current protection here. Our amendments have been ignored as their response continues to be “we have not yet had time to consider them.” The more I learn about **AB3030** the more convinced I am that **AB3030** is MLPA 2.0. It is being run by many of the same environmental groups as before with a very similar long-term strategy which ends by kicking us off the water. What a shame that **AB3030** as currently written will now once again create a war between the environmental community and recreational anglers when both communities and the ocean would be better off if we found ways to work together on efforts that would actually support biodiversity and a healthy ocean.

AB3030 is now a major priority of CCA CAL. If we are to be successful in preventing MLPA 2.0 by defeating **AB3030**, we will need a large portion of the 1.2 million anglers in California to get involved. Interesting Fact

Every time you go to the beach in California, you’re looking out at a national monument. The entire 1,100-mile long California coast, from Mexico to Oregon, is a protected ecosystem thanks to a 2000 proclamation by President Bill Clinton. The California Coastal National Monument extends 12 nautical miles from the shore to the continental shelf – islands, cliffs, rocks, reefs, shoreline, and anything above the high-tide line in this area are all part of the monument. California’s coast is home to diverse wildlife, from nesting seabirds to seals and sea lions, and the preservation of their ecosystem ensures it remains that way in years to come.
